Greta Sparey of Mill Farm, Stanford, has raised more than £3,500 for the Changing Lives Through Horses programme after taking part in a British Horse Society Charity Race at Newbury last month.

Greta, who suffered serious injuries as a result of being kicked by a horse in 2017, had first to pass a gruelling fitness test, raise at least $\pounds 2,500$ and find a

racehorse before even being considered eligible to take part in the race. She was able to achieve all three goals thanks to Mark and Clare Loughnane of DML Racing at Rock who provided Broughton's Flare as her ride.

"The actual race was a bit of a blur as it all happened so fast," said Greta who managed to finish in third place. Afterwards she was presented with a bottle of champagne by HRH Princess Anne (*right*). "I was so lucky to have the support of my amazing family, friends and loyal supporters".

Notes of a meeting of Clifton Parish Council held on Thursday 4th November 2021



Present: Councillors J. Bowden (Chairman), A. Henry (Vice-Chairman). Also present: County Councillor D. Chambers and six members of the public. **Apologies for absence**: Councillor R. Henry, J. Collins, B. Gilbert and District Cllr C. Palethorpe. The Clerk informed the meeting that it was not quorate and as such no decisions could be made.

Declarations of Interests and applications for Councillor dispensations: None.

Democratic Public Time: The meeting discussed the recent work undertaken to the Horse Chestnut tree and noted that the school children will be planting conkers from the tree to try and grow saplings for the future. The PC will be laying a poppy wreath for Remembrance Sunday this year and it was noted that it will be laid on the war grave in the churchyard on 11th November.

The Clerk was asked to contact Lovells and ask for their sales signage to be removed around the area.

To agree the Minutes of a virtual meeting of 14th October 2021 – The minutes were not able to be agreed as the meeting was not quorate. Deferred to the next agenda.

District & County Councillor Reports: Reports were read to the meeting and will be uploaded to the website. County Cllr Chambers reported on a recent WCC Highways walkabout including an update about recent requests for works to be carried out. The Clerk was asked to contact WCC Highways about the possibility of having a 20mph zone through the village. Also to report the broken slabs in the new dropped kerbs. The meeting noted recent concerns regarding road closures which Councillor Chambers has taken up with Highways. The meeting also noted the need to look to the future regarding electric vehicle charging options.

Financial & Governance Matters: Essential payments were made as per the schedule circulated but will be approved retrospectively at the next meeting. The new defibrillator is to be purchased as agreed via the Clerk. Cllr A. Henry has found a local Trainer. The meeting noted that a further defibrillator may be required at the village hall in the future. The Clerk was asked to look into costs for repainting the BT kiosk. The pavilion boiler is not working, and Cllr Bowden agreed to look into costs for repair.

Parish Matters / Updates: Village Maintenance Plan – Cllr Bowden gave an update about works completed and those still planned. The old village pump and tree seat have been repainted. Tree works are ongoing and hanging baskets have been removed for replanting in the spring. Cllr Bowden to look at the overgrown hedges in Manor Rd. Archives refurbishment: Skellerns are still to produce the door and Cllr Bowden is to chase this up. J. Johns is liaising with Cllr Bowden re items required for the archives store.

Section 106 Matters: Four Acre Field (CFAF) Project – the Clerk updated the meeting regarding the Land Registry application to be made. The surveyor drawing has been completed -thanks to Grimshaws for their help with this. A project review meeting is to be arranged shortly. Work has started on the bowling green renovation.

Planning Matters: There were no applications for consideration.

Strategic Planning Matters: Cllr Gilbert will monitor and notify the Council of any matters which require attention.

Highways & Facilities Matters: Lengthsman tasks – leaves to be swept up through the village.

85.21.02 Road closure notices – none, although the meeting noted that these are still not being received consistently from Highways. County Cllr Chambers will take up this matter if the Clerk writes formally.

Councillors Reports & Items for Future Agendas: Cllr A. Henry is to decorate a Xmas tree for the PC for the Xmas Coffee Morning. Carols on the Green are being arranged for 17th Dec at 7pm.

Correspondence received: Worcs CALC AGM to be held Tues 16th Nov at 6.30pm – Clerk to attend.

CLIFTON'S HORSE CHESTNUT TREE

The Parish Council is responsible for several parcels of land within the village and the trees that grow upon them and is mandated to keep them safe and well managed. We have recently arranged for a tree surgeon to carry out an inspection of all our trees and to recommend a schedule of remedial and monitoring work as required.

Perhaps the most iconic tree is the Horse Chestnut tree that stands at the junction with Hope Lane and we have recently reduced the



canopy to allow for better vision of that junction and the road signs and removed the old wire netting beneath the tree which had been identified as a trip hazard and replaced it with gravel which will allow for more rain to penetrate to its roots.

It still requires some more work to reduce the canopy by about 15% to reduce the weight load and to eliminate branches rubbing against each other. The tree is described as being in moderate condition and this work will improve both its health and longevity.

She gains confidence in being herself. Quotes from scripture affirm that God knows each of us, and He is with us always. The simple story set in the woodland helps inspire self-confidence and fosters an awareness of UK wildlife. The characters and illustrations in the story are from UK wildlife and the book includes a small section of 'Nature Notes' for parents to read and share with their children. Three illustrated plates with scripture throw God's perspective on the story and affirm God's love for us.

Ann is passionate about wildlife and the environment. She has a degree in Zoology and started her working life in the natural history section of a museum, later training as a teacher of Lower School Science and 'A' Level Biology. After having her own children, she worked for many years at an Environmental Centre teaching sections of the National Curriculum in the outdoors, mainly to primary-aged children where she became involved in the tradition of oral



storytelling. At home, Ann enjoys walking in the countryside with her dog, being in her garden, reading, and stories!

ULTRAFAST BROADBAND COMES TO CLIFTON HILL

An initiative by Clifton residents John Winer and Chris Hurley started two years ago to bring superfast broadband to households on Clifton Hill and the Old Road has resulted in residents and businesses in the area now being invited to sign up to the scheme

September 2019 John Winer and Chris Hurley attended a County Hall event where they asked if it would be possible to create a project centred around the Old Road which could qualify for 'fibre to the property' (fttp) under the government sponsored Rural Gigabit Scheme. With the support of County Hall, the government sponsored Rural Gigabit Scheme's geography was widened to include other properties on Clifton Hill as far as Noak Farm and Ayngstree.

Much discussion took place with Openreach throughout 2020, which benefitted from the invaluable support of Rob Stepniewski, Senior Project Manager at County Hall. It led to an agreement that a scheme would be possible for the wider group. A Community Interest Company was then created, with the involvement of John, Chris, Catherine Prendezis at Ayngstree and Ricky Martire on the Old Road, so that the project team could sign a contract with Openreach in order to give just under fifty properties the opportunity to have ultrafast broadband.

Lots of paperwork involving the Department of Culture Media and Sport (which actually was very straightforward) led to agreement that between November 2020 and November 2021 Openreach would install the necessary equipment for every property in the project to have the best broadband available, whether business or residential. Such broadband speeds could be as high as one gigabit per second!

Work started in September, requiring road closures on Clifton Hill to enable Openreach to carry out fairly tricky installations which led to some villagers suffering inconvenience.

As *Teme Triangle* goes to press, residents who are part of the scheme are now being given the opportunity to sign up to ultrafast broadband via a number of alternative providers to enjoy the speeds that so many other communities benefit from. Businesses within the scheme, including Pitlands Farm, Appletree Kitchen and Clifton Engineering will also be major beneficiaries of the much faster broadband.

Thanks should go particularly to John Winer who has led the project and ensured compliance with the many challenging arrangements required by the government offices and Openreach.

Church Matters by Rev Jen Denniston

Advent is coming near. We'll see wreaths decorating front doors and hear carols on the radio and in the shops - signs that Christmas is coming.

There are eco-wreathmaking workshops taking place locally. They're partly spurred on by COP26 and the climate crisis, and partly to remind us to

be sustainable, environmentally friendly eco-churches - using locally sourced flowers and greenery in church and churchyard arrangements. Neil Sparey has designed and made reusable steel bases for wreath-making, incorporating candle holders.

In eco-friendly Advent wreaths, one ingredient is holly. The familiar traditional carol, The Holly and the Ivy, tells us the reason for the Christmas season.

Firstly, holly blossom reminds us of the baby Jesus, and the hope and promise of new life that he offers.

Then the dark prickly leaves, 'as sharp as any thorn', bring to mind the crown of thorns pressed onto Jesus' head on the Cross. Holly prickles remind us that our lives are sometimes tricky, painful and challenging. Our path may be tough and thorny, but God knows our difficulties and is always with us, whatever the situation.

And bright red holly berries are like drops of blood. The lyrics of the carol remind us that Jesus, on the first Good Friday, shed his blood and died to forgive our sins.

So, put very simply... the reason for the Season is... Jesus.

As you reflect on the year past and go forward into the New Year... however bright or thorny the past year has been, and whatever the journey ahead may bring, may God's love surround you and support you, the light of Christ guide you, and the Spirit of Jesus give you and those you love; these three things this Christmas and into 2022... Hope, Peace and Joy.

WEST WORCESTERSHIRE RURAL TEAM UPDATE

Following the retirement of Canon Rev David Sherwin, whom we wish all the very best, the Diocese of Worcester will embark on a process, under the guidance of Archdeacon Robert Jones. This will entail looking at the clergy/ parish structure of the (WWRT) benefice and the potential to pay ministry share with a view to appointing another stipendiary priest.

Since the retirement of Rev John Sumner, the House for Duty priest based in Clifton some five years ago, the benefice has had two (paid) clergy, each with their own responsibilities within the WWRT.

The process to replace David will take some months, by the time Churchwardens and PCCs have been consulted; the relevant diocesan officers along with the Bishop have decided the best way forward; the post is advertised; interviews carried out leading, God willing, to an appointment.

Within the WWRT we are blessed to have four clergy and two readers, alongside seven authorised lay ministers, who give of their time voluntarily. Without them, and the hard work of so many laity, our parish churches would not be sustainable and to whom I shall be turning to support the mission and ministry across the benefice over the coming months until, all being well, David's successor is licensed.

As we enter the season of advent, the beginning of our Christian calendar and that time of preparation for Christmas, when we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, our Saviour, who came as the light in the darkness, let us pray, together, for the parishes within the WWRT benefice, and especially Harpley, Clifton and Shelsley.

Wishing everyone a blessed Christmas filled with the love of Christ and a peaceful New Year.

Abbreviated Draft Minutes of the Shelsleys Parish Council Meeting held on November 16th 2021

Present: Mrs Karen Metcalfe (Chair), Mrs Jean Hammond, Mrs Louise Hutton, Mr David Bates, Mrs Val Jones and Mr Robert Pound. In Attendance: three members of the public and the Clerk.

Apologies: Dr Laura Taylor, Mr David Styles and Mr John Stinton. County Councillor David Chambers and District Councillor Palethorpe. Declarations of Interest: None. **Minutes**: The minutes of September 14th 2021 were agreed as a true record.

Midland Automobile Club: Two members of the MAC outlined the proposals for events next year. They confirmed that neither Supercar Fest or Retro Rides will be returning. Of the 30 days allocated 16 (eight weekends) will be for competition events, nine days for private hire, two members' days and three for the driving school. May 22nd will be The Saint Andrew's Challenge. There will be a donation from the proceeds to the church and local businesses will be able to have a stand at the event at no charge. A request to Worcester County Council to close the footpath on competition and event days will be made for forty days in 2022 although only thirty of them will be used. This is to allow flexibility in case of changes in event dates. The residents' liaison group meetings will take place between Parish Council Meetings. The MAC is currently considering installing a children's play area in the spectator's car park. Noggin and Natter will be held in the courtyard on the first Thursday of each month, the next is on December 4th and although predominantly for MAC members and competitors it is also open to local residents.

Village Hall: The possibility of placing large recycling containers at the Village Hall was discussed. Local views will be sought before proceeding. The purchase of a defibrillator at the Village Hall will be investigated.

Play Area and Equipment: A play area on land adjoining the Village Hall was discussed. It was agreed that more public consultation is required to assess the possible usage.

Great Witley Parish Council will be asked for advice. A playground could be considered as part of the 2022 Jubilee celebration.

Highways: The Lengthsman's worksheets were inspected and agreed. Information on the Lengthsman's duties and the codes on the worksheets will be distributed to members. Proposed lane side bench in Shelsley Kings is still awaiting a reply from the Liaison Engineer.

WCC will be contacted to assess the possibility of positioning two grit bins each in both Pudford Lane and Camp Lane.

Dates of 2022 meetings: January 11, March 8, May 10, July 12, September 13, November 8 2022.

Planning: 21/02047/HP and 21/02048/LB The Old Post Office Shelsley Walsh. Permanent access, access gates and entrance driveway. Councillors recommended approval.

Broadband: WCC to be contacted for an update on voucher progress. Councillors' Reports and items for future agenda. A working party for the Jubilee celebrations will be convened. Playground, tree planting and mugs for the parish children will be considered. Report at the January meeting.
