MILL FARM SHOPS THANK SUPPORTERS AFTER BREAK-IN

Shop owners at Stanford Bridge's Mill Farm Country Retail have thanked customers and the police for their support following an overnight break-in that affected its lockdown-essential retailers in the early hours of Monday 29 March.

Stanford Farms co-owner Greta Sparey explained: "Two males were captured on CCTV breaking into Angel Gardens. They were highly masked and covered up so very hard to identify, although the sound camera did allow us to hear that they both had strong Liverpudlian accents. They also broke in to Baileys Farm Shop and Tasty Meats. The intruders got away with some cash, but luckily didn't cause untold damage beyond forcing entry. It is disappointing, but luckily no one was hurt. The police were extremely helpful and sent forensics out within the hour, as well as visiting us the next day."

Within hours of the CCTV footage being shared on social media, customers were getting in touch and back in the shops. "We'd all like to say a huge thank you to everyone who has shown their support following the incident," said Angel Gardens owner Louise Mawditt. LION INN ADDS NEW AL FRESCO AREA

A specially constructed, timber-framed 'outdoor inn' awaited customers returning to The Lion Inn in Clifton on 12 April, when pubs and restaurants were permitted to reopen for al fresco business after the latest lockdown. The fully lit, openair seating area includes a 4m long bar and accommodates 30 people at 6-seater picnic tables. It was built in the Lion Inn's car park by Tim Lawson, whose company Magic Bars provides licensed mobile bar services across the region; assisted by landlords Andrea Bennett and Simon Baxter plus several willing helpers.

Within its first week of re-opening, the initiative attracted dozens of customers keen to go out for a drink or meal again. Andrea said: "We did it! We would not have been ready for mid-April without the enormous effort from Tim Lawson and everyone else who helped him. It was great to see lots of familiar faces. Hopefully we'll see many more in the coming weeks." Clifton residents Andrea and Simon took over the tenancy of The Lion Inn last October, under owner John Fletcher. Emphasising local produce and local businesses, they offer breakfast, bar snacks and light lunches, as well as evening meals on Thursday, Friday and Saturday plus Sunday lunch.

WARM WELCOME AT SHELSLEY SOCIAL CLUB

Shelsley Social Club added a large new awning over its rear outdoor patio, ready to welcome customers back for drinks and food in April. Providing a central social hub for residents in Shelsley Beauchamp, Shelsley Kings and Shelsley Walsh, the Club forms part of the Shelsleys Village Hall and is open on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 6pm as well as Sundays from 3pm.

On behalf of the Village Hall Committee, Dave Bates confirmed: "We invite everyone to come and sit on our patio and enjoy a glass or two of our finest ales. We'd also like to take this opportunity to thank all of our customers who continued to support us during lockdown by ordering our takeaways. It was very much appreciated. Going forward we will continue to serve food from our menu as well as from our occasional specials board."

20 years ago





CLIFTON-UPON-TEME PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT Minutes of a virtual meeting of the Parish Council held Thursday 1st April 2021 commencing at 7.30pm

Present: Councillors J. Bowden (Chairman), A. Henry (Vice-Chairman), R. Henry, C. Haywood, J. Collins and B. Gilbert. Also present: County Cllr K. Pollock, and J. Johns.

Welcome: The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked the Clifton Hill Helpers for their continued support to the community.

Apologies: Councillors District Cllr C. Palethorpe.

Declarations of Prejudicial & Pecuniary Interests / Councillor Dispensations: None.

Democratic Public Time: No matters for consideration.

To agree the Minutes of a virtual meeting held 4th March 2021 – The minutes were agreed as a true record with the amendment that the report for the archive was tabled by Cllr Bowden, not Cllr Gilbert. Proposed Cllr Gilbert, seconded Cllr A. Henry. All agreed.

District & County Councillor Reports: Reports to be uploaded to the website as circulated.

Cllr Palethorpe's report was read out to the meeting by the Clerk.

Cllr Pollock reported verbally on the following matters — Covid-19 update for the County, Central Government pledge for additional bus provision, updates on plans for additional road and rail infrastructure, encouragement for shopping locally and pavement / outdoor eating, County elections update for May 6th – the Parish Council thanked Cllr Pollock for everything that he has done for the local area during his time in office.

Financial & Governance Matters: Payments were approved as per the schedule circulated. The Scout & Guide peppercorn rental payment for the next 5 years was also noted. Village Maintenance Plan – Cllr Gilbert had circulated a report prior to the meeting together with quotations for proposed expenditure on hanging baskets, planters, plants and seasonal maintenance. Cllr R. Henry clarified some of the work proposed based on quotations received. It was proposed by Cllr Gilbert, seconded by Cllr Bowden that the expenditure be made from the £5k agreed budget line, all agreed. Football / Bowls Club Agreements - Cllr Bowden reported that he has spoken to MHDC about the financial aspects / charging after s106 work is completed. The Football Club agreement can remain as is, and the Bowls Club need to offer 'open days' during the year whereby anyone can play. This satisfies the agreement with MHDC s.106 funding, and the Bowls Club are happy to do this. The work to the bowls green has already been approved by this PC, and the Club have agreed that work can commence in Sept after the season closes. There may also be a need to address future maintenance of the bowls green once work has been completed, to ensure that the standard is maintained, and therefore encourage new users. The PC will need to look at this in due course with the Bowls Club and the contractor. Church Clock - Cllr Bowden agreed to defer this item to the next meeting to enable the Clerk to clarify the funding position on church property.

The Annual Parish Meeting is to be held on 6th May 2021 at 7pm prior to the PC meeting on the same evening. This will be a virtual meeting. It would be good to launch the new website at the same time. It was noted that 'in person' meetings will need to resume from 7th May onwards in line with Government regulations and with suitable risks assessed. The PC may look to hold another 'parish meeting' later in the year. Clerk to promote the APM via Teme Triangle, website, notice boards and social media

Parish Matters: Village Archives storage refurbishment – it was agreed by all that this can now proceed as per the previous proposal circulated. Work to be undertaken during the last week in April. Village tree survey – Cllr Gilbert is liaising with a local contractor to undertake a survey.

Parish Tree Warden – it was agreed that Cllr Haywood would undertake this role. Parish website – the Clerk continues to progress this with B. Higgins, and all were asked to send in outstanding Cllr photos please as they are needed before the site can go live.

Section 106 Matters: Four Acre Field Project – the Clerk and Project Manager have met with key contractors about how the project will be managed on site. Some slight variations to the original scheme need to be quoted, including stabilising the retaining wall alongside the bowling green and tennis court and additional ways to dispose of spoil. The Clerk continues to progress land ownership matters with MHDC legal team. This has also been delayed due to restricted access to The Hive archive. The Council noted that until land ownership has been proven as required, work cannot start on the scheme as funding cannot be drawn down. It was agreed that a separate online bank account should be set up for s.106 funds to be managed more easily – Clerk to progress in line with financial regulations. It was also agreed that this may be a more effective way of managing all PC funds in the future, subject to formal agreement by the Council.

Sensory Garden – Cllr Gilbert updated the meeting regarding the agreed location of the garden, which will be located as originally planned but now 4m away from the fence line of the houses. The alternate area to the side of the pavilion cannot be used due to high voltage electrical cabling and the need to retain the area in case we ever need to expand the car park. A slightly different canopy for the garden is also planned. Cllr Gilbert to meet with local garden designer shortly.

RoSPA Play Equipment report – the Council noted the report and also agreed to relocate the current basket swing within the new play area as it has been deemed safe to use in the future. Clerk to speak to contractors re a possible new location and how it could be moved from the current position where the sensory garden will be located.

Planning Matters: 21/00514/AGR – New Inn Farm, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6DR – prior notification for a proposed agricultural building for storage of hay and straw (reply 2/4 – no objection). Decision notice – approval for two and single storey extensions, internal alterations and new porch at Highgate House, 36 The Village, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6DH

Strategic Planning Matters: Cllr Gilbert will monitor and notify the Council of any matters which require attention.

Highways Matters: Cllr Bowden to liaise with R. Wilks about erecting the footpaths notice board. Highways have swept the roads recently. A virtual meeting is to be set up with Highways Liaison for the village maintenance plan – Clerk progressing.

Parish Lengthsman – the new vas is on order awaiting parts. Two older vas are now with the Clerk who will liaise with Wescotec about repair / new batteries.

The option to link footways within the village (Hope Lane to Pound Lane) – Cllr Bowden to continue to look at options. Clerk to send Cllr Bowden some further information on the proposal.

Road closure notices - as circulated. Footpath closure notices - these are still not being received from WCC. Clerk and Cllr Bowden to ask again for them to be set through to the PC. The proposed dates for Shelsley Walsh Hillclimb were noted.

Councillors Reports & Items for Future Agendas: Cllr Gilbert asked about removing out of date Developer signage in the parish. Cllr Bowden asked about the application process for creating Assets of Community Value within the parish – options to be explored and brought to a future agenda.

Next virtual meeting to be held Thursday 6th May 2021 by Zoom invitation.

Meeting closed 20:50.

Congratulations to all involved with the *Teme Triangle* on its 20th birthday! I have seen other parish magazines and newsletters and our own compares more than favourably with most.

We are living in such strange times at present that it's often difficult to remember normality, but some events from the past stand out in our area.

We had many fetes, some boot sales, lunches, Christmas walks, but now, partly due to our increasing ages and lack of communal facilities, we are more restricted. How could they do this as there are 24 listed buildings in this small area? However, our agent will keep trying and look into other funds.

The repairs to the Church will be started in early summer and then we can start using it again. Until then, Zoom services will continue and if we have fine weather, we can gather outside.

We are holding a Plant Share and Swop Fair on 22 May between 11 and 2 and will be serving tea and cake as well. The proceeds will be shared between St Bartholomew's Church and Christian Aid. There will be beans, cucumbers, tomatoes, all manner of plants available. There will also be a Gardeners' Question Time hosted by a local leading vegetable grower. As well as all this, there will be a demonstration of sustainable Church flowers and a Churchyard fact-finding and collecting talk.

Church Matters

I wonder if you like me found the news of the death of Prince Philip, whilst not a surprise with his ailing health, was still a great sadness. The loss of such an influential person that most of us have grown up with, has caused us to reflect, on his life, achievements and influence, and what made him the man he was.

Whilst I never met Prince Philip in person, I did, like many undertake the 'Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme', however only reaching bronze level. Like many, who have said how much the scheme affected them, it had an effect upon me too. Giving me confidence, helping in making friendships and enabled me to undertake things I may never have done without the challenges the award presented.

Rightfully there have been thousands of tributes made to the Prince, but the most significant were given a few years ago by his loving wife, the Queen, who praised him at their Golden wedding celebrations saying that; "He has, quite simply, been my strength and stay all these years, and I, and his whole family, and this and many other countries, owe him a debt greater than he would ever claim, or we shall ever know."

The one word that stood out from the thousands of tributes that came from world leaders and the general public was that of 'Service'. He was a man who served our nation, the Commonwealth and beyond. Affecting people's lives for the better.

It would seem that he took the words of the one in whom his faith lay very seriously. Being a committed Christian he would have known the words of Jesus, that true greatness is not found in your position in life nor through privilege but rather through serving those around you, whoever they are.

Both he and our Queen have shown that sacrificial devotion to our nation and beyond throughout their lives. No-one is saying that Prince Philip was perfect, none of us are, but he strove to make the world a better place for all. May Prince Philip rest in peace, and may we live in peace with one another day by day. God bless.

PARISHES PAY TRIBUTE TO HRH THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH 1921-2021



The thoughts and condolences of the Teme Triangle team go out to Her Majesty The Queen and the Royal Family following the sad news of the death his Royal Highness The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh on 9 April, age 99.


In our parishes, prayers were offered by Team Rector Rev Canon David Sherwin (see also page 32) and the flags at St. Bartholomew's, Harpley; St. Kenelm's, Clifton and St. Peter's, Martley were flown at half-mast until the day after the Prince's funeral. Bells were rung where feasible, and the Church of England opened an online condolence book enabling people to submit messages (www.churchofengland.org/remembering-his-royal-highness-prince-philip).

Harriet Baldwin, MP for West Worcestershire wrote on her website: "I was greatly saddened to learn of the passing of HRH the Duke of Edinburgh. He has been a steadfast supporter of the Queen and has given a lifetime of service to this country for which we are truly grateful."

One local resident with a personal perspective is Clifton floral designer Shane Connolly, whose work has enhanced many Royal events. Shane explained: "Early on in my business, I was asked to do flowers for a Duke of Edinburgh dinner at St James's Palace. I was completely overwhelmed. But the friendly team I met with from the charity appeared to trust me and encouraged me to be creative and inventive with the brief. Afterwards they were so appreciative of everything I'd done. The commissions continued and this wonderful association remained loyal and supportive of my fledgling business and even awarded me a Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award. I think this was the

easiest DofE award ever won, and I feel so unworthy of it – but it gave me a huge boost of confidence and made me feel valued and worthwhile, which is exactly what these Awards are meant to do.

"My work with them led directly and indirectly to so many other things for which I am eternally grateful, humbled and astonished, including the weddings of HRH The Prince of Wales and The Duchess of Cornwall and HRH The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge. My story is a tiny part of the legacy of HRH The Duke of Edinburgh. He believed that mighty oaks could indeed grow from tiny acorns. And, in an age of narcissism and self-obsession, he remained an unflinching example of loyalty, service and duty. His Awards continue to encourage and develop those same qualities in the next generations."

Shelsley Beauchamp resident and former High Sheriff of Worcestershire Sir Anthony Winnington once met The Duke of Edinburgh at an anniversary lunch at London's Naval & Military Club (of which the Prince was President) in St James's Square in the late 1990s. Anthony also remembers Prince Philip dancing at a party after the wedding of Prince Charles and Lady Diana Spencer, wearing a party hat!

Jane Roberts. also from Shelsley Beauchamp, had an interesting family connection. She confirmed: "My mother's cousin Henrietta was married to Bishop Robin Woods. Dean of Windsor from 1962-1971 and Bishop of Worcester from 1971-1982. A good friend of the family, he is fondly remembered for conducted my sister Gilly's marriage service back in 1994. Bishop Woods is credited with encouraging Prince Philip in his personal faith and belief in the Church, as mentioned in Prince Philip's obituary and brought to many through an episode of The Crown. Bishop Woods became one of Prince Philip's closest confidants... and in his autobiography mentions that he 'came to expect critical but always constructive - comments from Prince Philip' after preaching his sermons to the Queen at Windsor!"


A prayer of thanks and for comfort for the Queen and their family, from Rev Canon David Sherwin:
