ANDY ARNOLD'S WINTER CHALLENGE

Clifton's Andy Arnold competed in the Montane Winter Spine Race last month (January). This is a non-stop 270 mile race along the entire length of one of the most demanding national trails in Britain, the Pennine Way.

The Montane Winter Spine is widely regarded as Britain's most brutal endurance race. It is a truly epic challenge that tests competitors' physical resilience and mental fortitude. Andy experienced the full intensity and ferocity of the British winter including snow and storm force winds.

Beginning at Edale in Derbyshire, runners have a time limit of 168 hours to reach the village of Kirk Yetholm in the Scottish Borders. They climb over 10,000 metres as the route crosses some of the most beautiful but difficult terrain found in England, including the Peak District, Yorkshire Dales, Northumberland National Park, Hadrian's Wall and the Cheviots.

Andy took part in the gruelling challenge in order to raise money for charity. "I have chosen the Alzheimer's Society as I have experienced how cruel this disease is, not only to those diagnosed, but also for those family members who devote their time to support and care for their nearest and dearest," he said.

It has been a couple of months since I last wrote for Teme Triangle and now we are way past 'Happy New Year'. We are well and truly into 2024 and it has been such a joy to meet, and start to get to know, some people in these parishes. I have been struck by the enthusiasm



there is serving for these communities. There is a real desire to share God's love in practical ways as well as words and worship in and around our church buildings.

At this time of year, in the Church calendar we have recently celebrated Christmas and the season of Epiphany, as God reveals who the babe in the manger is to become. Note: Mary was born in Leighton, Shropshire in 1881. She began writing at the age of 10, writing fairy stories, later educated in Southport. Various English and American publications carried her work. She moved to London in 1921 as a book reviewer.

Mary is well known for her novels, centred on the borders between Wales and England. She was awarded the Femina Vie Heurese Prize for her novel 'Precious Bane' in 1925.

Minutes of the meeting of Clifton Parish Council held 11 January

Also present: x5 members of the public, District Councillors Paul & Pam Cumming. **Apologies:** M. Alexander (Clerk).

87.23 The Minutes of the Meeting held 07.12.23 were approved and agreed.

88.23 Matters arising: The following tasks had not been completed by the Lengthsman: Hedge at 10 Manor Road needs to be cut back, as it is partially obstructing the footpath; the Gully outside 3 Hope Lane needs to be cleaned out; the Holly above the Litter Bin in Manor Road needs to be trimmed back. Clerk/Chair to inform R. Wilks.

It was also mentioned that the new bin at the end of the Hill Farm drive has not been emptied – Clerk to contact Malvern Hills.

Councillor Bowden proposed a 'Vote of Thanks' to Mandy Henry for another successful organisation of 'Carols on the Green' & Councillor Brooks suggested we send Mandy a bunch of flowers to show our appreciation. All agreed.

The footpath to the rear of the Village Green has been tarmacked & a member of the public congratulated the Stories on a job efficiently & well done. They will be considered when the tarmac to the Recreation Ground is programmed. The works revealed a gulley towards the south end of the footpath, which will need some work to replace the cover. Chair to liaise with R. Wilks.

Jerry Johns relayed the sad news that Ken Pollock, former District Councillor & keen supporter of the Council had passed away. It was agreed to send a condolence card to his family.

89.23 County & District Councillor Reports: The County Councillors Report was read out & Paul Cummings elaborated on his report for December. There was a discussion regarding the interest on the S106 monies & it was agreed that this would be discussed when the S106 Sub-Committee meets the Malvern Hills Representative. Paul Cummings also stated that it had been agreed that Neighbourhood Plans are now valid for a period of 5 years.

90.23 Finance & Governance Matters:

90.23.01 As the Clerk could not attend due to illness, it was proposed by B. Gilbert & Seconded by P. Brooks that £25k from the S106 funding be approved, to Pay Grimshaw's outstanding invoice which is dated 31.12.23.

90.23.02 The funding for the Nursery entrance ramp was discussed & a grant of £1k was approved by all parties, the proposal was from J. Bowden, Seconded by B. Gilbert. D Cllrs Pam & Paul Cummings confirmed that their contribution had been increased to £750.

90.23.03 The issues of the Precept; Hanging Baskets & Mowing were all deferred to the next meeting.

91.23 Parish Matters /Updates:

91.23.01 Ownership of the strip of land between Manor Road & Kenelm Close was discussed, together with the land outside of 14, The Village. Clerk to investigate & following the conclusion, a map of the landowner by the PC will be produced.

91.23.02 The allocation of the 'Social Housing' was discussed & Councillor Gilbert confirmed he had contacted the developer of the Hope Lane site, Jeff Guest of Guild Holmes, but had yet to receive a reply.

91.23.03 The Sign showing the history of Clifton-upon-Teme has been removed, for re-

erection at the rear of the Village Green, but unfortunately, the Oak Framing collapsed during the removal. J Bowden/Clerk to arrange for a new framing & subsequent reerection.

91.23.04 A query was raised regarding the land slip in the River Teme by Ham Bridge – Clerk to check with Worcestershire/ River Trust.

91.23.05 The Registration of the Defibrillators was discussed, Clerk to confirm that they are registered. P Brooks confirmed that weekly checks are being carried out & there was not currently a need for any new parts.

92.23 S106 Project (CFAF) updates:

92.23.01 The applications for funding for the proposed garden at the Recreation Ground was discussed & Lynn & Racheal Merrick were thanked for their great work on this project. It was proposed by B. Gilbert & seconded by J. Bowden that the PC agree for both applications, for funding from National Networks & Malvern Hills s106, to proceed. A meeting has been arranged on Monday 15 January to agree final details & to complete both applications. All agreed.

92.23.02 J. Bowden provided an update on the progress of the S106 Works at the Recreation Ground. He confirmed that the drainage works have been completed; the Boules Court is 90% complete, Ductwork to the MUGA & Tennis Court has also been completed. Grimshaw's works are expected to be complete by the end of January, with the exception of the coloured lines to the MUGA & Tennis Courts. The works to the new play area is due to commence on 29.01.24 & notices have been posted in the Pavilion, on the PC notice board & also on the tables in the play area. The date for the re-surfacing of the bowling green will be agreed when Ade of ARC returns from holiday on 17.01.24. The picnic tables at the Recreation Ground need to be replaced – J Bowden will research a price for these.

93.23 Planning Matters: DCIIr Paul Cumming confirmed that the queries on the SWDPR had been resolved, but they were waiting for a date when the policy would be adopted.

There being no further business, the meeting closed at 20:20hrs. Date of next meeting: Thursday 1 February, 7.40pm, Clifton village hall.



TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE GROUP

One of Great Britain's unique features is the wide scatter of common land found across its nations. Such land is special because it is open to all. Although most lies within National Parks or areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty, common land can be found anywhere, even in cities, perhaps most notably on Hampstead Heath in London. Today it covers 4.8% of Britain's land area, with 546,000 acres registered in England



alone. This may sound a lot, but back in 1550 50% of England's acreage had been subject to common rights. This had long been vital to the rural economy and Rights of Common were first enshrined in law in 1215 by the Magna Carta.

Owners of common land such as the National Trust, utility companies, National Parks or Commoners' Associations are each obliged to uphold commoners' rights, which may include the right to graze livestock, gather wood or bracken, cut peat, dig for coals, sand or gravel or to fish in ponds and streams. Longstanding grazing rights have allowed the creation and survival of locally distinct livestock breeds such Swaledale, Herdwick and Shetland sheep and Exmoor ponies.

Due to the traditional ways in which the land has been managed over many centuries, commons support a greater diversity of wildlife than any other category of farmland. It is therefore no surprise that 21% of England's Sites of Special Scientific Interest are to be found on them, a testament to the wild plants, butterflies, birds and animals who make their homes there.

I have mentioned common land in these articles before, covering meadow saffron on Ewyas Harold Common in Herefordshire, hay meadow plants on Oldwood Common in Worcestershire and golden-ringed dragonflies on Catherton Common in Shropshire. What I hadn't been so aware of, was their importance as sites of archaeological interest. Some 3,000 scheduled ancient monuments receive protection on British commons. These range from Mesolithic flint works, Stone Age henges, circles and standing stones, Bronze Age barrows, dykes, roundhouses and pounds and Roman camps, to more modern, industrial and military relics. The Clee Hill memorial to those airmen, both British and German, who lost their lives in World War II when their aeroplanes crashed into the hill, is a local example of the latter.

Twenty-first century concerns make commons important for biodiversity, maintaining fragile upland ecosystems, absorbing carbon, mitigating floods,

promoting cultural heritage and enhancing personal wellbeing through access to nature. That's a tall order, but 88% of English common land is already nationally or internationally important for its wildlife, landscape or archaeology, so there's no doubt that these semi-wild spaces can rise to meet those expectations.

Abbreviated Draft Minutes of The Shelsleys Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 9 January 2024

Present: Val Jones (Chair), Louise Hutton (Vice-Chair), Karen Metcalfe, John Stinton, Dave Bates, Laura Taylor, Carole Warren and Jean Hammond.

In attendance: Two members of the public and the clerk.

Apologies: David Belfield. District Councillors Pam and Paul Cumming.

Minutes: The Minutes of Tuesday 7 November 2023 were accepted and agreed as a true record.

Public Question Time: None.

Budget: The figures produced by the clerk were agreed and the Precept kept the same at £7.000.00.

Finance: A total of £1,096.40 was agreed for invoices. These included: the lengthsman's invoice, Clerk expenses for Q2 and Q3, salt from WCC, CALC subscription and councilor training.

District and County Councillor Reports: Circulated & available on the parish website (address below).

Highways: The Lengthsman's worksheets were approved. New Mill Bridge: The nearby culvert has been reported to WCC. It requires a specialist contractor to alleviate the problem of the blockage causing flooding across the lane. WCC has been requested to jet the gullies, which have become blocked.

WCC has been advised of the debris building up against New Mill Bridge. WCC has advised that there are many similar problems within the county.

The lengthsman will be asked if he can quickly improve the mud and drainage problems at New Mill Bridge.

MHDC has been asked to sweep the mud and debris from the road between the bridge and the church.

Midland Automobile Club (MAC):

In response to a letter sent to the MAC, Mark Harrison (MAC Board member) responded with a reply in which the history of and background to the current orchard planting, together with the reasons for making new tracks in the orchard was described. Councillor Stinton reported that together with Tony Harrison they have knowledge of the original varieties of trees planted by Montague Taylor at the beginning of the twentieth century, the same number of which will be replanted in a more sensible location on the bank, thus avoiding any damage from cars. The trees will be planted so that the blossom will be visible from across the valley.

It is hoped in due course that the new trees will become hosts to the noble chafer beetle, already established in the old trees within the orchard. These older trees will only be removed when totally dead and unable to support any insect life.

The MAC had not received any information on whether a planning application for the tracks was required.


Village Hall Management Committee: Councillor Stinton, Chairman of the VHMC, gave a report of a recent VHMC meeting. He stated that there had been no resolution of the PC to send a letter to members of the VHMC (to which no reply had been received by the PC). The Chairwoman of the PC replied that the letter had been sent in order to try and gain answers to the questions that were raised at the PC meeting in November (when no answers had been provided by the VHMC).

With regard to the VH accounts, the VHMC saw no obligation to do anything other than

At the VHMC AGM, to be held in public in April or early May this year, all members of the VHMC will resign and may stand for re-election. At this time the VH accounts will be available for the public to see. These accounts are the sole responsibility of the VHMC. The VHMC AGM will be advertised at least a week before the meeting is held, displayed on the external VH noticeboard.

The chair of the VHMC submitted a document (40 from ACRE) showing that the Custodian Trustees (the PC) hold the title to the Village Hall but are not the beneficial owners. The Chairman of the VHMC requested the PC not to interfere with VH matters. After further questions from the PC councillors it transpired that the accounts previously submitted to the council and the Charity Commission were incorrect and as such are unreliable. There has been some inadvertent conflation resulting in inaccurate accounting, which is in the process of being rectified. One of the PC councillors offered to help with current but not past accounts. The VHMC is investigating ways of securing funding through patrons and friends who would contribute regularly. It was determined that the buildings insurance is up to date and due for renewal in two months' time.

The PC Chairwoman noted, after taking advice from CALC, that the PC bears no financial responsibility for the VHMC. She also stated that the PC acts on behalf of local parishioners and asked that the Parish Council be informed of the date of this year's VHMC AGM asap so that this could be suitably relayed to the parishioners. No resolution was made.

Next ordinary meeting: Tuesday 12 March 2024, 7pm, Shelsley Village Hall.





KEN POLLOCK

Former Worcestershire County Councillor for Tenbury, Dr Ken Pollock, died in January at the age of 79 after a short illness.

Ken was a retired former academic and television producer who was instrumental in the success of Top Gear, working alongside Jeremy Clarkson, at BBC Pebble Mill in the 1990's.

Prior to joining Top Gear, Dr Pollock, who joined the BBC in 1977, worked on the old

BBC programme Farming, which he renamed Countryfile. He joined Top Gear Motorsport in 1994, which ran until 1998.

As a Conservative County Councillor for Worcestershire and Cabinet Member for Economy and Infrastructure, he oversaw projects such as the £41 million dualling of the A4440 Southern Link Road and dualling of the Carrington Bridge in Worcester.

Before moving to Cheltenham, he and his wife Diana, lived at Great Witley.


