#### CLIFTON TEENAGER'S ART CHOSEN BY ROYAL ACADEMY

Clifton art student Lois Pearson has had one of her paintings accepted by the Royal Academy for both its London exhibition in October and the on-line RA exhibition.

Eighteen-year-old Lois applied to the Royal Academy's Young Artists Summer Show a few months ago while studying Fine Art at Hereford Sixth form Collage. The painting she submitted was of the old pumping station in Hollybush Lane near Clifton (*see opposite*) and was one of only 400 selected from a total of 17,700 submitted.

"The project I was working on at the time was landscape architecture, therefore I thought the small brick building local to where we live was perfect," said Lois. "It was secluded and captured some beautiful colours and movement. I was very excited to find out that I was not only accepted for the online exhibition but also the on-site exhibition."

She was also chosen as a young artist to be interviewed for the Royal Academy Magazine. "That was a real honour. Over the past weeks I have had an interview and a photoshoot for the magazine which will be published this month while I will be starting the Art Foundation course at Hereford Collage of Arts."

#### HARPLEY CHURCH

Harpley Church and the local community are thankful for the Lower Sapey Centenary Fund for its donations towards the cost of both the coping stone repair and the heating system replacement.

"We see this as an important step forward in making the church more user friendly and more comfortable for worship and functions that take place within the building," says Candy Connolly. "We have been very concerned that the lack of heating would severely restrict any plans for worship or events during the autumn and winter, so now, thanks to the Centenary Fund this is no longer an issue."

#### COMMUNITY SENSORY AND WILDLIFE GARDEN

The Community Sensory and Wildlife Garden will be a major feature of the Four Acre Field Project (*see opposite page*).

In May we had a survey of the whole playing field site carried out by Worcestershire Wildlife Trust to assess existing biodiversity and to recommend enhancements to encourage even more wildlife.

It is amazing to discover how many wildlife species are already inhabiting the playing field and that by making some minor adjustments, such as changes to the grass-cutting regime, sowing wildflower mixes in areas with low footfall and installing bird and bat boxes together with insect hotels, we can vastly increase the attraction of the field to a wide variety of wildlife.

The sensory garden itself will be a major provider of wildlife habitat. In designing the sensory aspects of scent, colour, touch, movement and sound attractive to us humans, we will be using plants which will also be attractive to pollinators and plants whose leaves and stems will provide hunting grounds for invertebrates and small mammals. Also, we will be encouraging birds, hedgehogs, frogs and insects to linger in the garden by installing bird boxes, bug hotels, a stumpery and a hibernacula to provide places where they can shelter. We aim to provide a green corridor for wildlife by linking the garden to existing nearby hedges in the field through sensitive planting and new hedging where appropriate. We are also looking at ways in which we can collect and safely store water to use in the garden. Even though we plan to use as many drought tolerant plants as we can, there will always be those which need a little extra, and water will be needed to help all plants become established after planting.

#### FOUR ACRE FIELD PROJECT UPDATE

In the July edition of *Teme Triangle*, the Four Acre Field Project team provided images of how the new facilities on the field are likely to look. Since then the team has had some very helpful feedback from villagers via messages to cuts106play@gmail.com which has helped them enormously in tweaking the field layout.

The next stage involves sharing their plans in detail via a consultation process which will form part of the Parish Council application to Malvern Hills District Council. Normally such a meeting would be held in the village hall but the Covid restrictions place a huge burden on indoor areas and it would simply not be possible or even fair to the village hall trustees to try and organise something as significant as a village meeting. An outdoor event had also been considered but the current uncertainties in respect of Covid-19 regulations make that an unwise option.

The team is now working on an alternative consultation method whereby a gallery of images will be created – not just those that have been in the Teme Triangle or on the website and notice board – with specific details of the various play items, sports facilities and perimeter path arrangements. They hope to display all these images around the tennis courts (suitably weather proofed!) for perhaps a week. The team will follow up with a survey process involving both an online facility and an "offline option" via postcards and a post box perhaps next to the pavilion.

This will take some organising by the project team and they will do their best to ensure that flyers are delivered to everyone in the village during the next few weeks setting out the specific arrangements.

More information will available early in September via the website, PC notice board and Nextdoor plus, we hope, a leaflet drop to every house.

# Draft Minutes of a Virtual Meeting of Clifton Parish Council held Thursday 2nd July 2020

**Present**: Councillors J. Bowden (Chairman), A. Henry (Vice-Chairman), R. Henry, C. Haywood, J. Dawson, J. Collins & S. Haywood. Also present: County Cllr K. Pollock, M. Alexander (Clerk) and five members of the public.

Apologies: Ward Cllr C. Palethorpe.

**Welcome**: The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting. Clifton Hill Helpers were thanked by the meeting for all their support locally during the CV-19 pandemic. David Moore was thanked for supplying turkeys for the recent roast dinners.

Declarations of Prejudicial & Pecuniary Interests: None.

**Democratic Public Time**: Matters raised by Residents to be considered at the meeting: J. Delahay raised concern regarding the gully which needs to be reinstated following the Meadows development along Pound Lane. County Cllr Pollock agreed to follow this up with the Developer and Highways. Surface water floods the field and causes ice to form across the lane in winter if the water doesn't drain away via the gully.

**Minutes of a virtual meeting held 4th June 2020** were agreed as a true record. Proposed Cllr J. Collins, seconded Cllr S. Haywood. All agreed. No matters arising.

**District & County Councillor Reports**: Reports to be uploaded to the website. Other updates as circulated to Councillors. County Cllr Pollock updated the meeting regarding local issues including flooding work at Tenbury, Covid-19 impact, cycling & walking options being explored as part of LTP4 Policy, Highways works. The Clerk will chase up outstanding works with Highways – white gates, VAS, yellow lines opposite The Lion PH. It was noted that Highways have worked extremely hard in recent months and are now catching up with their programme. The Clerk read out a report from District Cllr Palethorpe and the Young People's Survey was noted for local publicity.

**Financial & Governance Matters**: Payments agreed as per the schedule – Michelle Alexander - Clerk salary £456.47, Michelle Alexander – Clerk salary 456.47 (August payment agreed in advance), Michelle Alexander - Clerks expenses - phone / mileage £48.90, Michelle Alexander – reimbursement for x4 half barrel planters £191.00, Michelle Alexander – Home Office fee Q1 £60.00, HMRC PAYE Q1 £342.40. An extra ordinary meeting will be held on 23rd July to consider the approval of the Annual Accounts & Governance Statement 2019-20 for external audit.

**Parish Matters**: Play Area – a meeting will be held this Saturday to assess risks prior to re-opening (Clerk & Chairman). The purchase of x4 half barrel planters for the village green was retrospectively approved. New waste bins – 1 was considered for outside The Meadows and also 1 at the end of Hill Farm drive. (The bin location at Hill Farm, is awaiting confirmation from MHDC re

collections.) Cllr R. Henry raised concern that the one at The Meadows may not be used and after discussion it was agreed not to purchase a new bin for this location although dog fouling has increased significantly in this area. Cllr Collins agreed to be a 'dog fouling' warden and the Clerk will send details of local schemes. The Clerk will also check with MHDC re enforcement options. Correspondence from R. Neave was noted; the Clerk will respond in due course.

**Section 106 Committee update**: C. Hurley's report had been circulated by email. Information regarding the CFAF project has been included in the Triangle and is on the notice board. The site has been walked and drainage chambers (C) have now been identified with routes located. Wayleave will most probably be in place for C1,2 & 3. There should be no impact on the depth required for the project. Thanks to Bernard Pound for all his help.

**Planning Applications** considered – 20/00815/AGR Cliftonswood Farm, B4204 The Village to Herefordshire, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6EP – agricultural track. No objection, although there are a couple of footpaths which cross the new track and need to be preserved.

**Highways Matters**: The Clerk will liaise with the Lengthsman about outstanding tasks.

**Councillors Reports & Items for Future Agendas**: Cllr C. Haywood raised concern about cars parking on the green at the end of Manor Rd. It was agreed that the land ownership should be checked by the Clerk before action could be taken. It was noted that the existing green container on the pavilion car park was being retained for future use for the CFAF project. Cllr Bowden updated that a footpaths noticeboard was being priced up and a proposal would follow. Cllr S. Haywood updated re recent clearance work at Blue Shot Strip.

#### GARDEN UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Some years ago, Clifton Parochial Church Council purchased a section of land adjacent to the church and behind the Rectory. The intention was for it ultimately to be used as an extension to the church yard. However, it was recently decided that, instead, a garden for the use of everyone would be a better idea. This would mean that all villagers, young and old and indeed visitors have a place to sit and enjoy our beautiful village and countryside.

"Nothing is easy, or cheap, but at least we are underway," said churchwarden Alana Cooper. "We have had consultations with the Worcestershire Wildlife Trust and the Woodland Trust in order to be as nature friendly as possible. The land has been strimmed and will be regularly maintained in preparation for construction. Funding is nearly in place."

The wildlife friendly garden is designed for disabled and pushchair access. Initially this would be via the gate to the side of the church on Sue Roscoe's property until our new disabled access is in place. The plan is to have traditional old varieties of fruit trees, many wildflowers and well scented plants adding a sensory aspect.

If any villagers have ideas for the garden, your input would be gratefully received. These could be left in the porch of the church for the churchwardens. This garden is for the enjoyment of EVERYONE!

**Apologies:** Councillors Bates, Stinton & Metcalfe & DC Palethorpe. No Minutes: The minutes of May 19th 2020 were agreed as a true record.

**County Councillor and District Councillor's reports**: Dr Pollock's report was circulated before the meeting. He reported on the response to the Covid-19 pandemic and the current levels of infection. He also gave an update on the revival of shopping in Tenbury Wells and the road maintenance which WCC has undertaken on quieter roads including the filling of 6,000 potholes. **MAC:** Mr Simon Durling representing the Midland Automobile Club (MAC) reported on the coming events at the Hill Climb. There will be a Members only day on 18th July, events on the 25th/26th July, 8th/9th August, 15th/16th August 29th/30th August, 12th/13th September, 19th/20th September and a Members only meeting 25th September. Due to the current restrictions with regard to social distancing no spectators will currently be allowed to attend any of the above events.

**Progress Reports**: Broadband: Self-Dig project. WCC has been informed of all the landowners involved who will be contacted by Openreach. A survey will be undertaken by Openreach to establish costs. If the cost is acceptable vouchers will be applied for to cover the self-dig projects. The Parish Council wishes to thank Sara Harris, Anthony Champion and Tony Taylor for their help as well as members of the Parish Council and the clerk for their input in identifying the relevant properties and landowners.

**Waste Bin**: Due to Covid-19 the Glasdon bin agreed on could not be ordered but will be delivered shortly. Councillor Stinton has agreed to install it in the lay bye opposite the Stirt Farm.

**Councillors' Reports and items for future agenda**: Councillors are finding Zoom meetings difficult due to the poor broadband speeds and restricted time

allowed. Not all councillors are able to access Zoom. It is hoped to be able to resume meetings in the Village Hall in future. The Chairman thanked councillors for their patience.

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#### TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE

In May I wrote about the wildflower charity Plantlife's 'No mow May' campaign, which was aimed at providing extra nectar for pollinating insects. I was therefore very pleased to see the following headline in my daily newspaper in June, 'Orchids blossom like never before as shaggy lawns enjoy record sun'. Two photographs accompanied the article, one was of a jolly scarecrow holding a 'No mow May' placard and the other showed a brightly coloured orchid. The orchid depicted was unfortunately a tropical moth-orchid, a variety highly unlikely to have pitched up on anybody's lawn, but the thought was clearly there.

Trevor Dines of Plantlife was quoted in the article and he explained that the combination of a mild winter and a warm and sunny spring had brought a bumper crop of bee orchids to people's lawns. Bee orchids are happiest in their stronghold habitats in warm Mediterranean countries, but 626 hours of bright sunshine in the spring of 2020, a record three-month total for the UK, helped them on their way here in Britain. The scarecrow, dubbed by Plantlife the 'scaremow', was an idea thought up by the charity to encourage children to enjoy creating something that might deter their parents from getting the mower out of the shed – a bit of fun that clearly worked.

I had a go with no-mowing this year too, but for quite a different reason. I was motivated by a garden visit last year to the Sussex home of early twentieth century gardening journalist William Robinson. He wrote a very influential gardening book called *The Wild Garden* in which he advocated growing bulbs through grass. Inspired by his ideas, I set to last autumn to plant a selection of cultivated bulbs including crocus, fritillary, star of Bethlehem, Tenby daffodil, Poet's narcissus and camassia into circular patches of my grass. Unable to mow until the bulb foliage had died down, I had my own no-mow experiment and found buttercups, daisies, lady's smock, common catsear and common mouse-ear flowering in the grass between my non-native flowers.

I had not grown the Tenby daffodil before and found it very good. It differs from the usual wild daffodil, which is a two-tone flower, by having the crown and trumpet both of the same bright golden yellow. It traditionally grew wild in the Tenby area and in surrounding parts of Pembrokeshire, though no-one knew where it had come from, nor why it grew nowhere else. It became popular in the Victorian era as a garden plant and thousands of bulbs were dug up to satisfy demand from gardeners. By the 1940s only a few fields in the area had abundant flowers remaining.

In the 1970s there was fortunately a revival of interest in the plant, after a chance enquiry at the local tourist office from a visitor keen to buy Tenby daffodils to take home. Spotting a marketing opportunity, Tenby decided to plant up its public spaces with its own unique daffodil, both for a beautiful spring display, and to capitalise on a local botanical treasure. Its survival was then ensured.

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group is on hold whilst we await the re-opening of our venue. Our meetings are usually held at Stoke Bliss and Kyre village hall, WR15 8RR, at 7:30pm. It is just £2 on the door and everybody is most welcome.
