### **CLIFTON RESIDENT'S HONOUR**

Clifton's Shane Connolly, who helped set up the Sustainable Church Flowers Movement, and provided displays for the King's wedding and coronation, has been appointed an MBE in the King's Birthday Honours.

Shane said it was a pleasant surprise to be recognised for services to sustainable floristry: "You don't do anything thinking that you're going to get acknowledgement, so it was very strange because I never expected it," he added.

"I've been doing this since 1989 and the real problem in the flower industry is that it is very heavily dependent on non-environmentally friendly flowers that are imported from halfway around the world. The way they're arranged in things like floral foam, which is a non biodegradable microplastic, is also a problem."

His work has been showcased at events for the Royal Family several times, an opportunity he is grateful for.

"I've been incredibly lucky that I've been commissioned by the now King and the now Queen to do their wedding in 2005, to do the Prince and Princess of Wales's wedding in 2011 and to do the flowers for the Coronation."

### LOCAL FLORIST IS DOUBLE AWARD WINNER

Shelsley Beauchamp sustainable florist Kate Hurst, director at Camomile & Cornflowers, has won the Central England Best Florist award in the Prestige Awards for the second year.

The multi-award-winner uses her three-acre cottage garden to grow and arrange her own flowers as organically as possible, to create 'unique, wild and delicate' designs for all occasions.

Adding to her recent work at the Malvern Spring Show, she has also struck gold at perhaps the industry's most prestigious event.

Kate told *Teme Triangle*: "I am a member of the Farewell Flowers Directory - a directory of florists that provide compostable floral tributes using predominantly British flowers - and I helped on the directory's stand at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show in May.

Funeral flowers were displayed for the first time in 150 years. The stand won a Gold award and was much admired by The Queen. We even featured on ITV News!"



She confirmed: "Most funeral flowers are based on floral foam or Oasis which is a single use plastic that takes hundreds of years to degrade. It also releases dangerous chemicals into our environment and breaks down into micro-plastics that pollute our watercourses.

Imported flowers (90% of our flowers in this country are imported via Holland) mostly come from places like Columbia, Uganda, Egypt, Ethiopia and Kenya. Many of these countries will spray their flowers with lots of pesticides and preservatives before shipping their flowers thousands of miles by plane. Flower production on a commercial scale also depletes precious water resources.

For these reasons I only use British flowers, herbs and unusual foliage all year."

### TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE: BLOSSOM

I have lived in the Teme Valley for over thirty years now, but I don't think I've ever seen it blossom so beautifully as it has in 2025. Dry, warm weather chased away grey skies and frequent rain. Since then we have been lucky to see the sun nearly every day. A lack of frost and rain encouraged plants, both in the garden and in the wider landscape, to put on a tremendous spring display. Blackthorn, as usual, was first to bloom, tiny white star flowers bursting from thin black twigs on shrubby bushes and low trees. Then fruit blossom took over. Damson, cherry, apple and pear all seemed to come out together this year. My pear trees were utterly laden, leaving barely a leaf in sight. Next came the creamy spires of horse chestnut flowers, then an avalanche of hawthorn whose blossom was draped over nearly every hedge.

Not to be outdone, garden flowers then came in on the act, exhibiting perfect wisteria and exuberant clematis. Before a music concert on a warm evening in Much Marcle, I enjoyed the extraordinary sight of a blue wisteria which had been trained straight upwards to an unusually tall height, presumably on some kind of support which was completely hidden by flowers. It looked marvellous, but what made it special was that a vigorous pale pink Clematis montana had twisted itself high up through it. Concert goers were drawn to look up in wonder as they spotted it on their way past.

Well, what exactly is blossom? Technically, it is a cluster of flowers blooming on any plant, but it tends to be a term associated with trees which bear fruit. It is celebrated here in Worcestershire by the Vale of Evesham Blossom Trail, a route that has been promoted for over forty years to attract visitors to a region famous for its many orchards. The trail winds around Pershore and Evesham, vaguely following the route of the River Avon. Fruit and vegetable growing began in the vale in the eighth century under the monks of Evesham Abbey, but its peak came in the late nineteenth century when the arrival of the railways allowed the area's produce to be sent out over long distances.

After the discovery of the Pershore Yellow Egg plum in Tiddesley Wood, and the development of the Purple Pershore plum, plum growing boomed around Pershore, where jam and processing factories were set up to preserve the produce. Sadly, imported fruit and railway closures ended the boom and only a quarter of the vale's orchards remain today. Nevertheless, it is possible to enjoy the region on foot, by bike or by car, and to follow a variety of trails through orchards to witness the area's unique landscape. The original 8-mile blossom trail has been extended over the years and is now a 55-mile driving tour. Here's Worcestershire at its best!

#### 'Some History of Empire, Immigration and Vagrancy'

A warm welcome awaits attendees at Stanford History Group, which meets on Monday evenings from the end of September to the start of December. Meetings are held at Sapey Village Hall, WR6 6EU. Chairman Simon Marriott confirmed: "We are a diverse group with an interest in understanding the past, to better appreciate today and how we got here! 



### TEME VALLEY'S CHRISTIAN AID WEEK RAISES RECORD FUNDS

Christian Aid week this year has been another whirlwind experience. We had an intense period of fundraising activities in the Teme Valley and, due to the generosity of our communities, we have raised a massive £3,177.83 so far (our highest total ever) whilst also having great fun and fellowship.

It was lovely to see some new faces and enjoy catching up with friends at the coffee morning in the Austin's home, whilst enjoying delicious cakes and fresh coffee. We enjoyed a charming afternoon at Harpley's St Bartholomew's Church admiring the 'Language of Flowers' floral displays, with novices also trying their hand at bouquet-making *(right, top)* whilst enjoying delicious cakes, cups of tea (in fine bone china cups) and sipping Prosecco.

The evening with author Ellie Somme was utterly fascinating and gripping. Her father's story of his bravery as a member of the Norwegian resistance and his daring escape from his Nazi captors across the mountains to Sweden was awe-inspiring. The chilli, potatoes, crème fraiche and cheese went down well too.

The Big Breakfast, which was diverted to the Clifton Village Hall due to the inclement weather, was also a huge success. We served a record 74 full English breakfasts, cooked by super chefs Penny Bowden and Nick Denniston (the eggs and milk generously donated by Jan the Milk from Phil Gray), along with tea, coffee, orange juice, toast, jam and marmalade to locals, friends and family from the surrounding area *(opposite, bottom)*. It was great to see people meeting old and new friends whilst enjoying a superb breakfast. The annual house-to-house collection in Clifton raised more than ever before.

We have one last event, a stall at the Shelsley Beauchamp Fête selling preloved clothing and accessories, which we hope will raise our total even higher.



There are so many people to thank for this year's fundraising and social success, including the bakers, flower arrangers, chefs, shoppers, collectors, speakers, gazebo providers, waiting staff, drinks makers, furniture movers, money counters, promoters, raffle prize givers and ticket sellers and of course to the supporters. ### SPECIAL METHODIST SERVICE AT HARPLEY Harpley Methodist celebration service

In June a special service was held at St Bartholomew's Church, Harpley, to give thanks for more than 40 years of Methodist services held there regularly after the High Lane Methodist Chapel closed in 1979. The service marked the ending of Methodist services there, as there are no longer enough people to attend and lead.



Rev Jen Denniston said, "It was a lovely occasion - marking the end of an era, while celebrating the fruitful collaboration of different 'flocks' working and worshipping as one, with expectation that something new will come now, rather than a full stop."

Rev Katherine Pickering, Methodist minister from Bromyard Road, Worcester, led the service, highlighting the four decades of collaboration of Anglican and Methodists at St Bartholomew's since High Lane Methodist Chapel closed.

Valerie Edwards of Hollybush Lane, Harpley shared reminisces of the chapel and told the story of how St Bartholomew's PCC offered the church for the monthly Methodist services.

### **GRIST TO THE SHELSLEY WATER MILL**

In April, the 'Dibnahs' and Shelsley Walsh Water Mill were visited by Savannah Edwards, an arable farmer from Wichenford. Savannah collaborates with Sarah Corbridge, a sourdough baker who works with farmers in regional grain networks to mill and test-bake various heritage wheats. Savannah predominantly grows a variety called April Bearded and this year she also has a spring rye in the ground, which has stood the drought well and is already 1.5m tall.



"Sarah's ability to work with and understand how a heritage grain works best along with her attention to flavour is incredible" Savannah told us. "April Bearded is an "awned" wheat, named after the long "awns" that project from the head of the grains to give wind protection and assist drying. Once harvested the crop is stone ground, in the traditional way to retain the nutritional content of the wheat in the flour unlike modern techniques that strip the flour of all its nutrients and then replaces what it has taken out with synthetic substitutes."

When Savannah and Sarah arrived, the mill was put to work on its first bulk milling job since it became productive again and in three hours, 100kgs of flour was milled. The Dibnahs are delighted to play their part in this exciting project. On hand was expert Adam Marriott, the man who keeps all the water mills in the UK functioning. Adam is a millwright, engineer and fixer of all vintage and old machinery, as well as a farmer of heritage grains. It is his threshing machine Savannah will use so that the rye straw can be used for thatching.

Savannah and Sarah are interested in seeing the heritage grain milled traditionally and using it in traditional baking. "The flour has a delicious nutty flavour," Sarah said. "A good all-purpose flour, ideal for making bread if mixed with a strong flour; and great for baking biscuits, cakes, pasta and pizza dough."

### PRAISE FOR CLIFTON WILDFLOWER GARDEN

The new wildflower garden in Clifton's recreation field has won the praise of Worcestershire Wildlife Trust.



Writing to the Parish Council, the Trust's Natural Networks Officer, Becca Bratt, sent her congratulations, adding: "The wildflower area, and indeed the whole site, looked absolutely fantastic! The wildflower turf has done so well and was humming with bees and insects. Well done on keeping this and the hedgerows watered and healthy over the dry period. You've created a really fantastic space for local people as well as massively boosting resources for wildlife, as well as managing to keep a balance between 'wild' and neatly maintained. Bravo!"



Natural Networks awarded a grant of £15k and worked with the Parish Council to enhance the recreation ground for the villagers and to provide a natural resource to improve the habitat for wildlife. Parish councillor Lyn Merrick and her daughter Rachel were responsible for the design and nurturing of the wildlife garden which has received praise from many park visitors.



#### Minutes of the Parish Council held on Thursday 5th June at Clifton upon Teme Village Hall commencing at 7.40PM

Present: Chair: Cllr J Bowden, Cllrs B Gilbert, R Neave, S Haywood, P Brooks Also present: Cllr Justin Bowen (WCC), Anna Briggs (Acting Clerk), 3 members of the public

22.25 To consider apologies and to approve reasons for absence. None.

23.25 Declarations of Interests & consideration for requests for Councilor Dispensations in line with s33 of the Localism Act 2011. None.

Register of Interests: Councillors are reminded of the need to update their Register of Interests. To declare any Personal or Prejudicial Interests in items on the agenda and their nature. None.

24.25 To approve the Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held Thursday 22nd May and consider any matters arising from the meeting if not itemised on this agenda. One amendment Picklands is Pitlands (found in public participation). Correction made. Minutes proposed by Cllr Gilbert, seconded by Cllr Neave. Chair signed and dated minutes.

Before public time the Chair formally announced the new Clerk for Clifton upon Teme, Andrew (Sid) Ward. The Chair welcomed Sid on board. The Chair thanked the Acting Clerk Anna Briggs for stepping in whilst a suitable permanent clerk was appointed.

#### Meeting closed for public participation

The Chair started by saying not withstanding the Standing Orders, the meetings are "open" meetings and so members of the public can speak on any subjects covered on the agenda.

The Chair welcomed Cllr Justin Bowen, the newly elected County Councillor. He introduced himself and gave a brief verbal report: The Full County Council AGM was on the 22nd May where Jo Monk was appointed Council Leader and Cllr Bowen has been given the job of responsibility for children and families.

• Financial Challenges: The accounts haven't yet been signed off for last year but the CC debt is in the region of £600M with assets (mainly roads) coming in at  $\pm 1.2B$ . In operating terms the Council faces a forecast deficit of about  $\pm 30-40M$ .

• Devolution update: The two options are a one unitary authority 'One Worcestershire' or a North Worcestershire and South Worcestershire divide. These two options to go before the panel in November. A conversation took place around both these options. (From a personal point of view Cllr Bowen would choose 'One Worcestershire'). Cllr Neave asked if it will free up some assets; Consultants PwC will take a closer look at this. Discussions also took place concerning local planning and how this could be affected with probable re-alignment of boundaries and also how the SWDPR may be affected. Many unanswered questions!

Chair signed and dated.

Unfortunately, the end of year accounts have not yet been completed due to change of Clerk, so after the parish meeting finishes a meeting will take place with the internal auditor appointed by the Parish Council Mr Tony Dipple as to the way forward.

28.25 Playing Field. (It was noted at this point that the agenda items could be reviewed). With regard to the RoSPA report and 'walking the playground' - the Chair and Cllr Brooks to meet tomorrow. One of the things highlighted is the old seesaw and the cantilever swing. The Chair reported back with a price for a seesaw – a two seater £1380 and a four seater £1,850 and Dino Swing £6,350. He's also seeking a price for a play tractor. Cllr Bruce suggested that the seesaw be approved in principle and to set aside £2,000 for this purpose. Cllr Gilbert proposed, Cllr Brook seconded. All in favour with a budget of £2,500 be set aside.

The Chair confirmed the nets are work in progress. No real progress on S106 with the trial holes costing at £400 (this is to ascertain whether the footings of the existing BP hut can be used for the new changing rooms). Cllr Gilbert proposed this spend, Cllr Neave seconded. All in favour. Chair liaising with Bromyard Plumbing for an external tap – depending on price the Chair will pay and claim back cost.

SWDPR – Has been discussed already.

• Lengthsman tasks. The hanging baskets are up! By public opinion more hanging baskets are required so the Chair has instructed Rob Wilks to buy another six (they are not cheap).

• Cllr Haywood handed to the Chair a list of outstanding matters for the Lengthsman which was discussed. Clerk to circulate list by email. Cllr Bowen said he can help with any highways issues and gave his email address: jbowen4@ worcestershire.gov.uk.

• Road and footpath closure notices (as circulated). There are no new road closures but Cllr Brooks reminded everyone that a number of road closures are coming up later in the summer and that the road resurfacing is still going on at the crossroads.

Cllr Neave asked if there was any update on the potential planning application of 14 more houses. A discussion took place around the SWDPR and the Neighbourhood Plan boundary with Cllr Bowen being part of the discussion and planning applications which go to appeal. The Chair had two questions: a) how can we find out if applications are going to appeal and b) do we have any say when the appeal comes before the board. Basically there's not much we can do and things are likely to get through on appeal. Cllr Bowen said the best bet is to try and form a communication with the developer at an early stage and trying and influence the development as best we can.

Cllr Brooks raised the question as to pharmacy and distribution of prescriptions. At last month's meeting the conversation seemed to be based around Knightwick and our connection with them. But as we're in the boundary of Great Witley, can we not tap into their system of distribution of prescriptions? After a long conversation Cllr Brooks to contact Great Witley.

**Lengthsman:** The annual contract will be renewed. **Highways & Footpaths:** Two pedestrian warning signs agreed with WCC are now in place. It was agreed more are needed and WCC will be contacted. The damaged, and badly repaired road edge by the Shelsley Beauchamp bungalows has yet to be rectified despite a request from the Parish Council. The spring flowing on to Fetterlocks Lane is on private land. Councillor Hutton will contact the landowner.


