CLIFTON 55 HOUSES PLAN DECISION DEFERRED

A meeting of the Malvern Hills District Council Northern Area Planning Committee last month (March) deferred making a decision on the planning application by developer Terrastrategic to build 55 houses on land in Hope Lane, Clifton.

Parish Council Chairman, John Bowden, referred to the existing neighbourhood plan for the village which did not envisage development on the site in question. Local resident Michelle Crawshaw, speaking on behalf of the Clifton Sustainable Heritage Steering Group, said the village had already experienced a lot of growth. If granted, the development would double the amount of new housing in the parish proposed in the new South Worcestershire Development Plan.

District Councillor Paul Cumming told the meeting that the proposed site was outside the existing development boundary and in open countryside. The village already had more houses than need to be provided and the proposal went against the neighbourhood plan. "If we are going to go against the neighbourhood plan, why are we asking parishes to make them?" he asked.

Councillors voted to defer making a decision on the grounds that the existing housing needs survey was out of date and there were highways issues yet to be resolved.

CLIFTON ROVERS TROPHY SUCCESS

Clifton Rovers have won the Southam Trophy in a thrilling cup final match that ended in a penalty shoot-out against Worcester United FC Cobras. The Worcester & District Football League final was staged at Droitwich Spa Football Club with a large attendance to support the Rovers team. The game saw the sides equally matched in the first half. As the game went on, Clifton grew into it and began to create a number of chances, forcing the Cobras keeper into making some impressive saves, as well as hitting the post. The full-time whistle was blown with the two sides still at a stalemate. The cup rules saw the match go straight to penalties. With Clifton going second, the pressure was on. Rovers successfully dispatched three penalties in a row thanks to Alec Francis, James Francis and Dan Juckes. With Cobras hitting the bar and Ewan Mountjoy, the Clifton keeper, making a fantastic save to deny them a second time, there was a chance to win it. Sam Butler stepped up to take the fourth penalty for the Rovers and saw it sail into the back of the net to crown Clifton Rovers as the Southam Trophy winners.

Final score: Worcester United FC Cobras 0 - 0 Clifton Rovers. Clifton Rovers win 4-2 on penalties. Man of the match: Sam Harris (Clifton Rovers).

BACK BY POPULAR DEMAND...ON THE FARM.... by Allan Jeffries

We've had a brilliant spell of weather for lambing this year - if Global Warming has helped, then don't plant any more trees because I love it! I think the real reason though is there are too many people on the planet and our modern lifestyle. Wildlife is being decimated, and nature has had enough. Planting trees is good, but if you look around you, there are a lot of trees already! Carbon footprint seems to be very much the 'in' subject at the moment, unbelievably, if the experts work out that you have an excess on your farm, there will probably be a monetary value on it!

We bring the sheep into the sheds a couple of weeks before lambing, so they have time to settle down, especially the new ones. We've been feeding extra feed this year, starting about eight weeks before lambing, because the ewes were not in such good condition as we like them to be, so an extra load of bulk cake was bought from Richard at Estate Country Feeds who makes very good sheep food.

Lambing has gone reasonably well, with strong lambs and a few more singles and less triplets than last year. The level of tiredness doesn't improve, they need looking at every couple of hours throughout the 24 hours! Fi, who I couldn't manage without, does up until 11:00pm, then I take over and Fi goes back out at 5:00am. Some busy nights I don't have any idea what the time is and I'm thinking I can go and have a couple of hours sleep, but then I hear the cockerel, who lives up at The Noak, crowing his head off, so I know by the time I've had a cup of tea, it will be time to start feeding again, so no sleep! It's funny when you mention a bit of nighttime lambing to some of your friends, suddenly they're having hip replacements, new knees, or hernia ops, it's amazing what some people will do to get out of lambing!

We've got just over twenty tiddlers on the bucket feeders, which children love to make a fuss of! One of them I found wandering around the shed at only a few hours old, the mother had abandoned her, I put her under the light in the tiddler shed and despite being quite tiny she is a fighter and has survived and grown well.

We have some lovely kind friends who have brought us cakes and supper during lambing. I won't mention any names, or people might think they are the local food bank!

It has really felt like spring this year, with the beautiful weather, blue skies and vibrant greens and blossom appearing everywhere. Of course we do now need some light warm rain for the crops and the grass!

Reading last month's magazine, I've noticed there are so many places locally who have started doing Full English Breakfasts, I think we'll sell the sheep and keep pigs instead, so we can supply the bacon. It's a certain fact that some of

our friends who try one won't go back to cornflakes and yoghurt!!

Let's hope we have a good summer this year!

SUSTAINABLE CHURCH FLOWERS

Members of the Clifton WI were treated to a demonstration and talk on the Sustainable Church Flower movement by Dot Millward of Harpley. Explaining the Sustainable Church Flower movement, Dot showed examples of how to use natural twigs, chicken wire and moss in various vases for flower arrangements instead of floral foam (see picture below). She explained how she started using sustainable church flowers at Harpley Church in 2019 when asked by her church warden and how she had found it a much easier process than her training would have expected. She showed examples of different ways of arranging in an urn or other containers. She used natural twigs or chicken wire to hold the flowers, greenery and even branches, demonstrating how this actually allowed the natural shape of the flowers and greenery to lead the design.

Dot's presentation finished with reference to the first Sustainable Church Flowers Ambassador launch at the Chapel Royal, St James's, held in London last month by kind permission of HM The King. It is hoped that Kate Hurst (pictured below), churchwarden for Shelsley, will present the SCF motion at the General Synod in July. Kate has also appeared in 'Country Life' magazine this month, talking about the movement.



Church Matters

"Our mouths were filled with laughter, our tongues with songs of joy. Then it was said among the nations, The Lord has done great things for us and we are filled with joy." Psalm 126: v2-3

Last September I set off on a trip to Uganda to volunteer at a school. A time of mixed emotions: excitement and uncertainty contrasting with a keenness to push myself out of my comfort zone and do something worthwhile.

Child of Hope is a Christian-based charity, tackling the key barriers to a meaningful future for slum children and their families living in conditions of extreme deprivation and hardship in Eastern Uganda.



It aims to provide free education from its schools, healthcare and welfare to the poorest and most vulnerable families. Its generous sponsors and fundraising allow it to support 750 children and gives these families hope that they can lift themselves out of poverty.

As I walked into school on my first morning I was met with the wonderful sound of singing as the children and their teachers took part in their daily Devotions. Children were dancing, playing makeshift drums, praising and thanking God for all He had given them. The air was filled with a real sense of joy and happiness. I felt so moved by it all.

This is my overriding feeling from being at Child of Hope for eight weeks – the joy and gratefulness that everyone felt, in spite of the difficult situations they were facing each and every day. It wasn't just some of the time, these children were joyful and enthusiastic all the time. To be there, to teach and be among them was such a delight – their joy was infectious!

"These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full." John 15:11.

The children remember Jesus every day and the joy fills their hearts and minds even though they had so little. I felt ill one day and the teacher said to the class, let us all pray for 'Auntie Rachel' to make her better, and they did! Their faith in God and that He will provide for them and others is unquestionable — it is Faith.

I was shown around the community and welcomed into the homes of so many. Small, dark single-roomed huts that housed whole families. They cooked

outside on charcoal fires, the same meal every day if they were lucky. They live hand to mouth, the children waiting for their parents to come home in the evening, hopefully with some shillings so that they can buy food to cook a meal. The children have daily chores both before and after school, collecting water, washing, looking after younger



siblings, cleaning or cooking but they do so with a smile and an acceptance. It is seen as part of their contribution to daily life with no sense of entitlement or undercurrent of resentment.

There were daily tragic stories from the community – a primary aged girl begging in the local town after school as her mother was so ill; a young boy beaten by his stepbrother when his mother died and treated like a slave; another girl, given a meal at school as she had no food at home, sold it on the street to raise money so she and her brother could eat. This list goes on: children sleeping outside; houses washed away; children with literally no food. Truly heart-rending. All of this and more the Child of Hope Welfare Team attempt to deal with, stepping in with support, foster care, money, food, building new homes and advice.

Moses, the Ugandan Director of the School, has complete faith that God will provide for the members of the community. Whilst God does provide, in practical terms it is the Trustees who have to find the funds to make things happen. Unfortunately corruption is rife across Africa but the wonderful thing about Child of Hope being run by Christians and the Voluntary Director of Education (a retired Bristolian Head Teacher who relocated permanently to Uganda), is that it ensures that all money raised gets to where it is needed. A little money goes a long way in Uganda compared to the West and makes an enormous difference to their lives.

I was made to feel so welcome and thanked daily for all I was doing for them -

they were so grateful that I had come to their school to teach the children. So much so, I am off out again this July with my husband Clive to see how we can continue to support and help them. With so many in need around the world it is easy to

become desensitised or overwhelmed and do nothing. However, we have both decided to do what we can and have made Child of Hope our 'retirement cause'.

Woodpecker class visited for the afternoon to take part in the Experience Easter where they learnt about Easter and the Christian beliefs, challenging Rev Julia Curtis with very thoughtful questions e.g. Why did Jesus deserve to die? Who was the angel? The Beavers also paid a visit on Thursday evening for a very enthusiastic egg hunting session. Mothering Sunday was again a lovely service for families, with posies being given out reflecting the amazing array of wild and garden flowers that are currently in bloom.

So good to see the church and churchyard being used by the community as it should be. Do pop in to the church - it is full of history and has been in use since 1200. The church is open daily for visitors and private prayer or those times when you just need some peace and quiet!




She was a caring and protective person, working with the elderly for many years.
