A MESSAGE FROM REV ANNE



Music to every Christian's ears. After six weeks of Lent, we move into the most important week in the Christian calendar, Holy Week. The week that started with the Triumphant Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem with people lining the streets to welcome their celebrity, their Messiah. The week of the Last Supper Jesus had with his disciples, leaving followers down the centuries with the perpetual memory of his broken body and his shed blood. The week that witnessed the horrific death of the 'King' on the cross, the ultimate sacrifice for the salvation of humankind. The week in which the disciples felt

complete desolation. Yet, the week ended with the joy of the Son's resurrection and the fulfilment of the Father's promise of eternal life.

Helen Steiner Rice, an American writer of both inspirational and Christian poetry who lived from 1900-1981 wrote a beautiful poem called The Legend of the Raindrop. The poem describes how a raindrop wavers about falling to the earth below, as it is so beautiful shimmering like a diamond in the sky. However, the raindrop is persuaded to fall, as by doing so, it sinks below the soil and hence contributes to the cycle of nature – the growth of plants, which in turn wilt and wither, making the soil more fertile in readiness for the birth of further plants. Through the raindrop, who has a lesson for us all, Helen Steiner Rice describes death and the beauty of new life, along with a special message of hope, as summarised in the final four lines of her poem:

For there is nothing ever lost, or eternally neglected, for everything God ever made is always resurrected. So trust God's all wise-wisdom and doubt the father never, for in his heavenly kingdom nothing is lost forever.

Easter is the time we Christians celebrate the joy of the resurrection and the fulfilment of God's eternal kingdom. We fill our churches with flowers after the austerity of Lent. We celebrate in the sharing of eggs, more often than not chocolate, reminding us of birth and new life, the new life we are continually promised in Jesus Christ.

When we get to April 9th, may I wish all our readers a joyous and blessed Easter.

CLIFTON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN REVIEW

Clifton Parish Council has reviewed its Neighbourhood Development Plan (2017-2030) and believes that the plan remains appropriate for the village. When it was originally approved, the Plan included four sites for housing development: Blue Shot, Hope Lane, Steps Farm and Church Farm and any sympathetic infill development within the village development boundary to a maximum of five dwellings.

The Church Farm site remains to be developed with its allocation of 17 dwellings, but the Parish Council remains of the view that the development of the village as set out in the plan remains viable and that any further extension would be inappropriate and has expressed these views to the South Worcestershire Development Plan Review.

Nevertheless the Parish Council would be pleased to hear from parishioners who wish to express any view on all aspects of the Plan and can do so by emailing the planning lead, Bruce Gilbert, on gilbertb@clifton-upon-teme-pc.org.uk. The Plan itself can be viewed on the Parish Council Website clifton-upon-teme-pc.org.uk under the Planning Tab.

DOG NOTICES

DOG FAECES

There have been a number of concerns raised in relation to roaming dogs in and around Shelsley Beauchamp and canine faeces being left on the grass verges and along the footpaths at the side of the banks of the River Teme.

Dog faeces can lead to issues such as Sarcocytosis in sheep and Neosporosis in cattle. Sarcocytosis causes neurological problems leading ultimately to the death of the animal. Neosporosis causes abortion, and for the farmer, the loss of a calf. Bearing in mind there is only one breeding season for sheep and cattle, losing an animal will have a significant financial impact on the farmer.

Your attention is drawn to the Malvern Hills District Council 'Dog Control Public Space Protection Order' (as previously documented in the May 2022 TT).

DOGS DURING LAMBING

Dog owners in the Teme Valley area are asked to keep dogs on a lead when walking through fields containing sheep, and to be especially vigilant during the lambing season.

"It is vital that you keep your dog on the lead around livestock, even if you can usually trust it to come to call," says the National Sheep Association. "If you live in or near a farming area, you must make sure that your dog cannot escape from your property, as it may find its way onto land containing sheep."



It is an offence to allow a dog to worry sheep. Worrying includes attacking or chasing sheep and, in some circumstances, farmers are legally entitled to shoot dogs if they are endangering their sheep.

Please be responsible, considerate dog owners whilst around livestock. Thank you.





CLIFTON SCHOOL GETS 'GOOD' OFSTED REPORT

Clifton Primary School has been awarded another 'Good' rating following a recent Ofsted inspection.

In a letter to parents, Headteacher Karen Crawford, said the report 'confirms that the school continues to be a good school' and was a fair reflection of the school. 'It is unremittingly positive and praiseworthy about all aspects of school life'.

Among the highlights of the report:

- Pupils are happy to attend school. They behave very well and are respectful
 of adults and each other. Pupils enjoy learning and spending time with their
 friends. They model the school's 'Clifton Way' values, including teamwork and
 perseverance in all they do.
- Staff have high expectations of all pupils, including those who have special
 educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), to achieve well. Pupils
 experience a broad and interesting curriculum. They are academically, socially
 and emotionally well prepared for the next steps in their education.
- Pupils feel safe and are confident that staff would help them with any problems
 or worries they may have. Pupils know what bullying is and say it is rare at the
 school. They are sure that if it did happen, an adult would deal with it quickly.
- Leaders ensure that pupils' personal development is a priority. They aim to ensure that pupils are well prepared for life in modern Britain.
- Leaders have designed a balanced curriculum that sets out what pupils should learn in each subject. Subject plans are ambitious and include a focus on the subject-specific vocabulary that pupils should understand and use.
- Reading is at the heart of the curriculum. Children begin learning to read as soon as they start in Reception and make strong progress. Staff have excellent subject knowledge.
- Pupils have positive attitudes and behave well during lessons and at breaktimes.
 They are considerate of the needs and feelings of each other. Older pupils are keen to support the youngest pupils, both out on the playground and as reading buddies.
- Parents and carers are highly positive about the school. Most agree that their children are happy and achieve well.

'These findings are no surprise to us and agree with our own school self-evaluations,' said Karen Crawford. 'We never 'do things for Ofsted'; we do things because they fit with our values and vision and we believe they are right for the children in our care, to help them flourish academically, socially and emotionally. Nevertheless, it is always pleasing to have our practice endorsed by external, independent auditors'.

Two areas for development identified in the report:

some foundation ln subjects, pupils have not had enough opportunities to revisit what they have been taught, and some do not remember what they have learned well enough. This means that some pupils are not able to build on what they already know and can do. Leaders should ensure that there opportunities teachers to check how well pupils have learned, and act upon this information, before moving on to new learning.



Some teachers are new to subject leadership. They are not yet confident in
evaluating how well the curriculum is being implemented or leading improvements
in the quality of education pupils receive. The headteacher should continue with
her plans to provide support and training to further strengthen leadership at the
school.

'These areas for development are already part of this years' School Development Plan: we continue to work on these as we are passionate about ensuring the very best education for all of our children,' said Karen. 'I would like to thank all of the staff team who demonstrate their dedication to making our school the best it can be each and every day. Many thanks also to our excellent team of Governors and to the parent community for your ongoing support: your views and feedback shared with the inspection team are really valuable. The final thanks must go to our wonderful children who absolutely shone when discussing their learning with the inspectors and impress us daily with their attitudes towards school life.'

Unfortunately there appears to be limited wording displayed for the public to see, but please rest assured that full details of the tree species, Parish Council funding and landowner's permission and generosity is also recorded 'in the background' of the system.

CLIFTON FOUR ACRE FIELD PROJECT GETS GO AHEAD

After a frustrating and long delay of nearly two years the transformation of the Four Acre Field project is now set to go ahead in Clifton. The Land Registry Department has finally confirmed that the Parish Council is now registered as the owner of the land and the last obstacle has thus been removed.

Sadly, the escalating costs due to the pandemic and the Ukrainian war has meant that the £245k available to the Parish will no longer allow it to fulfil all the original plans. After much deliberation, the Parish Council has decided it must cut the trim track around the field and the provision of a sensory garden from the programme. The rewilding project will have to be modified as the Natural Networks grant is no longer available.

Nevertheless, the Parish Council is pleased that it can press ahead with much of the original programme, which includes:

- Improved land drainage of the field including the football pitch.
- The refurbishment of the existing bowling green.
- A redesign of the overall play area and the replacement of the existing play equipment.
- A refurbishment of the existing tennis courts to provide an additional netball option, and a new multi-purpose facility (MUGA) for various options including 5-a-side soccer, basketball, tennis, plus mini sports – cricket and tennis.
- The installation of a bike rack.
- The resurfacing of the car park area.



The traditional country inn closed its doors in October 2022 having served the local community for over 180 years. Pensax has lost its primary school and village hall in recent years, leaving the pub as the only community venue.

Having achieved Asset of Community Value status for the pub in December 2022, the group now plans to sell shares and purchase The Bell through a Community Benefit Society. Anyone aged 16 or over can go to www.savethebellatpensax.co.uk and pledge their intention to invest between £250 and £25,000.

TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE

The subject for this month's article occurred to me earlier in the year, when I unexpectedly spotted several lapwings flying across the lane leading to my home. I had never seen a lapwing in the village before, but our local farmer had recently watched a flock of twenty-five or so feeding in his fields. When I was a child living in south Derbyshire, I regularly saw flocks of many thousands of birds near to my home. Our house lay on the flood-plain of the River Dove and in winter the broad, flat fields surrounding us were frequently waterlogged. The names of nearby lanes reflected this, being called Watery Lane, Miry Lane and Boggy Lane respectively. Huge flocks of lapwings arrived, turning the sky almost black and providing an amazing spectacle as they wheeled down together onto the damp ground.

Lapwings are said to be friends of the farmer because they eat pests known to damage crops. Waterlogged ground causes wireworms and leatherjackets and other insect larvae to come to the surface where they offer an easy meal. In drier conditions the birds sometimes stamp their feet to bring up their prey. I had forgotten how large lapwings are. Standing twelve inches high, their smart black and white colouring and large curving crests really stand out. Light falling on their black feathers reflects a beautiful green metallic hue. Alternative names include plover, derived from the Latin for rain, and pee-wit, suggested by their call, whilst an old Worcestershire name is "Old Maid".

Lapwings are known for a flapping style of flight and for putting on aerobatic territorial and mating displays. Sometimes seeming to drop suddenly out of the sky, the male

lands in his territory and makes a scrape in the soil to encourage a female to choose a nest site. She lines the scrape with dry grass and lays four well-camouflaged eggs. Such a nest is at high risk from predators but lapwings rise up to mob crows if they feel at threat. Lapwing chicks leave the nest amazingly quickly, as soon as the last hatched chick has dried, and have been seen running along with fragments of shell still sticking to their feathers. They develop very rapidly, being covered with fine down and able to feed themselves three days from hatching. The female bird protects her chicks and leads them to safety, sometimes pretending to have a broken wing, in order to draw predators away.

Legends became attached to the birds, probably because they can make eery calls well into the night. Seven lapwings calling together were dubbed "The Seven Whistlers" and were thought to warn of misfortune. The birds themselves had the misfortune to be desirable as food. Their eggs were considered a delicacy and the adults ended up in pies. In 1926 a Lapwing Act was passed to try and protect them. Having nested from March to May in northerly locations on moorland, coastland marsh and damp, rushy fields, they begin to flock in July and head south to warmer estuaries and coastal farmlands. To see them was a real privilege, I hope they'll come again.

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will take place at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall, WR15 8RR, on Thursday April 13th at 7:30pm. We welcome back local beetle expert Will Watson whose talk is about the beetles to be found in Herefordshire ponds. Everyone is most welcome and it is just £2 on the door.

Minutes of the meeting of the Parish Council held Thursday 2nd March 2023 in the Village Hall commencing at 7.40 pm

Present: Councillors A. Henry (Vice-Chairman), B. Gilbert, N. Campsall.

Also present: District Councillor Paul Cumming and x10 members of the public.

Apologies for absence: Parish Councillors J. Bowden (Chairman), R. Henry, P. Brooks, L. Merrick, County Cllr D. Chambers, District Cllr C. Palethorpe.

Declarations of Interests and applications for Councillor dispensations: None.

Democratic Public Time: Members of the public raised the following issues -

The Council was asked to give an update on the s106 Playing Field project. Cllr Campsall explained that this would be discussed later in the meeting, as it was an agenda item.

To agree the Minutes of the meeting held 2nd February 2023 – Minutes were proposed by Cllr Gilbert, seconded Cllr Campsall and agreed by all. (117.22.05) Bus shelter – Cllr Gilbert suggested that planning conditions would be required before anything else is done – matter to be deferred.

District & County Councillor Reports: Any reports received will be circulated and uploaded to the website. District Cllr Cumming updated the meeting regarding the Planning Working Group, which has been set up at MHDC to resolve outstanding planning issues. Cllr Cumming will be chairing this group. MHDC has approved the next years budget and Cllr Cumming explained how the budget system works re special infrastructure reserves. MHDC is to fund Town Councils for Coronation events, but will not be funding Parish Councils, which is disappointing news.

Financial & Governance Matters: Payments and receipts – the schedule was proposed by Cllr Gilbert, seconded Cllr Campsall. All agreed. Clerk to arrange payments as agreed. It was further agreed to delay payment to Lanyon Bowdler Solicitors who had invoiced for the Land Registry work undertaken for the playing field project. It was agreed that the Clerk write to them expressing disappointment in the way the matter has been handled and the unnecessary delays caused by them, through the Land Registry application having to be restarted due to documents not being submitted by them on time. A reduction in their invoice may be appropriate.

Councillor Elections May 2023 - instructions circulated by the Clerk / MHDC have been noted.

Parish Matters / Updates: Village Maintenance Plan – no further update this month. Community Speed Watch – the Clerk confirmed that there will be a speed survey in the village during March conducted by the Police. Tennis Courts – a new net has been erected and the court will also be refurbished in the near future. King Charles Coronation – the events have been added to Nextdoor and Facebook. Cllr A. Henry gave a summary of what has been organised. The plaque for the Church wall has been ordered and Cllr Bowden is liaising with the PCC re a contribution to the Parish Council towards the cost.

Section 106 Matters: Four Acre Field (CFAF) Project – Cllr Campsall had circulated an update which was also read to the meeting and will be uploaded to the website. A copy will also be placed in Teme Triangle. Title Deeds have now been obtained for the playing field and have been submitted to MHDC. New contractor quotes are being obtained and a revised project plan is being drafted in line with amended costs and the funding available. MHDC still holds £245k funding for the project. There may also be an additional amount of \$106 funding available, but this has not yet been allocated to the project. It was proposed by Cllr A Henry, seconded by Cllr Gilbert, to agree in principle to the revised scope. All agreed. It was further proposed by Cllr A Henry, seconded Cllr Campsall, to delegate authority to Cllrs Campsall, Bowden and Gilbert to complete the final shape of the project as per the estimates confirmed. All agreed.

Planning Matters: Planning approval was noted for the reorientation of existing mower store and erection of a detached triple garage at The Old Vicarage, Church Road, Clifton upon Teme. Planning Enforcement are dealing with the matter lodged after the last PC meeting, regarding Blue Shot, Pound Lane, Clifton uponTeme.

Strategic Planning Matters: Cllr Gilbert will monitor the SWDPR and notify the Council of any matters to be considered. No further updates to the meeting.

Highways & Facilities Matters: Cllr Brooks had circulated an email regarding local issues, which were noted. A resident has cleared the rubbish alongside the Guest development, but the Developer has been asked by the Council to keep the area clean going forward. The stone surface along the footpath also appears unsuitable – Cllr Gilbert will check this with Cllr Brooks. The list of outstanding matters for County Cllr Chambers is being dealt with by Cllr Bowden. Cllr Bowden is also dealing with a local tree matter. There are no recent road / footpath closure notices.
