## TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE GROUP, by Stephanie Mocroft

Stoke Bliss and Kyre village hall was filled to the brim back in January, making a great start to the Teme Valley Wildlife Group's 2024 programme. Our first speaker was ornithologist Mike Metcalf who had come to tell us about Worcestershire's ravens. He has been surveying them for some years now, and investigates the size of the county's population by recording bird numbers and nest sites. He knew from our website that ravens were regularly being seen in the Teme Valley and hoped to enlist our help in finding them. He had compared the number of monthly sightings in the TVWG's Common Bird Survey with national data from the British Trust for Ornithology and found them to tally exactly.

I, for one, am fascinated by these splendid birds and love to hear their swishing wingbeats if they fly over me as I'm buried in the garden border pulling up weeds. They also sail along to see what's going on when I feed my sheep on winter mornings. I always wave and call out "Hello ravens!" and am sometimes rewarded by a change of flight path as they come in closer to see who this silly person is. If I'm very, very lucky, there will be a dipped wing or a demonstration of fancy flying to show off "Red Arrow" style aerobatic skills.

At the end of Mike's talk, a queue of fellow raven-spotters formed, keen to tell him about their local birds. So it was that, come April, I had the pleasure of accompanying him down to a wood where I had a strong suspicion that those near me had built a nest. Mike's hearing was sharply attuned to bird sounds and as the wood came into view he heard their first calls. They were quiet at this point and, as I had heard nothing at all, I quickly stopped prattling to allow him to judge their location. Then, as we neared the edge of the wood, two ravens took to the air and began a range of different calls. Mike interpreted them for me. Some were alarm calls, some were warnings, some told other birds to keep away and some were calls between a nesting pair. To us, there was an obvious "clear off" call.

Once between the trees we started to look up, craning our necks to see into the tallest branches. Ravens prefer to nest in conifer trees and select a high location which they commonly use again. We soon spotted a twiggy nest with

an alert raven standing guard above it. There was no evidence of any young birds, but the presence of two parents and a nest beneath which plant leaves were splotched with bright white guano was evidence enough that the nest was in use. Mike was pleased to record a site previously unknown to him, making it the 36<sup>th</sup> nest in the county.



If you happen to know of a nest, or a possible location for one, and could take that number higher, please contact Mike at mikebirder@hotmail.com - I'm sure he would be delighted to hear from you.

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will be at 7:30pm on Thursday 13 June at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall, WR15 8RR. We welcome Dominique Cragg whose talk is intriguingly entitled "Worcestershire's Rainforests". Members and friends are all welcome, it is just £3 on the door.

The lawns of Broadwas Croquet Club are buzzing again following a prolonged closed season, caused by persistent rain.





## Shelsleys Parish Council abbreviated minutes of the Annual Parish Council Meeting held on May 14th 2024.

**Present:** Val Jones (re-elected Chairwoman), Louise Hutton (re-elected Vice-Chairwoman), Jean Hammond, Laura Taylor, John Stinton and Dave Bates.

**Apologies:** Carole Warren, Karen Metcalfe and David Belfield (accepted). Councillors were reminded of their commitment to attend meetings and to provide reasons for absence. Future meeting dates were agreed in order for Councillors to note.

Declaration of Interests: None.

Public Questions: None.

The Code of Conduct: Noted.

**Council's Scheme of Delegation:** Clerk to collate planning comments between meetings for submission to MHDC. The New Financial Regulations to be discussed at the next meeting.

**Insurance:** The clerk is awaiting a reply on the new declaration to be made by councillors. Cover is considered adequate and the premium agreed. This is the final year of the three-year fixed price.

Appointment of Individual Officers: deferred until July.

**Minutes:** With one addition, the minutes of the 12th March were approved and signed.

**Lengthsman:** Invoices to WCC are now digitised. Clerk to arrange contract signing.

**Highways & Footpaths:** The Ladywood footbridge is closed due to bridge damage. Temporary one day road closures, Hillside 21st May and Camp Lane June 4th. Surface water at New Mill Bridge, the stream has been excavated and a sump dug. The culvert is currently unblocked and the lane is clear.

**Progress Reports:** Broadband: No progress on Pard House Lane project. Speed signage: No progress, it was agreed that this should no longer be an agenda item.

**Urgent Decisions:** A new printer has been purchased for use by the clerk. Biodiversity Plan: The adopted policy will be further discussed in July. Audit: The Exemption Certificate was signed, as were parts 1 and 2 and the Internal Auditor report received. The council will make a donation of £75 to Worcester Foodbank at the Internal Auditor's request in lieu of his fee.

**Finance:** CALC subscription, Clerk's expenses, Lengthsman payment and Insurance totalling £1,071.14 were agreed.

**Planning:** No outstanding applications. Malvern Hills District Council decision M/23?00572/HP Manor Barn Shelsley Beauchamp, approved. **Village Hall Management Committee:** The date of the AGM will be agreed at a meeting to be held on May 21st and the Parish Council to be advised.

The meeting concluded at 20:30.

#### SHELSLEY WATER MILL OPEN WEEKEND

Saturday 8 and Sunday 9 June (10am - 4pm)

Many will know Shelsley Walsh as an historic motor sport venue, and home to the Midland Automobile Club (MAC). But did you know that the MAC is also fortunate to have a working water mill on the same site? Many features of the restored mill date from the 17th century, but records do indicate that there has been a mill on this site going as far back as 1308.

Now, after many years of extensive restoration by the volunteers, the Shelsley Water Mill is the only functioning water-powered corn mill left in Worcestershire. Over the weekend of 8-9 June, the volunteers who have restored and now operate the mill, will be hosting a FREE (though any donations on the day will be gratefully received) open weekend for people to see first-hand how the mill works.

In addition, there will be a display of classic vehicles and a steam traction engine from a by-gone era, as well as access to the 13<sup>th</sup> century St Andrew's Church, which is just next door.

Teas, coffees and cakes will be available for purchase during the day.

For those who are unfamiliar with the historic hill climb, come and take the opportunity to walk the 1000-yard course and work up an appetite for another slice of homemade cake. Make it a family day out.

### PETER COLLINS MEMORIAL AT SHELSLEY HILLCLIMB

On an unusually sunny (!) Bank Holiday Monday, around 500 people gathered in the Courtyard at Shelsley Walsh to witness the unveiling of a memorial dedicated to locally born Formula One racing driver Peter Collins, who was born in Mustow Green, Kidderminster in 1931. As a young man, Peter competed and drove for Ferrari before he tragically died in a crash at Nürburgring in 1958.





The unveiling of the memorial was the culmination of more than a year's work led by Mark Andrews, Managing Director of European Driving Tools. Shelsley Walsh, Peter's home circuit, was chosen as the location of the memorial, following a fund raising campaign.

It was a great day out for motor racing fans, featuring classic and modern cars parked in

the Shelsley Paddock, displays of Peter Collins memorabilia and some special guests including Deborah Jones (Peter's niece) and other family members.

The Bronze memorial was created by Stephen Charnock of Bronzecast and was unveiled by special guests including David Piper who raced in Formula 1 in the 1950's and was driving at the Nurburgring in 1958 when Peter suffered his fatal accident; Howden Ganley, who participated in 41 World Championship Formula One Grand Prix between 1971 and



1974; and Richard Hammond, Top Gear TV presenter.

There was also a display of vehicles from Hills Ford, who kindly sponsored the day, building on previous links with the Collins family. The Hills Ford premises in Kidderminster were originally the local Ford dealership operated by Peter's father Pat Collins and in addition, the site of the Ford Transit Centre now operated by Hills Ford at Mustow Green sits very close to the original site of Pat Collins' haulage company garage where Peter's affinity with cars, lorries and love of racing was nurtured.

## **PROPOSAL TO BUILD 65 MORE HOUSES IN CLIFTON**

A proposed development to build 65 new houses on land in Clifton outside the existing development boundary in the village was discussed at a well-attended annual meeting of the Parish Council.


Parish Council Chairman, John Bowden, said the developer, TerraStrategic, had published details of the plan to build on a 25 acre site on 'land held within a trust', believed to be owned by the Brockhill Estate. According to TerraStrategic, 'the land is outside the settlement boundary, but adjacent to it, with no obvious planning constraints'.

"The proposed site is outside the development boundary in the Neighbourhood Plan which has been reviewed regularly," said Mr Bowden in response to many comments opposed to the plan.

The Parish Council agreed to write to the current landowner and also seek professional planning advice on the current status of the Neighbourhood Plan for Clifton.

#### COMMUNITY SUPPORT FOR CLIFTON UPON TEME NURSERY

Members of the community have rallied to support Clifton upon Teme Nursery and Pre-School in making urgent repairs to its access ramp.

The Nursery and Pre-School, located behind the Primary School in Clifton, found itself having to carry out urgent repair work required to replace the rotting access ramp to the building in January, and without any funds saved to cover the £5,000 cost.

The Nursery trustees set to work to raise funds. They have raised £500 in the past six months from a series of fundraising events. Clifton Parish Council have agreed to contribute  $\pounds$ 1,000 towards the cost of the ramp repair and both County and District Councillors have also donated.

Abi Pethybridge-Court, the Nursery manager, said, "On behalf of all the staff, children and families of Clifton upon Teme Nursery and Pre-school, we would like to thank the community for rallying round and supporting us with the ramp repair. Having the ramp back in action means we can continue to provide a safe environment for our children and our staff'.

However there is still further repair work to fund, which includes new flooring, replacing of the roofing to the outdoor cupboard and shelter and a new fire door being top priorities.

Commenting on the financial strain on the nursery, Katherine Poole, a parent trustee of the nursery, said, 'We are extremely proud that we managed to stay open over the Covid period, especially in a national context where more than 4,200 providers closed. We, like many local businesses, had just got through the financial recovery after Covid and then had to confront the cost-of-living crisis which has escalated our outgoings. We are also responding to the biggest overhaul in childcare funding model in a decade; a great opportunity for working families, but fundamentally changes our business model. We have prioritised keeping the nursery open over the last three years which means that we have not been able to invest in improving our nursery environment."

Clifton upon Teme Nursery and Pre-school is a charitable organisation providing childcare services to children from three months to five years. Established to serve the local community in 2000, it is managed by a committee of volunteer trustees. The nursery, which has a 'Good' Ofsted rating, is currently the only childcare provider in the Teme Valley ward and the only provider in a nine-mile radius offering places to children under the age of two years.

cost of a new bionic arm for him.

Noah's mother, Rebecca Orton, says the family has been fundraising along with two other families to raise a total of  $\pounds 20,000$  between them. This, matched with a further  $\pounds 40,000$  already raised with the help of The Open Bionics Foundation and also an anonymous donor, has helped to cover the cost of three Hero Arms.



A Hero Arm is an advanced, lightweight, 3D printed bionic arm, with multi-grip functionality and empowering aesthetics. Already, more than £13,000 of the  $\pounds 20,000$  has been raised.

"My favourite sport is football and I support the best team in the world, Aston Villa," says Noah. "I'm in a football team called Worcester United and I also play football at school. I also enjoy cooking, my favourite thing to cook is spicy pasta bake."

"The Hero Arm will help me with lots of things like carrying a range of things, doing my tie for school, doing up my buttons and plenty of other things that I need to do on a daily basis," he added. "It will make my life easier by giving me more confidence and having loads of positive attention about my difference. It will also make school life a lot easier, help with homework and general house chores that I do every day."
