# JENNIFER'S SKY DIVE FOR ST RICHARD'S HOSPICE

Jennifer Goddard, from Clifton-upon-Teme, is planning a sky dive in August to raise money for St Richard's Hospice after spending a year working as a nurse on a Covid ward.

"I started off as a qualified nutritionist but retrained as a nurse in 2016, qualifying in 2019. I love being active and have trained in martial arts karate for around 19 years achieving black belt 3rd Dan. I have competed nationally and internationally however the thought of jumping out of a plane from 10,000ft, falling through the air at 120mph and free falling 5,000 ft before opening a parachute is a scary one... So please help me raise money!

Only one year after qualifying as a nurse I found myself working on the Covid ward in Hereford County Hospital. This brought its challenges. Working with very ill Covid patients, when families were unable to visit due to infection control reasons, meant I had to be there for them as much as possible. Holding their hand, speaking comforting words and showing compassion whilst they took their last breath felt both a privilege and an emotional burden.

Support for both families and patients is so important. To allow families time together we had to become more creative. We introduced



the use of video calls on the ward so patients could see family members and talk with them if they were still able. It was great to help people recover and be discharged back to their families, but heart breaking to see other patients die so quickly without loved ones present. This made me feel helpless, even though we made sure we were there for them as much as we could.

That experience increased my passion for palliative care and at the beginning of this year I was delighted to get the post as Community Senior Staff Nurse with the Clinical Nurse Specialist team at St Richard's Hospice which cares for adults with a serious progressive illness;

improving their quality of life from diagnosis, during treatment and to their last days. They also support patients' loved ones - something I believe is so important.

It is great to be able to work with St Richard's Hospice and offer patients and their families the support and care they need, enabling them to live as full a life as possible together. As a Community Palliative Care Nurse I visit patients and their families at home, offering complex symptom

management and emotional support. Despite Covid, all my normal care and services have continued for my patients, albeit in a slightly different way to normal. I love my job and find it very fulfilling.

It is only through funding that St Richard's Hospice is able to offer the care it does, which is why I've decided to do the sky dive on 21st August to help raise more funds. I'm looking forward to the jump but with trepidation....

### HENRY CARPENTER'S FUND-RAISING AWARD

15-year-old Henry Carpenter whose fund-raising efforts for the Midlands Air Ambulance following a freak accident last year were featured in the April issue of *Teme Triangle*, has now raised more than £10,000.

Henry suffered severe injuries while operating a tractor at his home, Yearston Court Farm, Upper Sapey, and was treated by the Air Ambulance crew before being taken to hospital. While still recovering from his injuries and relying on crutches to walk, he completed 54 miles on foot in 30 days as part of the Air30 Airbase fund-raising challenge earlier this year.

Last month he was presented with a Pride of Birmingham Young Fundraiser Award for his efforts on behalf of the Midland Air Ambulance.

The award was presented to him in person by Bridgerton actress Claudia Jessie and accompanied by a special message from Jodie Whittaker. Henry will now be put forward to the judging process for the *Daily Mirror* Pride of Britain Awards which will be screened on ITV in the autumn.




"I'm still in shock," said Henry after his presentation. "I'm not sure why I got the award. All I wanted to do was say thank you to the Air Ambulance for saving my life. It's been an amazing experience to see what goes on behind the scenes when making a programme like that. It was also very emotional being reunited with the crew that literally saved me'

Henry is due to have his operation in July to replace his hip. He will then set his sights on further challenges to raise some more funds for this amazing organisation.

#### TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE

June is the month when two of my favourite flower scents can be enjoyed. One is a garden plant, the other a wildflower. The garden plant is Philadelphus, also known as "mock-orange", which I have grown in my garden since first encountering it years ago in the grounds of Powys Castle. I went there on a warm sunny day and as I descended a slight slope a beautiful perfume reached me before I could see where it came from. I can't recall whether the shrub



was labelled or whether I enquired from a gardener, but it was called Philadelphus "Belle Etoile". I planted one. The flowers are short-lived, but the scent so good that it really doesn't matter.

A couple of years ago I decided to plant another and chose a variety called "Starbright". The nursery catalogue assured me that it was a new type which would flower a month later than the others. Looking to extend the season of lovely perfume, I ordered one, only to see it come into flower a few days before "Belle Etoile", a lesson not to believe everything I read in catalogues. Genuine orange blossom smells divine too, and I have been lucky to enjoy it in sunnier climes where it blooms rather incongruously whilst the oranges are still on the plant. Sadly it is too cold for to grow it here.

The other June scent is more noticeable in the evenings than in the daytime because it is designed to attract late-flying pollinators. It is the familiar honeysuckle, which flowers for much longer than the cultivated mock orange and although it is a woodland climber is often to be found in hedges. I usually pick some from my hedge to bring into the house. Often called woodbine it inspired this description from 1562. "Oh, how sweet and pleasant is Woodbine, in woods and arbours, after a tender, soft rain; and how friendly do this herb, if I may so name it, embrace the bodies, arms and branches of trees, with his long winding stalks, and tender leaves, opening or spreading forth his sweet lilies, like ladies fingers, among the thorns or bushes".

Cultivated forms of honeysuckle are popular too, although I'm sure I've read somewhere that one of the most scented forms available was spotted by a plantsman growing wild in a Herefordshire hedge. I've ordered a dwarf form to try in a pot this year, what's the betting it will turn out to be ten foot tall?

Other wildflowers don't seem to smell so strongly. Bluebells en masse are lovely but the day has to be warm for the scent to lift up and be noticeable. My neighbour loves the scent of sweet violets that grow in our lane, but even on hands and knees I never seem to be able to detect it. Our native daphne, the spurge laurel that grows in Teme valley woods, is pleasant, but rather faint. The dog rose, another flower for June, has a lovely smell but you have to reach right up to appreciate it. The beauty of honeysuckle is that the scent is sweet and strong and wafts in the air at head height. It arrests your attention, you don't need to go looking for it.



#### **CLIFTON ANNUAL PARISH MEETING**

At the Annual Parish Meeting last month, Clifton Parish Council Chairman John Bowden's annual report included the following:



'Despite the pandemic, there have been some notable successes during this past year, with Manor Road being partially resurfaced, new footpaths laid in the village and improvements made to the village green, with the re-instalment of the old 'No Parking' sign and new planters provided. This process will continue with flower troughs and hanging baskets being installed shortly throughout the village, maintained by the Parish Council.

S106 Funding, arising from the two new housing sites at The Meadows and The View, has been allocated for new sporting and play facilities at the Recreation Ground; work is due to commence this summer once the legal issues confirming that the Parish Council owns all the land are resolved. Thanks are due to the S106 team who have worked hard to bring this project to fruition. Work is also about to start to convert a room in the school for a Village Archive. When completed, it is hoped that the records will be available to all.

A new Footpaths & Byways board will be erected on the Village Green shortly, which will allow maps of all the surrounding footpaths to be displayed, at a scale of 1:5000. The Parish Council Clerk, Michelle Alexander, has been working on a new Parish Council website in conjunction with Bernadette Higgins; this is now up and running and we urge you to use it for information and reporting, should you not be able to attend Parish Council meetings.'

#### NEW CLIFTON PARISH COUNCIL WEBSITE

The Clifton Parish Council has been given a new look in order to make it compliant with website accessibility regulations.

Parish Clerk, Michelle Alexander, said: 'In order to ensure the web pages are accessible, we have made changes in the way we publish information online. At least one in five people have an impairment or a disability. We have tried to make sure that our information is well structured and that our pages don't use complicated layouts. All our documents are in PDF format to make them more accessible. We have made changes to the site 'coding' of pages to enable them to be read more easily by screen readers, making sure that the design works for users with impaired vision and that it is flexible enough to be viewed with the text enlarged and ensuring that the contact form is accessible. We have written and published on the website an Accessibility Statement that details how our website complies with Accessibility Regulations.' # Draft Minutes of the virtual Annual Meeting of Clifton Parish Council held Thursday 6th May 2021

**Present**: Councillors J. Bowden (Chairman), A. Henry (Vice-Chairman), J. Collins, C. Haywood and B. Gilbert. Also present: 1 member of the public.

**Election of Chairman**: It was proposed by Cllr Gilbert, seconded Cllr A. Henry, that Cllr J. Bowden remain as Chairman. All agreed. Cllr Bowden accepted the role and it was agreed that the Clerk arrange for the signature of Acceptance of Office asap.

**Apologies for absence** were accepted from: Councillor R. Henry. Apologies were noted from District Cllr C. Palethorpe and County Councillor K. Pollock.

Resignations received and applications for co-option: None received.

**Election of Vice Chairman:** It was proposed by Cllr Bowden, seconded Cllr Gilbert that Cllr A. Henry remain as Vice Chairman. All agreed. Cllr A. Henry accepted the role.

Declarations of Prejudicial & Pecuniary Interests / Councillor Dispensations: None. Councillors noted the need to update their Registers of Interests as appropriate. Councillor Code of Conduct: The Council noted the Councillor Code of Conduct.

**Schemes of Delegation**: The following schemes of delegation were approved – Urgent Business Committee – Cllrs Bowden, A. Henry, Gilbert and the Clerk.

Parish Council Committees: The following Committees were agreed – Staffing Committee – Cllrs Bowden, Colins and Haywood. Finance Committee – Cllrs Bowden, A. Henry, Colins.

Review of Financial Regulations, Risk Assessments, Insurance requirements: It was agreed that the Clerk forward all these to the Finance Committee for review. A report to be made to the next meeting.

**Councillor Roles:** The following roles were agreed – Chair of Staffing Committee: Cllr Bowden. Vice Chairman Cllr Haywood. Chair of Finance Committee: Cllr Bowden. Vice Chairman Cllr A. Henry. Chair of Urgent Business Committee: Cllr Bowden. Vice Chairman Cllr A. Henry. Cheque signatories: Cllrs Bowden & A. Henry (current accounts) with Cllr Gilbert to be added to new accounts when set up. Worcs CALC Rep: Cllr Gilbert.

**To agree the Minutes of a virtual meeting held 1st April 2021** – The minutes were agreed as a true record. Proposed Cllr Gilbert, seconded Cllr Haywood. All agreed. No matters arising. District & County Councillor Reports: Reports to be uploaded to the website as circulated.

**Financial & Governance Matters**: Payments were approved as per the schedule circulated. Schedule to be uploaded to the website. Football and Bowls Club agreements for playing field usage to continue as per normal. Church clock funding – Cllr Gilbert had circulated an email with options to consider which take in to account the PC requirements about funding church property and land. It was proposed by Cllr Bowden, seconded Cllr Colins that the PC fund £6k towards the disabled access project together with an additional £1k p.a. for cemetery maintenance as a joint responsibility with the PCC. All agreed.

**Parish Matters**: Village Maintenance Plan – Cllr Gilbert is arranging to meet with R. Wilks re the final locations for the hanging baskets. The tree survey plan is being progressed and a walkabout planned to assess tree condition and establish future works. Minor tree works are carried out by R. Wilks. Village Archive – work has commenced as agreed on the new storage facility. PC website – thr new website is now completed and is live. The Clerk will now arrange new PC email addresses with Councillors and a launch will be made via Teme Triangle and social media. Doodlebugs Nursery – a letter had been

received asking for PC help to encourage more local people to help manage this facility for the village. The PC agreed to ask locally, and it was suggested that a poster be placed on the notice board and via social media – Cllr Gilbert to liaise as required.

**Section 106 Matters:** Four Acre Field Project – land ownership matters are still to be resolved with MHDC and it was agreed that the Urgent Business Committee should progress this with the Clerk and that a Solicitor will need to be engaged to undertake Land Registry work required. Sensory Garden – no further update but Cllr Gilbert is progressing quotes for work. Western Power electricity cables will remain where they are unless the PC pay to have them placed underground. It was agreed that it was not appropriate to do this and have the garden in this location anyway, as the land needed to be kept vacant in case the car park ever needed to be extended.

**Planning Matters**: Applications for consideration: 21/00354/FUL – New Inn, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6DR – proposed external canopy to provide covered seating area for customers – no objection submitted 11/4/21. 21/00627/HP & 00628/LB – Cockshot Cottage, B4204 The Village to Ham Bridge, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6DY – erection of one and a half storey extension to be located at the north end of the existing extension. No objection. 21/00702/AGR – 1 Noak Farm, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6DX – steel framed agricultural building. No objection. Notifications: 21/00514/AGR – New Inn Farm, Old Road, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6DR – prior approval not required for proposed agricultural building for storage of hay and straw.

**Strategic Planning Matters**: Cllr Gilbert will monitor and notify the Council of any matters which require attention.

Highways & Facilities Matters: Parish Lengthsman – the Council has been notified about more damage to J. Delahay's fence behind the playing field. R. Wilks to be asked to look at this. Cllr Bowden updated that there is no gate to the footpath across the field but WCC have been chased up on this matter. A second gate may be needed behind the goals but J. Delahay's permission would be sought before progressing this due to livestock security. A written agreement would be required. The pathway outside the substation in Kenelm Rd needs to be cleared – Clerk to ask RW. The Scouts would like access to the storage container - Cllr Bowden to arrange shelving and keys etc. Cllr Bowden has spoken to the locksmith re the pavilion changing room 'escape' doors - works to be quoted to fit escape bars as required. VAS - the new one is awaiting collected by RW from the Clerk. Two older ones have been returned to Westcotec for repair quotes. Meeting with Highways Liaison Officer - Cllr Bowden to arrange asap. Lovells development signage - the Clerk was asked to contact Lovells re signage removal. Footway option linking Hope Lane to Pound Lane - Cllrs Bowden and Gilbert to progress. Road closure notices as circulated by the Clerk. Footpaths closure notices - none received.

**Councillors Reports & Items for Future Agendas**: Cllr Gilbert asked about the village hall notice board options – Cllrs A. Henry and Gilbert to progress options. Cllr A. Henry asked for further clarification re MHDC Council Tax precept increases which was explained by the Clerk. The PC are unhappy that it appears the precept was increased when in fact it was not, and the increase was due to MHDC who have been made aware of the issue.

The Chairman's Report will be available on the website. **In Attendance**: Five members of the public and the Clerk.

Apologies: Mr David Bates, Mr J Stinton and District Councillor Palethorpe.

Minutes: The minutes of March 16th 2021 were agreed as a true record.

**Public Question Time**: Broadband (see below). Council's Scheme of Delegation: To remain the same. The Clerk will continue to canvass Councillors' opinion on planning applications between meetings. Unless otherwise advised the Council's default position will be to support applications.

**Financial Regulations, Risk Assessment and Insurance**: Financial Regulations are up to date. Insurance cover was now deemed appropriate with the addition of the litter bins to the asset register and the premium was approved.

all caution to the wind', the world still struggles to cope with the pandemic and some areas suffer significantly. Let us also remember those who still feel uneasy about mixing with others and those who are lonely and do not have those around them to hug.

I was reading an article by Jeremy Paxman recently, now you wouldn't immediately put him in the tactile group, but even he commented how important we have now realised touch and human contact is. Yet we need that social contact and discourse with one another, hopefully without the masks hiding our smiling faces soon.



### **CLIFTON WI ANNUAL REPORT**

Initially 2020 was noticeably quiet for Clifton upon Teme WI. We cancelled meetings and, after consultation with members, decided to wait until the restrictions were lifted later in the year. We kept our book group going, in gardens when allowed and, as the weather became colder, via Zoom.

Nationally WI remained active, offering online courses from Denman College and many groups opening their meetings up online to anyone who wanted to join in.

If anyone does not know, Denman was a college near Oxford, set up to run courses for WI members. It has been struggling over the last few years, with National Federation of WIs bailing it out financially. Covid has seen it closed and the college put up for sale. However, since Denman has gone online it has become accessible to a much larger audience and the plan is now to run regional courses which will reduce travel costs and allow more people to attend.

We had a socially distanced coffee get together at Pitlands on a blustery day in August and decided that we would give Zoom a go for meetings. This has worked exceptionally well with most members easily accessing the meetings. We have had diverse speakers, often ones who we would not otherwise have heard, as the travel expenses would be too great. We have heard from The Malvern Bard about 'a life in theatre', from Archaeologist Dr Sophie Moore about excavating and dating artefacts from a site in Turkey (with trifles), a talk on translating Chinese fiction into English by Paper Republic and from Jasmine Walters from WWT about rewilding with reference to the plans to rejuvenate the playing field site. Future events planned include a demonstration of making a lavender wreath from Jen Riches from Bonterre in July, a talk from the Good Soil project in October and a mosaic workshop when we can get together safely.

We have also delivered two 'goody bags' to members containing little gifts and we shared a session making pine cone owls before Christmas – all the craft requirements contained in another bag.

We have recently dropped flyers to many houses in the village and have already had a healthy response. It will be good to meet in person again and continue the WI tradition of Tea and Cake, although Clifton is getting a bit of a reputation in Worcester as 'the gin WI'.

We are currently planning our 2022 programme and looking forward to a mix of Zoom and face to face meetings which will allow for some speakers from further away to join us without breaking the bank.

# TUDOR BISHOPS OF WORCESTER TALK

Last month's meeting of Clifton WI introduced members to the bishops of Worcester during the troubled Tudor period in an interesting and factual talk by Philip Bowen who also works as an enthusiastic guide at the cathedral.



Worcester was one of the five most important cathedral due to its' position close to Wales so the bishop's role was important both spiritually and at court during the turbulent Tudor times and the Reformation. An example is the first Tudor bishop, John Alcock, bishop from 1476 to 1486 who also held the post of Lord Chancellor during some of that time and went on to be Bishop of Ely. He was also sent as Ambassador to the court of Castille in 1470, and tutor to the young King Edward V.

Robert Morton was the last English bishop of Worcester before the English Reformation, 1486 till his death in 1497 and previously was with Henry Tudor at the Battle of Bosworth.

The next four absentee bishops were all Italian one of whom, Giulio de Medici became Pope Clement VII. He refused the annulment of the marriage between Henry VIII and Catherine of Aragon leading to the break from Rome and the Catholic church.

Hugh Latimer bishop from 1535 to 1539, one of the most well known in history, a leading reformist, preaching in support of an English translation of the bible. He later disagreed with Henry and was imprisoned in the Tower of London for a period. He then served as chaplain to Katherine Duchess of Suffolk but when Mary came to the throne was tried for his beliefs and teachings. In October 1555 he was burned at the stake in Oxford with Nicholas Ridley, often referred to as the Oxford Martyrs.

Members of the WI enjoyed the insight into the history of the bishops and are thinking of arranging a guided tour of the cathedral to learn more of its history. June's meeting will be the garden meeting where we visit a member's garden to enjoy refreshments and this year a chance to meet in person. July 13th Jen Riches from Bonterre will be demonstrating how to make a Lavender wreath, participants can watch or purchase a kit to make their own at the same time hopefully meeting in the Village Hall.
