CLIFTON PUPILS LEARN FROM THE PAST, AND LOOK TO THE FUTURE!

Pupils in Eagles Class at Clifton Primary School recently returned from a residential visit to the city of Bristol, where they had a very busy few days learning how the ideas and resilience of engineer Isambard Kingdom Brunel helped shape the city, and subsequent development of mechanical and civil engineering. During their visit, the children had opportunities to visit SS Great Britain, the famous Suspension Bridge and also the @Bristol Science Centre.





For many of our children, our annual Eagles' residential visit marks the first time they stay away from home, helping them on their way to greater independence as we prepare them for their transition to high school.

Looking ahead, we are delighted to be involved in an upcoming project which is really out of this world! Next year, our children will become space biologists and embark on a voyage of discovery by growing seeds that have been into space!

In September, 2kg of rocket seeds were flown to the International Space Station (ISS) on Soyuz 44S where they will spend several months in microgravity before returning to Earth in March 2016. The seeds have been sent as part of Rocket Science, an educational project launched by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and the UK Space Agency.

We will receive a packet of 100 seeds from space, which the children will grow alongside seeds that haven't been to space and measure the differences over seven weeks. The children won't know which seed packet contains which seeds until all results have been collected by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and analysed by professional biostatisticians.

The out-of-this-world, nationwide science experiment will enable the children to think more about how we could preserve human life on another planet in the future, what astronauts need to survive long-term missions in space and the difficulties surrounding growing fresh food in challenging climates.

In line with our school's overarching aim of 'Inspiring Minds & Shaping Futures' we hope the Bristol and Space Seeds projects might prompt some of our children to consider future careers in science, engineering or horticulture!





ANTIBIOTICS – TO BE TAKEN SERIOUSLY! By Dr Helen Rosewarne

Antibiotics are lifesaving drugs which have revolutionised the medical care in the last 80 years. They are important medicines which fight only bacteria. However resistance to bacteria is a growing problem in Europe. As a result of inappropriate use and prescribing antibiotics, the bacteria are learning to adapt and find ways to survive the effects of an antibiotic. The more an antibiotic is used, the more bacteria become resistant to it. In addition, few new antibiotics are being developed. As resistance in bacteria grows and with no new drugs available, it will be more difficult to treat infections and this affects patient care. Many people believe that antibiotics can cure common health problems, such as coughs and colds, sore throats and earaches. These are most often viral infections which cannot be treated by antibiotics. Not only will the antibiotic be of no benefit, they will become less effective against the bacteria they are intended to treat.

What can I do?

It is important that we use antibiotics in the right way, to slow down resistance and make sure these lifesaving medicines remain effective for us and future generations. Antibiotics should only be taken when prescribed by a health professional. They should be the correct medicine for your illness at the right dose – do not be tempted to use "left over" antibiotics from previous prescriptions. Antibiotics should be taken as directed because not finishing the whole course can also lead to antibiotic resistance. Many antibiotics are prescribed for mild infections when they do not need to be. Colds and most coughs, sinusitis, earache and sore throats often get better without antibiotics. No one likes feeling unwell but in a lot of cases antibiotics will not speed up your recovery. Your body's natural defences will fight the infections and help us save antibiotics for cases where they may be essential and even lifesaving now and for the future.

If you do feel ill and are concerned you are not fighting an infection, please call the surgery for advice. With the autumn and winter months just around the corner please have a think about how you can help in the important fight against antibiotic resistance.

Church Matters

New Year is a time when we think about changes.

Some of these we really look forward to. I am already having the delight of meeting young people who are planning their 2016 weddings. And other families are looking forward to



children and grand children avidly studying hospital scans to see how the baby is growing. And others are planning new jobs and new schools and new everything!

And Alice and I will be retiring at the end of September. It will be a wrench for us to leave this area and all the people we know.

So changes, even good ones, can bring us anxieties. In the case of the church's ministry, it is almost certain that the Church of England does not have enough Priests now to replace me with a Priest, but everybody is looking carefully at the possibility of re-shuffling things or maybe even having an especially trained Lay Minister. We will let you know when things become clearer.

Meantime, of course, other people are facing harder changes – illnesses, bereavements and so on.

We may not like change or we may welcome it. But whatever we think it is going to happen – it always does. And so we have to ask ourselves what are the things that we really want to stay the same, and what changes will we have to make to keep those things the same?

When Trish and Roy Collett left I made the point that they are keeping something steady and the same – that is family loyalty, love and helping each other. And because age comes upon us all they had to make a change in order to keep those things constant – the big change of moving from the house and neighbourhood they have loved.

It's going to be the same for Alice and me.

So we have to think, what are the things that are most important to us? They will be people and values mostly. And what changes will we have to make to keep those important people and values close? Because we can't just stay the same – it's like the river, if you try and stop it disaster happens.

We often try and change ourselves at New Year by making News Year's Resolutions. I once made one that even lasted a few months. Most of my resolutions (and perhaps yours too?) only lasted a matter of weeks, if that!

And that is because we try and do things on our own. We need human help, and we need Spiritual help. At the beginning of the 2nd World War, when bigger changes than people could imagine were about to happen, King George quoted the following lines in his broadcast: "I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown." And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way."

RARE FUNGUS 'DEVILS FINGERS' FOUND IN SHELSLEY GARDEN



Rosemary Winnall, writes:

Clathrus archeri is a most splendid fungus which may be found fruiting between June and October. It is related to the Stinkhorn *Phallus impudicus*, and like this species, the fruiting body arises from a gelatinous 'egg'. This soon ruptures, and from it emerges between 4 and 8 long slender red arms. On these the gleba develops – a black mucilaginous layer containing the spores. The mature fungus smells of rotting flesh which attracts flies to feed, and through these the spores are dispersed. The mature fungus measures about 20cms wide and 10cms high.

Devil's Fingers is indigenous to Australia and Tasmania but has been introduced into America (where it is known as the Octopus Stinkhorn), Europe and Asia. It was first seen in Europe in about 1914 when it was introduced with war supplies. It was found for the first time in the UK in Cornwall in 1946. From there it has been slowly extending its range across the south of England, and in recent years has been recorded in Wales and the Midlands.

lan Wright found the first Worcestershire specimen in grassland in Andy and Helen Griffee's back garden in Shelsley Kings.

This is still a rare fungus in the UK and a special find! Its unusual shape, bright red colour and foetid smell makes it easy to identify. More county records are to be expected, so do look out for it, take a photograph, record the date, and location, and send your records to the Worcestershire Biological Records Centre. Who will find the next county record I wonder?



TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE

December seems an appropriate time to talk about holly. Tenbury has especial significance in the national trade in holly owing to the annual Holly and Mistletoe Fairs which take place in the town every November and December. The country-wide price for mistletoe is set here and big bundles of holly and mistletoe, the latter gathered from our traditional orchards, make a wonderful sight.



Holly for Christmas decoration, variegated, plain, berried and un-berried, is cut from local standard trees and hedgerows and makes its way to the sales. In my own village, many years ago, our local grafter, whose main job was grafting fruit trees, grafted many of the cottage holly hedges with variegated varieties. To do this he allowed straight shoots of plain green holly to grow up from the hedge for a year or two and then grafted a variegated form onto the rising stems. The joint was sealed with a secret mixture and left to grow above the hedge-line. The cottagers then harvested the holly for the winter sales. White- and yellow-edged holly, particularly with berries, could command a premium price. More industrious villagers wove their holly into wreaths, which are also sold at the sales.

Holly is one of Britain's few native evergreen trees. It is slow-growing and can be made into a thick stock-proof hedge. Away from hedges, growing untrimmed, it makes a conical tree which can reach a height of 20 metres or more. As a large shrub it shelters below the canopy layers in woods. Its bark is smooth and grey and its wood a pale whitish colour. Sweet-smelling flowers are produced in May and June. Trees can be male or female. They both have flowers but only the female trees go on to produce berries. These are a valuable and nutritious source of food for birds from October to February.

In my garden visiting flocks of fieldfares and redwings join the local blackbirds and thrushes in stripping off the scarlet berries. There are never any left by Christmas! Interestingly they only finish off my holly berries after they have taken the more succulent fruits from my neighbours' yew tree.

Surprisingly for a plant used for stock control, holly was also used in remote areas for a winter animal feed. The higher branches of the trees bear leaves with fewer spines on them, so by reaching up and cutting the higher branches the leaves were more palatable. Even so, in places like the Stiperstones in Shropshire and the Olchon valley in Herefordshire holly cut from ancient pollards was ground up before being fed to livestock. The most important thing about holly though is how it brightens up the short days of autumn and winter. Shiny bright green leaves and contrasting glowing berries couldn't be a more winning combination. No wonder it is so popular at Christmas.

Declarations of Interest: There were none.

Minutes of Meeting of Clifton-upon-Teme Parish Council held on 3rd September 2015 were approved by majority decision (MN/HW)

Progress Reports/Updates: Members noted the Clerk's report that R. Wilks was monitoring fly tipping of grass on the playing field and would help identify the residents involved should any more tipping occur.

Report of Worcestershire County Councillor (WCC) Ken Pollock: Cllr Pollock apologised for being unable to attend the meeting.

Report of Malvern Hills District Councillor (MHDC) Gill Farmer: Cllr Gill Farmer was unable to attend the meeting (the Parish Council learned with sadness that DCllr Gill Farmer had been taken ill and died on the morning of 1st October 2015).

Planning: Members noted receipt of an email from the Chair of Stockton Parish Meeting re: Planning Application 15/01017/FUL: Solar Farm in the Teme Valley (circulated by email 8/9/15).

Highways and Byways: Lengthsman: no new issues. Footpaths: no new issues. Fly tipping by entrance to sewage works: reported to Severn Trent ref: 2002273545. Written report from Parish Tree Warden; Clerk to liaise with contractor. Drainage issues at the junction of Kenelm Road and Kenelm Close and Manor Road (lack of storm drains) Clerk to report.

Finance: Insurance: Members unanimously (MN/HW) concurred with advice from Insurance Broker Came & Company and accepted a quotation from Hiscox - cost of annual premium £706.59 including 6% insurance premium tax.

Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group: HW informed Members that £5,140, the first tranche of the locality grant, had been received and credited to a dedicated bank account. Locality required that the grant be spent within six month's of its receipt. 
