VIOLENT ASSAULT ON CLIFTON FARMER

Clifton on Teme farmer Phil Richards was violently attacked by four masked men on Thursday 6 February when he attempted to stop them stealing diesel from Highfields Farm in Hope Lane late at night. The four men, believed to be foreign, attacked Phil with bolt cutters when he blocked their escape with his Land Rover.



Son James said his father was badly bruised and shaken after the incident. "They smashed our Land Rover up and hurt my Dad," he added. The four men were travelling in a black BMW car, registration PO66WDD. Three years ago a JCB 53070 Telescopic Handler with bale squeeze on the front was stolen from the rickyard at the same farm. VILLAGE GREEN PARKING BAN

The original 'no parking' sign from the 1930s has been returned to the village green in Clifton after an absence of 55 years, thanks to the discovery of it by parish councillor Sid Haywood. Recent concern by the Parish Council about vehicles parking on the village green led to Sid discovering the old sign in the former blacksmith's forge where it had lain since 1965. Now repainted and remounted, thanks to Neil Sparey at local NDS Engineering, Sid and fellow parish councillor Chris Haywood (pictured opposite) have returned it to its rightful location on the green.

NEW INN TO OPEN ON SUNDAYS

The New Inn at Clifton will soon be open every day of the week. As well as Monday to Saturday from 4.30pm, the popular pub will also open on Sundays from 2pm, starting from 5 April.

Fortnightly during the September to April season, the pub also hosts the former Shelsley Social Club air rifle shooting team on Thursdays from 9pm, and the darts team on Wednesdays from 9pm. The pub's winter and summer pool teams meet on Mondays from 8.30pm. In addition, Bingo is held on the first and third Saturday of every month from 8pm – with a special Easter Bingo night planned from 7.30pm on 11 April.

Landlord Colin Morley said: "As from 5 April locals can pop in every day of the week. We're also pleased that the air rifle and darts teams have decided to remain here with us."



NEW FARM SHOP COMING TO STANFORD'S MILL FARM

A range of quality food produce will once again be available in the area, thanks to a new Farm Shop opening at Stanford Bridge's Mill Farm Country Retail village on 14 March.

Bailey's of Stanford will be run by Sapey Common resident John Bailey, replacing the former Larder. "In the past I always felt the shop's real potential never surfaced, and when the last owners moved out, I felt it was something I could make work for the community. My principle will be to use local products and services as much as possible, and deliver them reasonably priced."

The shop will offer produce from local bakers, butchers, dairies, breweries, plus fruit and veg, together with a range of convenience items. "I want my customers to feel a warm welcome," confirmed John. "My background is in business which will hopefully help me make the farm shop a success. All customer feedback is most welcome too!"

LION INN LATEST

Villagers and regulars of the Lion Inn in Clifton upon Teme have submitted a petition to owner and local resident John Fletcher to retain the services of the couple who have managed their pub, following news that changes are planned to the way it is managed.

Manager/chef John Brandon and his wife Jean have been running the Lion since 2018. The petition described John as "an outstanding chef and a very hard-working publican who has made our village pub the pride of Clifton upon Teme".



Owner John Fletcher said talks are in hand and a consultant has been engaged to develop a new plan for the ongoing operation of the Lion. "The likely outcome will be that a tenancy arrangement will be offered and John and Jean Brandon will have the option to apply," he added. Meanwhile the bar will remain open but the restaurant will be closed for a period while restructuring takes place.

Mr Fletcher, who has owned the pub for nine years, said he is "totally committed to the successful ongoing operation of the Lion which is an important social hub of the village".

LOTTERY SYNDICATE CELEBRATES WINS

The CLOTS – members of the Clifton Lottery Syndicate, of whom there were 30 last year – recently celebrated the end of their first year's winnings, which in total came to £1,087. Each of the members pays £2 per week and the syndicate currently enters 13 lines in every Wednesday and Saturday Lotto draw. Twice a week, when the winning numbers are revealed, they get a little buzz of excitement. There are four member vacancies if anyone wishes to join.

MHDC RECYCLING ADVICE

Malvern Hills District Council residents are generally pretty good at recycling, and contamination rates are amongst the lowest in the county, according to District Councillor Caroline Palethorpe.

"However, we still have particular problem areas where too many items ending up in green bins/cherry sacks are not suitable for recycling. Over the next few weeks and months we will be supporting Worcestershire County Council in running a campaign to highlight the main items which are incorrectly put into bins and help residents to get their recycling right."

Recent sampling has revealed the following items are most commonly put into the green bin when they belong elsewhere: Clothing and shoes; food waste; household items including a cheese grater, toilet brush and photo frame; nappies and metals.

CLIFTON'S LIVER BIRDS

Three Clifton women from the same Liverpool school sixty years ago, one a member of staff, the other two as pupils, only discovered they had ended up in the village more than forty years later.

Ann MacBryde was a PE teacher at Waterloo Park Grammar School for Girls from 1958-1961, while Beth Whittenbury and Liz Rowe were there as pupils in 1959. But it was not until they all met up in Clifton in 2004 that they became aware of the connection having lost touch with one another in the intervening period.

"I welcomed Beth and her husband Jack to a meeting in the village hall and learned that they had just moved from the Liverpool area," said Ann MacBryde. "Then we discovered that Liz Rowe had also attended the same school as us".

Beth Whittenbury also discovered that another Clifton resident, Charles Knowles, had been the Consultant Specialist Orthodontic Surgeon at the United Liverpool Hospitals where she had worked as a medical photographer in the early 1960s.

Clifton's extraordinary Liverpudlian connections don't end there. Beth's husband Jack, their three sons and her brother have all attended Merchant Taylors' Boys School while another resident villager, Martine Jones, was a teacher at Merchant Taylors' Girls School in Liverpool.

River Rats, the sequel to debut novel *Canal Pushers*, is released on 2 April as part of his Jumping Jack Flash series of books based on the UK's waterways. The book continues to follow the fortunes of a fictional journalist called Jack Johnson and his partner Nina as they move their narrowboat onto further adventures in Bath. The books' publisher, Orphans Publishing, is also releasing a paperback edition of *Canal Pushers* at the same time.

CLIFTON PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

HILL CLIMB FOOTPATH CLOSURE BID

Clifton Parish councillors have objected 'strongly' to an application by the Midland Automobile Club to close part of a number of footpaths at the top of the hill climb course near Clifton. See P18 for full story and map.

GREAT BRITISH SPRING CLEAN IN CLIFTON

Clifton Parish Council has given its blessing to a local litter pick on Saturday, 4th April, in support of the great British Spring Clean campaign planned by Keep Britain Tidy. Mandy Henry said she hoped the event would be a community day in the parish and an opportunity for new residents to be involved.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Annual Parish Meeting in Clifton will be held on Thursday, 21st May, in the village hall and will include a presentation of the proposals for the 'Five Acre Field' recreation area funded by S106 money arising from the Pound Lane development.

SPEEDING CONCERN

Concern about the speed of traffic in Hope Lane and near the school in Clifton prompted the Parish Council to raise the matter with Worcestershire County Council Highways Department. County Councillor Ken Pollock said money would be made available for the erection of white gates on roads at the approach to the village.

LATER LIFE ACCOMMODATION IN CLIFTON

The results of the housing needs survey carried out by Malvern Hills District Council into Accommodation for Later Life in Clifton were reported to the Parish Council. Among the 25% of residents who responded there were 32 older people (nine under 60, ten between 61 and 75, 11 over 75 and two age unknown) who expressed an interest in alternative later life accommodation ranging from five wanting it immediately to 15 not envisaging needing it until after five years. 17 of these expressed an interest in an apartment complex despite no clear plans having been presented yet of the concept and will be consulting on in due course. This seems to be evidence of sufficient demand to justify continuing to pursue the project.

"If there is anyone who has relevant experience of dealing with community groups, planning, funding, project management etc who would be prepared to join our steering group or act as a consultant we would love to hear from you," said John Wain.

86.19 Budget Setting & Precept 2020-21: The Clerk had previously circulated a draft budget and precept for 2020-21, for the meeting of the Council held 9th January 2020, where it had been agreed to defer any decision to an extra ordinary meeting of the Council. Having considered the figures presented and discussed costs and plans for the forthcoming financial year, it was proposed by ClIr R. Henry, seconded by ClIr S. Haywood, that the Council accept the draft budget and request a precept for the year 2020-21 of £30,000.00. All agreed. The Clerk to request a precept from Malvern Hills DC as agreed.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 8.00 pm. Next ordinary meeting to be held Thursday 6th February 2020 at 7.40 pm.

DRAFT Minutes of a Meeting of the Parish Council held Thursday 6th February 2020 At the Village Hall commencing at 7.40 pm

Present: Councillors J. Bowden (Chairman), R. Henry, A. Henry, S. Haywood, C. Haywood, and J. Collins. Also present: County Cllr K. Pollock, M. Alexander (Clerk) and 14 members of the Public. **Apologies:** Councillor J. Dawson (Vice Chairman), Ward Cllr C. Palethorpe.

Welcome: The Chairman welcomed everyone and reminded everyone that although PC meetings are currently an open forum for discussion, it would be appreciated if questions could be asked at the end of each matter, to enable the Council to fully discuss things.

Declarations of Prejudicial & Pecuniary Interests: None.

The meeting was suspended at this point to allow members of the Public to address the Council: Matters raised at the meeting: Footpaths – a resident raised concern regarding an historical pathway by the bridge at the bottom of the waterworks, where walkers need to cross a ditch. It was noted that the path is in Lower Sapey Parish, but that ClIr Bowden (as Parish Paths Warden) is liaising with Worcs CC about it and will continue to do so. It was also noted that there may be another pathway crossing the same spot, and ClIr Bowden agreed to check the definitive map. Drivers parking their cars at the entrance to Hope Lane are causing visibility problems to other drivers turning at the junction. School children crossing the junction are also placed at risk. County ClIr Pollock explained the options available and it was noted that there are ongoing discussions with Highways. The meeting noted that Footballers are now parking at the church and outside the Lion P.H.

Approval of the Minutes of a Meeting of the Parish Council held 9th January 2020: Proposed by Cllr S. Haywood, seconded by Cllr C. Haywood, that the minutes be agreed and signed as a true record. All agreed.

District & County Councillors Reports: Reports will be uploaded to the PC website. County Cllr Pollock also highlighted the delayed opening of Worcs Parkway Railway Station, the local 'experiment' in 5G connectivity and local Highways concerns raised. Traffic speed concerns at Pound Lane were discussed and it was agreed that the Clerk will raise a 20mph option with Highways, which Cllr Pollock will support. The Clerk read out a report on behalf of Ward Cllr Palethorpe.

Financial & Governance Matters: Payments were approved as per the schedule, proposed by Cllr Bowden, seconded Cllr S. Haywood. All agreed. Receipts were noted as Western Power wayleave payments totalling £71.86. The NALC Code of Conduct for Councillors (revised Dec 2019). Proposed for adoption by Cllr Bowden, seconded Cllr S. Haywood. All agreed.

Clerk to notify MHDC. The Annual Parish Meeting 2020 – the date was agreed as Thursday 21st May 2020. Cllr A. Henry is to send out the invitations to local groups and organisations. The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council was noted as Thursday 7th May 2020.

Parish Matters: White Gates at parish entrances – the Clerk and Cllr S. Haywood are meeting with Highways on 10th Feb to do a site walk. S.106 Community Transport – C. Hurley made a report to the meeting following a recent meeting with Worcs CC Officers. It was agreed that Cllr Bowden should progress the matter on behalf of the PC. The Great British Spring Clean event – Cllr R. Henry was thanked for already undertaking litter picking locally. Cllr A. Henry agreed to organise this event, to be held on 4th April 2020. Clerk to notify MHDC and ask for equipment and litter collection.

Housing Needs Survey Nov 2019: A report had been circulated from MHDC. The Clerk read out a report by J. Wain regarding Community Led Housing, which was noted. The PC is awaiting a response from MHDC to queries raised about local housing development / needs. Cllr S. Haywood explained options being investigated for apartments at the Hope Lane development and it was agreed to allow the CLH Steering Group to progress this matter.

Section 106 Committee update: C. Hurley updated the meeting on the following matters for the s.106 project group – Lots of information gathering currently. Topographic survey on site tomorrow. New project team members were noted. Trim Trail quotes are awaited. User contracts will be required. MHDC s.106 meeting to be arranged. S.106 notices – it was agreed that these can be placed in the new parish notice board. There is now £250-300k potential project spend. Sensory garden to be included in the project plan. Contractors involved to date were noted. A report will be made to the Annual Parish Meeting including a possible timescale.

Planning Matters: Public Path Order – proposed extinguishment of footpaths CT-602, 603, 604 and SW-501, 503,504,505 and SW-506,508 (part),509 and proposed diversion of footpath SW-507 (part). It was agreed unanimously that the PC should write and object strongly to the proposals. Clerk to notify Worcs CC accordingly before 21st March 2020. Notification was received of approval 19/01799/HP Birchfield House, Church Road Clifton-upon-Teme – single storey extension to side and rear. Erection of porch to front.

Highways Matters: It was agreed that ClIr C. Haywood speak to Red Kite pest control regarding moles on the playing field. The gully below the kennels is blocked – Clerk to report to Highways. Further to the PC request there is a speed survey planned for Hope Lane via Highways. Road closures in Pound Lane during February and the school summer holiday were noted.

Correspondence: An email had been received raising concern about road sweepers being used in future developments and causing noise nuisance. A wheel wash would be much preferred. The Clerk was asked to check with MHDC and Ward Cllr Palethorpe about options. The developer could also be approached.

Councillors Reports & Items for Future Agendas: Cllr C. Haywood reported on the installation of the notice board and 'no parking' sign. The Clerk was asked to write and thank NDS Engineering who donated poles and a welding plate. The new storage container has been placed on the pavilion car park as agreed. The old container needs to remain in case it is needed for the s.106 project.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 9.40 pm. Next meeting to be held Thursday 5th March 2020 at 7.40 pm.

SHELSLEY WALSH HILL CLIMB FOOTPATH CLOSURE BID

An application by the Midland Automobile Club (MAC) to permanently close a number of public footpaths at the Shelsley Walsh Hill Climb site, and create instead a shorter, alternative path, has been met with concern.

Reacting to the bid, which Parish Councils received in the second half of January, Clifton Parish councillors have objected 'strongly', and Shelsleys Parish Council is to discuss its response at its next meeting on 10 March.

Under the proposals, MAC plans to cease public access to the entire length of the tarmacked Hill Climb track at any time; a path has long been a public right of way and is currently only closed temporarily on race days. Some other existing footpaths on the Hill Climb site would also close. Instead, MAC is proposing to create an alternative, shorter public footpath towards one side of the site, linking with another existing footpath heading in the Clifton direction.

Shelsley Beauchamp Parish Councillor Karen Metcalfe told Teme Triangle: "If this application goes ahead, we will lose a much-valued, metalled footpath actively used in all conditions by ramblers, dog walkers, wheelchair users and cyclists alike. In pure distance alone we will lose around 2km of path and gain only 500m in its place. This seems unnecessary given that the current temporary closure of the Hill Climb track on race days seems to work perfectly well. We urge locals to come along to our next Shelsleys Parish Council meeting on 10 March to give their views, or to contact our Clerk direct."

General Manager of the Midland Automobile Club, Gary Hall, said: "We are concerned about the health and safety of anyone using the paths when events are taking place."

Church Matters

Surprised by Joy

I first came across this quote in the Inspector Gamache books by Louise Penny as an inscription on a bench in a fictional village in Canada. Characters often sit on the bench at moments of despair and deep sadness and look at the beauty of the village of Three Pines and experience a sense of unexpected joy.

Surprised by joy is also a quote from a sonnet by Wordsworth written soon after the death of his three year old daughter. The sonnet starts with 'Surprised by joy - impatient as the wind' and continues with how he turns to share the moment of joy with his daughter, followed by the guilt he feels, that for a fleeting moment, he had forgotten she had passed away. Joy can come in those sudden unexpected moments, a feeling that can surprise us when not expected, something greater than ourselves and our concerns, a feeling outside ourselves. "Joy is to fun what the deep sea is to a puddle. It's a feeling inside that can hardly be contained." Terry Pratchett.

Surprised by Joy is also the title of C. S. Lewis's autobiography where he describes his reluctant conversion to Christianity. He explains joy as a sudden piercing pang of longing, which he identifies as a deep spiritual hunger for God.

How easy it is to be overwhelmed by everyday concerns such as the constant news items relating to climate warming, the state of the world our children and grandchildren may be living in. However there are also those moments when a sudden unexpected joy touches our life, it might be a view, a birdsong, a flower, a scent, a memory or a kind word or smile that seems to transport us to somewhere outside ourselves. Surprised by joy, is that intense feeling of happiness and hope that can cast a shaft of light through a difficult time.

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope. (Romans 15 verse 13.)
