The Scouts, Guides, Cubs, Brownies, Beavers and Rainbows in Clifton have been busy fundraising to help fund essential repairs to the Scout and Guide hut in the village. The hut was donated to the group more than 40 years ago and subsequent wear and tear has meant that urgent remedial and longer term work is now needed to ensure that future generations of Scouts and Guides can use it as a meeting place.

The Scouting and Guiding community in Clifton have already held a number of fundraising events locally as well as benefitting from generous donations. Meanwhile, the Scouts and Guides groups have been working with local builders to ascertain the cost of essential repairs to the hut. Last month, the proceeds of the monthly guiz in the Lion Inn, amounting to £150, were donated to the appeal. And another quiz evening in the village hall, organised by the 1st Clifton-upon-Teme Scout Group and Clifton Guides, Brownies and Rainbows, raised a further £1,554, to be followed by the Guides and Brownies Christmas Fayre on 3 December.

#### **CLIFTON SCOUT AWARD**

A member of the Clifton-upon-Teme Cub Scout group, William Evans, has achieved the Chief Scout's Silver award, the highest possible award in Cub Scouts. William, aged ten, from Whitbourne is the first Cub in recent years in Clifton to achieve the award.

Nick Rowe (*pictured, right, presenting William with his award*), one of the Clifton-on-Teme Cub Scout Leaders, said: "This award is the result of William's incredible dedication and hard work and goes to show what a talented and capable young man he is."

William's achievements in Cubs over the past two and a half years include gaining all seven Challenge badges

(Skills, Adventure, World etc.), 17 Activity badges (Chef, DIY, Sports etc.) and 12 staged badges (Hikes, Navigation, Swimming, Nights-Away, Camping etc.).

#### TREFOIL GUILD SUPPORTING THAILAND GUIDES

Clifton's Sue Barnes, meanwhile, is on a visit to Thailand this month with seven other members of Trefoil Guilds to support the Girl Guide Association of Thailand. Sue is Chair of Knightwick and District Trefoil Guild, the adult part of Girl Guiding that meets regularly to further the ethos of Girl Guiding and support local units such as the Clifton Guides and Brownies.

"We will be staying in Guide centres and talking to the leaders about Trefoil Guild, exchange programme ideas and in particular we will be helping with fence construction, painting a training centre, working with the children on team activities and English language skills, playing games, singing campfire songs, exchanging recycling ideas and activities and much, much more," says Sue. "It was an honour to be chosen to participate in this project. Over the last ten months, we have been busy fundraising and planning for this wonderful opportunity to share our knowledge and expertise."

#### WORK STARTS ON CLIFTON'S RECREATION GROUND

Work has at last started on the Four Acre Field project in Clifton to redevelop the village's recreation area nearly four years since the Parish Council was first allocated £250,000 of S106 money as a result of new housing development.

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#### VIEW FROM THE FARM

October and November are the quietest time for us with the sheep as we've sold most of the lambs by now. The rams are in with the ewes from early October until the beginning of December, when we take them out. The gestation period for sheep is roughly five months, so by the end of April I've had enough of getting up in the night to check the ones left to lamb! We also need to get back on the social scene in the valley, although Fi is more interested

in getting me out fencing again to earn some money, she's worried I may get too used to being at home all the time.

This autumn has been the best grass growing time I've ever known, a lot is due to it being such a mild season, but I think one of the main reasons is that the ground has been so dry for the last two or three years due to a lack of normal rainfall. If you dig down six inches, there is very little moisture there and we all know from our gardens that nothing grows if it's lacking water. We start feeding hay at the beginning of December as there is not only less grass, but it is not so nutritious.

The main tractor we use in the winter is a Ford 4000 which is 58 years old; I think there is no tractor of that era to beat it, but I'm sure Brian Wickens would disagree and say a Massey Ferguson 135 is the best! We've got a front-end loader on the Ford and a transport box on the back in which we can transport the food, troughs, hurdles, a couple of ewes... In fact, practically anything. I almost forgot the dog, it might be a bit bumpy, but in Bryn's mind a second class ride is better than a first class run behind it. This tractor has never had power steering (Kevin Wickens does our baling) and Fi complains that it is too difficult to steer with one of Kevin's big bales on the front-end loader, so I hope she'll be pleased with her Christmas present, I've bought her a power steering kit for it! Usually she goes shopping, chooses her present, buys it and wraps it up, I do write the tag though!

## Minutes of the meeting of Clifton Parish Council held November 2

**Present**: Councillors J. Bowden (Chairman), P. Brooks, L. Merrick, Cllr S. Haywood. Also present: Three members of the public and District Cllrs Paul & Pam Cumming. Apologies for absence: County Cllr D. Chambers, Cllr B. Gilbert (V/Chairman), Cllr R. Neave.

Declarations of Interests and applications for Councillor dispensations: None. To agree the Minutes of the meetings held 5th October 2023 – Minutes were proposed by Cllr Brooks, seconded Cllr Haywood. All agreed. The Council is still awaiting a response from STW. Democratic Public Time: No matters raised by the public.

**District & County Councillor Reports**: Any written reports received will be circulated and uploaded to the website. There is very little from MHDC currently, but an announcement is awaited regarding the new Head of Planning. Planning and environmental matters remain busy. A meeting was held at Gt Witley last week re the proposed large scale development to the rear of The Glebe – the lack of the SWDPR continues to raise serious issues. DCIIr Jones-Williams wing walk has been postponed to April but any funds collected are going directly to the Air Ambulance. DCIIr funding is available to support local projects (£500.00 per DCIIr). The BP Hut may be a possibility for funding and contact details were given.

**Financial & Governance Matters**: Payments approved as per the schedule- proposed Cllr Brooks, seconded Cllr Merrick. All agreed. The invoice received from Kompan for £79,812.00 for the S106 project will be queried by Cllr Bowden directly but was approved subject to Cllr Bowden being satisfied with the explanation given. S106 interest – the Clerk has asked MHDC whether interest will be available on the s106 funding received. Carols on the Green 15th Dec 2023 – it was agreed to allocate £150.00 budget to the event.

**Parish Matters / Updates: Village Maintenance Plan** – Cllr Bowden reported that the MHDC sweeper had been in the village and had also cleaned around the Conker tree. The bell mouth at Saxon Close has been completed. The tactiles have been replaced on the south side of Manor Rd and appears a better solution this time. The footpath to the rear of the village green has been confirmed as ours by WCC and Cllr Bowden is now sourcing a contractor quote for the surfacing works. The 30mph signs in Pound Lane remain ongoing. The painting has been completed in the pavilion showers.

**Section 106 Matters**: Four Acre Field (CFAF) Project – Cllr Bowden reported that works have started, and funds have been received from MHDC. A contractors meeting was held last week, and it is very good to see contractors on site. The heras fencing is around the tennis courts and some work has been started on that section. Some old chain link fencing is available to anyone who can use it. A full work programme is to be drafted asap. Some closures may be needed for H&S reasons, but it is hoped to keep the area open for usage throughout the works. Cllr Bowden summarised the works planned and confirmed that the rocker-horse will be retained and refurbished. An opening ceremony is planned at the end of the project. Cllr Merrick has produced a plan for the Garden and all costs have now been confirmed. Wildflower turf is to be used as this is much more successful than seed. It is hoped to encourage ecological improvements in neighbouring villages. Garden funding is to be sourced separately to the main s106 project and Cllr Bowden summarized the funding history re s106 original plans and current plans. Cllr Merrick was asked for an invoice for the garden project work completed to date. Drawings of the recreation field plans are now on the pavilion windows. Sadly, the planned eco-

project for the Church has fallen through but Cllr Merrick has retained the details. It was noted that a 'faculty' would have to be applied for to progress this in the future. It was queried whether s106 funds from the Hope Lane could be used for the BP Hut required works but it was noted that historically this has not been the case. To be monitored.

**Planning Matters**: Planning applications considered or to be considered: M/23/01404/ LB – Ham Farm House, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6DU – urgent repairs to roof members, deteriorated stonework and brickwork (part retrospective) – No objections.

Planning notifications: M/23/00952/FUL – Clifton upon Teme Primary School, Pound Lane, Clifton upon Teme WR6 6DE – approval for the erection of a flat roof extension to the rear of the building. Enforcement Updates as received: None.

Other planning matters – it was noted that there are rumours re extending the Hope Lane development site. Cllr Bowden is looking into this as it would be well outside the Neighbourhood Plan. Cllr Gilbert to be asked to draft a letter to Harriet Baldwin MP asking what is happening re these decisions as clarification is urgently needed.

Electric Vehicle charging points – DCIIr Paul Cumming was asked to look into options with MHDC and liaise with CIIr Bowden.

**Strategic Planning Matters:** SWDPR matters remain ongoing with the Planning Inspector.

**Highways & Facilities Matters**: Lengthsman work continuing as agreed. Hedge at Manor Rd is blocking the footpath – Lengthsman to be asked to speak to residents. Road and footpath notices as circulated – none.

Cllr Bowden has contacted WCC re Shelsley Walsh footpath closures and the Clerk will now receive notices from 2024 onwards.

**Councillors Reports & Items for Future Agendas:** Ham Bridge / Shelsley junction overhanging trees and signage matters are ongoing with WCC. It was noted that PC meeting minutes are shown on the PC website, in Teme Triangle and on the parish notice board.

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#### WEST MERCIA SEARCH & RESCUE

The recent floods in the Teme Valley and elsewhere in Hereford and Worcestershire may well have involved the services of a little-known group of volunteers, the official Lowland Rescue unit for the West Mercia Police area, operating as part of the UK's rescue structure alongside Mountain Rescue, the Coastguard, RNLI and Lifeguards.

The West Mercia Search & Rescue team are normal people doing quietly heroic, dedicated and professional work in the community for those in crisis. They are also a registered DEFRA Flood Rescue Boat team and can be called to respond anywhere in the county when flooding occurs.

"We find missing people, we save lives in floods and we respond to emergencies alongside our partner agencies," says Al Cropp (*right*) from Upper Sapey, one of the West Mercia team.

"When someone vulnerable goes missing it's an emergency and we have to be ready to respond in any weather, at any time. It can be complex and challenging work, and we therefore need to ensure that our operational members have the best training and the right equipment to ensure that they stay safe and maximise the success of our work."

Search and rescue teams are called out

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by the emergency services when someone is in dire need of specialist help. More often than not that need is for a vulnerable adult (dementia, suicidal or self-harm intentions, learning difficulties etc.) or a child, meaning that the person is at much higher risk than normal.

The service costs tens of thousands of pounds every year. Volunteers give their time, money and dedication to help save lives and support people in some of the most difficult moments of their lives. # Church Matters

Eight hundred years ago in 1223 St Francis of Assisi created the first ever 'live' Christmas crib scene in the tiny village of Greccio in central Italy – a favourite resting place for St Francis on his journeys. The local farmers were in despair as their land was often ravaged by man-eating wolves (!) and by violent hailstorms



which decimated their crops. When St Francis started being there it is said that 'their calamities ceased' so they loved him for saving them.

In 1223 while he was in Greccio just a few days before Christmas he was reminded so much of his recent visit to Bethlehem that he had the idea of recreating the nativity scene with real people to bring to life the Christmas story. He wanted the local people to be able to see and experience the incredible reality of the birth of the infant Jesus 'lain in a manger with the ox and ass standing by' and so encourage people to understand its meaning and bring their faith to life.

Contemporary biographers of St Francis say that the scene was so beautiful and moving in its simplicity that 'everyone went home filled with joy'. So began the tradition of having local actors playing Mary, Joseph and the baby lying in the straw-filled manger with the ox and the donkey standing by. The manger was the altar for the Christmas Eucharist where the service was held. Every year actors recreate the nativity scene on the evening of 24 December in Greccio. And this year St Peter's Square in Rome will have a nativity scene with life-size terracotta figures representing St Francis carrying Baby Jesus with Joseph and Mary, a donkey and an ox in order to commemorate 800 years since the first 'Live Nativity'.

The artist Giotto, considered to be the father of Renaissance art, painted in the early 1300s. His frescoes in the Basilica of St Francis in Assisi are an incredible depiction of the life of St Francis and did much to spread the news about the great Saint who is well-known for his love of animals and nature.

In a quick weekend trip to Assisi you could take in Greccio nativity scenes, the Basilica of St Francis in Assisi and shop in its Christmas markets also!

Clifton resident Beth Whittenbury has achieved a goal that has taken her six years to complete.



In November, at Birmingham's Symphony Hall, she graduated from The Open University with an Upper Second-Class Honours degree, becoming a Bachelor of Arts (Hons) in English Literature and Creative Writing. Encouraged and supported by her family, in 2017 Beth took on the challenge to fulfil a long-held wish to study further.

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#### Draft Minutes of Shelsleys Parish Council Meeting held on 7 November 2023

**Present:** Val Jones (Chair), Louise Hutton (Vice-Chair), Karen Metcalfe, John Stinton, Dave Bates, David Belfield, Laura Taylor and Jean Hammond. In attendance: In attendance: District Councillors Pam and Paul Cumming, two members of the public and the clerk. Apologies: Carole Warren.

**Minutes:** The Minutes of 5 September 2023 were accepted and agreed as a true record after two amendments were made. Public Question Time: None. District and County Councillor Reports: Circulated before the meeting and available on the parish website (address below).

Apple Orchard at Shelsley Walsh: The current landscaping and tree removal at land leased by the Midland Automobile Club at Shelsley Walsh was discussed.

MHDC was asked by the Parish Council to attend the site to ascertain whether planning permission was required for tree removal and track laying by heavy machinery. The Enforcement Officer concluded that retrospective permission will be required for the works. The Tree Warden reported the removal of one dead tree and nine live apple trees. The Landscape Officer at MHDC Chris Lewis-Farley and the Green Space Officer at WCC Wade Muggleton both confirmed that there was no preservation order on the trees. There are concerns that the old trees are home to a specific beetle and when the new orchard was planted in 2012 it was hoped that the species would be rehomed in the new trees. This has not been confirmed. A fruit tree expert who also works as a volunteer at the water mill grafted some of the old trees in order to perpetuate the varieties. He was not consulted before the trees were removed. A letter will be sent to the MAC expressing concern at the tree removal with the hope and expectation that some reparation will be made and that the MAC will replant with similar old tree species.

**Highways**: Lengthsman's no report, invoice or worksheets were received. Pard House Lane. The work has been completed. Road sweeping. A request for mud clearance between New Mill Bridge and All Saints has been submitted to MHDC. New Mill Bridge. The debris against the bridge has been reported. The road flooding by the bridge caused by a stream flowing onto the Shelsley Walsh road will be reported with some urgency to WCC. The District Councillor will also report the problem. Flooding due to surface water and blocked gullies at Pard House bungalows has been reported. B4203 Bromyard Road. The road surfacing works on the highway have been completed.

**VHMC:** The balance sheet for the Village Hall accounts was submitted. The Parish Council was expecting to be supplied with audited accounts and members were concerned regarding the incomplete submission. The perilous state of the finances was a concern to all. The Village Hall like many others is suffering from a lack of use and so revenue is affected. There was discussion on the reasons for the limited use, which included ageing population, the wide spread of homes within the parishes, the increased trend of home entertainment and little interest in planned events.
