MASTERCLASS FOR HARPLEY CHOIR

Members of St Bartholomew's Church choir at Harpley were treated to a special masterclass led by international operatic diva Nicole Taylor.



Nicole, from California, is currently working in Paris as a cultural envoy of the United States Department of State. She has travelled through Europe and the Middle East, offering concerts, masterclasses and educational outreach programmes with the aim of promoting understanding and building intercultural bridges.

Originally from Los Angeles, soprano soloist Nicole is a graduate of the Masters programme at the Juilliard School in New York. Since her Carnegie Hall recital debut in 2006, Nicole has won awards in international and American competitions. She currently resides in France, where she is a soprano soloist and cantor at the American Church in Paris. Her extraordinary talent as a teaching artist has made her a world-class performer, having toured from Lithuania to India, Germany, Jerusalem, and home again.

'The last thing I expected to do when I arrived in Clifton upon Teme was to teach a choral masterclass,' said Nicole, 'but it was absolutely one of the highlights of my trip to England. After more than a full year teaching my singing classes exclusively online, it was a wonderful (and unexpected!) surprise to hear real voices again, in person. The singers from the Harpley 'pick-up choir' were attentive and sensitive in their musical skills. They were able to apply the vocal teachings almost immediately. They were curious and flexible, and willing to try new things without fear. Within a few hours their sound was transformed - simply by listening more carefully, breathing together, applying some basic vocal techniques, and infusing the meaning of the text into the sound.'

'Who would ever think that a tepid, watery setting sun over the Tedstone hills could cause the damage and chaos we experienced. I was in my sitting room when I heard the smoke alarm.

Halfway up the stairs I was greeted by black smoke cascading through our floors; crawling along the floorboards to our daughter's bedroom I was met with flames roaring through the beams, wooden floor and walls. The curtains were burning fiercely and I honestly felt the roof might come down any moment.

Thanks to the two small powder fire extinguishers I had luckily bought - and my brilliant wife recalled where they were hidden - they bought us enough time to douse the flames until the arrival of the amazing and simply fabulous teams of firefighters from Tenbury, Bromyard and Worcester who made our house safe. We could only thank our lucky stars we still had a home...

And the cause of this great excitement? A tepid, watery setting sun over the Tedstone hills, which bizarrely had enough strength to flood though a tiny window, bounce off a child's make-up mirror and laser beam onto the curtains.



Please keep any glass objects and mirrors away from your windows (including glass knobs on cupboards apparently!); invest in smoke alarms and buy two decent sized powder extinguishers - they saved our house!'

Draft Minutes of the Meeting of Clifton Parish Council held on Thursday 1st July 2021 at the Village Hall at 7.30pm



Present: Councillors J. Bowden (Chairman), A. Henry (Vice-Chairman), R. Henry and B. Gilbert. Also present: County Cllr David Chambers and four members of the public. **Apologies for absence**: Cllrs C. Haywood, J. Collins. District Cllr C. Palethorpe.

Declarations of Interests: Cllrs A & R Henry – matter regarding MHDC proposed funding contract with the PC re land at Walnut Lodge.

Democratic Public Time: Matters considered – The Council heard a report regarding 'Accommodation for later life in Clifton' from J. Wain. It was noted that huge community support will be needed to achieve the aims and objectives and lots of initial questions need to be answered, so a plan is now being formed to do this. Community support will then be evaluated, and a decision taken as to whether to proceed or not with the project. It will also need support from a Registered Provider, prospective sites identified, and access approval via WCC Highways. MHDC funding is available for initial consultation work and the PC is to consider this proposal later this evening. Parish Defibrillator – concerns were heard that the current defib may not be well known about and that some residents may not know how to use it in an emergency. The Chairman confirmed regular checks are undertaken of the equipment. It was suggested that an article in the Teme Triangle might be useful and also some refresher training for residents. May be also a second machine in a different location.

To agree the Minutes of a virtual meeting held 3rd & 24th June 2021 – The minutes of both meetings were agreed as a true record. Proposed Cllr Bowden, seconded Cllr Gilbert. All agreed. No matters arising.

District & County Councillor Reports: Reports will be uploaded to the website. Financial & Governance Matters: Payments were approved as per the schedule circulated. Proposed Cllr Bowden, seconded Cllr Gilbert. All agreed. Proposed funding agreement with MHDC re land at Walnut Lodge - a draft agreement had been circulated which was between MHDC and the PC. The PC had been asked to hold funds and release funds as required for the consultation process of looking at options for land at Walnut Lodge to be used for Accommodation for Later Life in Clifton. No unused funds would be retained by the PC. There was discussion as to whether the PC should and could do this, and concern was raised by Cllr R. Henry that this could set a precedent for the PC undertaking this role in the future for different projects. It was also suggested by Cllr R. Henry that the Neighbourhood Plan should be reviewed and amended as required if the project progresses. Cllr Gilbert explained the work undertaken to date by the project group and that there is a need for a formal organisation to take receipt of the funding and pay invoices as required, so that funding is receipted and allocated properly. The Clerk confirmed that it is possible for the PC to undertake this role for MHDC with PC approval, however this is a significant decision and although quorate, the PC may wish to defer until other Cllrs are present as well. Cllr Bowden proposed the matter be deferred, but the spokesperson for the group (J. Wain) suggested that the matter be withdrawn, and the group explore other options re fund holding. All agreed. Friendship Club funding request – the Clerk read out the request letter and the Chairman read out additional information received. It was proposed by Cllr Bowden, seconded Cllr Gilbert that the PC donate £500.00 towards an anniversary event. The Council considered this amount too much for this type of event which was also restricted to certain residents and not open to all to attend. (The Club represents approx. 10% of residents.) Cllr Bowden then proposed a revised amount of £100.00, seconded Cllr Gilbert. (Voted carried 3:1).

Parish Matters / Updates: Village Maintenance Plan – Cllr Gilbert updated re recent completed tasks including hanging baskets and planters. Some tasks still remain outstanding but are being followed up with R. Wilks. Thanks to the W.I. for work done to Derek's Garden. The Highways meeting is to be rescheduled due to ill health. R. Wilks to quote for additional mowing and replanting village green planters / repairs. Tree Survey – Cllr Gilbert reported that the cost has been approved and work awaited. Village Archives refurbishment – Cllr Gilbert reported that the repainting is complete, carpentry underway, and a filing cabinet has been obtained free of charge by J. Johns. New pedestrian drop kerbs – the WCC notice re work at the end of Hope Lane was noted. R. Wilks also to lightly trim the Conker tree. WCC sign beneath the tree also to be relocated if possible and village hall sign to be moved as well – Cllr Bowden to progress with Highways. Parish defibrillator – see democratic time. Clerk asked to look at training options and 2nd defib costs. West Mercia Police Charter – the Clerk was asked to sign and return, identifying local priorities as 1. Speeding and road safety, 2. Local traffic management, 3. Rural crime.

Section 106 Matters: Four Acre Field Project – land ownership matters are still to be resolved with MHDC and the Clerk is working with the Solicitor to progress this for the Council. All works currently on hold.

Planning Matters: Applications for consideration: none received. Notifications: 21/00861/ AGR – Mr P Richards, Highfield House, Hope Lane, Clifton WR6 6HE – prior approval not required for purpose built grain store. 21/00354/FUL – New Inn, Old Road, Clifton WR6 6DR – approval for external canopy to provide covered seating area for customers. **Strategic Planning Matters**: Cllr Gilbert will monitor and notify the Council of any matters which require attention.

Highways & Facilities Matters: Lengthsman tasks – a new gate on the recreation field footpath has been arranged. Road closures as circulated – current closure for Western Power in Hope Lane noted.

Hope Lane – development commenced and concern that there appear to be no Banksmen on the road. Cllr Bowden to notify the Developer of concerns. Also to ask not to use Manor Rd if possible for site traffic and also no site traffic during school drop off / pick up times. Village bus stop – current problems with parking in the village blocking the bus stop, which may need better marking. Cllr Bowden to liaise with Highways.

Correspondence received: a letter of thanks was read out by the Clerk from St Kenelms PCC for the funding received from the PC.

Next meeting to be held on Thursday 2nd September 2021 at the Village Hall.

TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE

This month's topic is ash dieback, a disease that is currently affecting our native ash tree, Fraxinus excelsior. Like Dutch elm disease before it, it is expected to change the appearance of the English landscape and much research is under way on how to manage it and mitigate its effects. The disease is caused by a fungus, originally called Chalara although now known as Hymenoscyphus fraxineus, which originated in East Asia. It has spread to affect ash trees across Europe, Great Britain and Ireland.

The disease is particularly deadly to young and coppiced trees, which die quickly. Older trees have more resistance and some trees are totally resistant to it. The first signs in an affected tree are blackening and wilting of the shoots and leaves, which are most easily spotted between July and September. Dark patches appear on the bark and typically are elongated diamond shapes of dark brown or black. If occurring near the base of the tree it is at risk of falling. The disease spreads via wind-blown spores.

Managing the disease depends on the age of the trees, their use and situation. There is no obligation to report or to act if you own a diseased tree, but public safety is of primary importance and any tree with a potential to cause harm, such as one alongside a road, footpath or building should be carefully inspected for signs that limbs or the whole tree might fall. Public bodies are currently felling many trees that fit this category. In woodland, a number of strategies may be undertaken, including doing nothing, depending on the diversity of species and tree-age on the site. Felling living trees is not recommended but taking out stands of young trees where the majority are infected may allow beneficial regeneration by more resistant types of the tree. However there must be nearby healthy trees over thirty years old for there to be enough ash seeds to achieve this.

Stopping spore spread is time consuming. Gathering and burning leaves or composting them with plenty of soil on top may interrupt the fungus life-cycle but is not practicable in most situations. Visitors to woods are advised to brush plant material off their shoes and wheels, eg bicycles, prams etc before leaving the site and to wash them at home before entering another wood, but again this is a cumbersome task.

The good news is that as some ash is totally resistant to the fungus, these strains should out-compete and eventually replace the susceptible types. Opening up woodland and allowing in more light to aid natural regeneration is a sensible strategy to promote this and, sad though it is to see trees dying, it can be rewarding to see traditional wood-management in action. Two such traditional wood-workers are seen in the accompanying photograph, Woody



and Twink are their names. Horse-logging is an ancient skill in tune with the woodland environment, we're lucky to have some practitioners of the art living here in the Teme Valley.



Church Matters

Climate Change is very much on the lips of us all for one reason or another, it is highlighted this month on the 5th September in the churches of our Worcestershire West Rural team (WWRT) when we shall consider our Christian responsibility on what is being called 'Climate Sunday'.



It is important as Christians that we take seriously the role given to us by our Creator in the early chapters of Genesis, to have dominion, subdue, and replenish the earth. This is not to ravage the earth of its resources in a selfish uncaring way, nor to exploit the earth but to exert a wise caring stewardship of all that God has given to us for the benefit of all humanity, not just a few, and to treat the earth with respect.

Genesis 1:28, ESV: "And God blessed them. And God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth.""

We are told by St. Paul in his letter to the Roman church that the 'sin' of humankind affects the Creation and it is groaning under that weight and awaits it own redemption.

Obviously not everything that we have done has been a deliberate attempt to damage the creation. We in the Churches of the WWRT are using a survey from an organisation called 'Arocha', to assess our buildings and ways of working so that we can work towards being more ecologically friendly and show our care for the earth and one another. The survey leads to churches being given Gold, Silver or Bronze awards. We already have St. Bartholomew's In Harpley with a Silver award and St. Peter's Martley with Bronze. One of our Team Priests, Rev Jen Denniston is heading a group of 'eco champions', a member from each of our churches, who have responsibility for questions surrounding environment and ecology that help us in our progress. These awards are not an end in themself but to help us to be aware of how we can all play our part in caring for the earth.

We are also blessed to have within our area Shane and Candy Connelly who have been offering help with approaches to floristry that avoids the use of 'oasis', which contain microplastics, and encourages the use of indigenous flowers in our displays. Shane himself with be' in conversation' with the Bishop of Dudley addressing such issues, when the video is available, we will let you know so you can view it.

In the meantime, as COP26 meets in Glasgow we may feel that is something beyond us, that's for governments and others, yet even their reports highlight that we can all play our part. We all know that every little helps and there are plenty of things we can do, for each of us those challenges will be different, but as we work together, we can fulfil our duty as 'stewards of the earth' and in doing so show great care and love for one another, and the generations to come. God bless you all

TOFFEE APPLE MACHINE

Neil Sparey of N. D. S. Engineering in Clifton has spent much of this year building an extraordinary machine that makes toffee apples.

The machine, based on the design of a caramel apple making machine in the USA, will be used to produce more than half a million toffee apples at the Ballard Stud Farm Fruit at Abberley this autumn. For the past twenty years the Ballards have been making toffee apples by hand, a somewhat laborious process.

Neil's bespoke machine is the first of its kind in the UK, built painstakingly after hours of trial and error. 'It's been a long time working on it', he says, 'But it makes a change from the sort of agricultural engineering work we normally do for our customers.' Only last year, Neil was featured in *Teme Triangle* after helping to repair and maintain the bells in Worcester Cathedral.

Pictured with Neil and the toffee apple machine (opposite) is Jeff Ballard, Director of Ballard Stud Farm Fruit who produce more than 300 tons of apples a year, many of which are turned into chocolate coated apples and now, thanks to Neil's machine, more than half a million toffee apples for the British market. 'We have been making toffee and chocolate apples in our family since 1995,' says Jeff Ballard. 'It's our own grown apple inside our dipped apples, well... until our toffee and chocolate apple orders exceed our crop. We currently supply three major supermarkets during the autumn season'.


