### ON THE FARM

We've had one of the warmest, driest summers most people can remember, with

lovely mornings to get up to. The downside is that we've been so short of grass for the sheep due to a shortage of rain in this area, we haven't had a night or day's rain since the middle of February. Our fields look so burnt off you could be in Spain, in fact save your money and imagine you're on holiday abroad. You've got the River Teme to swim in and sit by with a picnic... no airports or congested roads, perfect.



I've been telling people that this year is worse than 1976 (to those who remember it!) because we had a normal growing spring then and the drought didn't start until the middle of June, so although we were very short of grazing, we did at least have a good store of winter fodder.

My father used to say, years ago when his grandfather started farming in the mid 1860s, he had two very wet years followed by a really dry one when spring corn was planted and had hardly any rain on it until it was harvested. One of his neighbours was complaining about his poor hay crop, he said all he had to mow was wimple grass. When asked what wimple grass was, he said it was twice as thin as a bent! So, these weather conditions have happened before.

Considering the shortage of grass, the ewes and lambs look quite good. Some of the ewes are a bit thin, but now we've got the lambs weaned, we've started feeding them ewe nuts again, which, apart from three weeks after weaning to ensure the milk dried up, they have been having since early January, so hopefully their condition will soon start to improve. We've bought so much food from Estate Feeds this year that I'm sure Richard has been able to give all his staff a bonus!

I believe the decline in wildlife over the last fifty years is quite serious. We do now have a few rabbits appearing this year, whereas years ago we would have a few hundred on the farm. A balance somewhere would be ideal!

When I was mowing the grass for hay this year, as usual the seagulls and buzzards soon appeared, waiting for a tasty morsel. They didn't hang around for long as no tasty mice or slugs were forthcoming!

I'm sure when I write again, I will be complaining about too much rain, but of course farmers are always complaining about the weather!



### Abbreviated draft minutes of Clifton Parish Council meeting held Thursday 3 July 2025 at Clifton Village Hall

Present: Cllr J. Bowden (Chair), Cllrs B. Gilbert, R. Neave, S. Haywood. Also present: County Cllr Justin Bowen, District Cllr Paul Cumming and 9 members of the public. Apologies: Cllr Paul Brooks No declarations and no conflicts of interest declared. Minutes of Parish Council meeting held 5 June approved as amended.

### Meeting suspended to allow members of the public to raise any issues or concerns.

A local resident (Anthony Newman) read a prepared statement outlining the following: That the council may not be representing the views and interests of the local community. Concern with the integrity and impartiality of the parish council. Concern that collective decisions are being taken that reflect the interests and preferences of individual councilors, especially in terms of recent planning applications. The parish council has not sought to fairly represent views of its residents through consultation. There is a real or perceived prioritisation of personal interest over the democratic will of the community. The local resident concluded their prepared statement by asking the following questions: Has the council followed proper procedures in agreeing collective position, particularly in planning matters? Are declarations of interest being properly made, recorded and acted upon? Has the council undertaken appropriate resident consultation for adopting their position? He requested evidence of how resident views were obtained and recorded in respect of planning application M2500790PIP.

A second resident asked how the parish council came to its conclusion to support the planning application when the proposed development sits outside of the boundary for development as outlined in the Clifton development plan. Cllr Gilbert replied that the neighbourhood plan does address developments just outside of the boundary. The same resident further asked if the council had consulted planning experts regarding the issue of planning creep. Cllr Bowden replied that the planning officer at MHDC had been consulted regarding self-build criteria.

Cllr Gilbert was asked about his support for the application based on the self-build aspect of the submission. Cllr Gilbert replied that in principle he is in favour of self-build schemes if they allow groups or individuals to gain a footing on the property ladder who might not otherwise be able to afford a home in the village.

An opinion was expressed that the Parish Council failed to canvas the opinions of residents and subsequently lodged a response based solely on the opinions of the parish council. Concerns of residents were 'batted away'. It was suggested that this was in contravention to MHDC code of conduct. Cllr Gilbert asked the member of the public who read the initial statement if they would be willing to send the written statement to the parish council. The member of the public replied that they would be willing to send the written statement to the parish council. He also stated his intention to submit a formal complaint based on localism act 2011, MHDC Code of Conduct and the Nolan Principles. The Parish Council stated that only one email was received regarding the planning application. There would seem to be one other person sent a message directly to another parish councilor. Concerns were raised around communicating calls for candidates for any forthcoming parish council elections. The Parish Council stated that notifications of

elections and calls for candidates have appeared on the website, in The Teme Triangle, in meeting minutes and on notice boards around the village. Cllr Bowden stated that the Parish Council was appointed ex officio due to the number of candidates not exceeding the number of positions on the Council (seven).

Cllr Bowden said that the planning application in question is at an early stage in the process and all those with an interest will need to await the decision from Malvern Hills.

Cllr Gilbert asked two members of the public if they would consider joining the parish council and they replied that they would consider the request.

### District & County Councillors Reports (circulated via email):

Cllr Cumming: Funding available for rural businesses. Contact him for further information about transport issues regarding planning applications. County Highways only consider local impact on transport and not wider implications. There is also an issue regarding the culminative effect of increased development on transport and traffic. County Cllr Justin Bowen suggested that Cllr Cumming should contact the county councilor for Stourport who also holds the portfolio for transport.

Speeding traffic is an issue in villages. Vehicle Activated Signals (VAS) have been further developed and some funding may be available to parish councils to install VAS. Cllr Bowden detailed recent developments within Clifton including upgrades to existing VAS infrastructure. Action: Clerk to email County Cllr Bowen to investigate funding.

County Cllr Bowen also stated that small amounts of funding may be available for projects. Cllr Bowden outlined plans for solar panels and car charging points on the Pavilion. Action: Clerk to include details of these projects to see if any small grants are available.

#### Financial & Governance Matters:

Payment schedule (to be circulated via email) reviewed by councillors. Cllr Gilbert proposed payment schedule to be approved and seconded by Cllr Neave. Cllr Bowden proposed that a maintenance account to be set up with an initial balance of £5000. This is to be used for maintaining the recreational ground. Action: Clerk to set up a maintenance account with Unity Bank. Cllr Bowden also raised the possibility that the Reserve Savings account which is currently with Scottish Widows be transferred over to Unity Bank. To be considered in future meetings.

Cllr Gilbert asked that the amount agreed to treat the benches in the recreation ground be increased from £120 to £160 as the number of benches has increased from 3 benches to 4 benches.

### Parish Matters/Updates:

Hanging baskets have been installed. Six more to be ordered.

### Playing Field (CFAF) project:

Cllrs Bowden and Brooks have reviewed the ROSPA report regarding the play equipment. Quotes have been requested from suppliers and a list shared with Parish Lengthsman.

Cllr Bowden summarized the exploratory work that has been undertaken so far on the concrete slab remaining near the pavilion. A feasibility study was conducted focused on using the slab to house changing rooms for Clifton Rovers. The study concluded that the slab, as is, is not suited for this purpose. Cllr Gilbert asked for further studies to be conducted to determine what work would need to be carried out for the slab to be utilized for this purpose. Cllr Gilbert summarized the issue of the slab for the benefit of the members of the public present. A member of the public offered to review the report and the parish council were happy to take this offer up. Action: Cllr Bowden to share the report with the member of the public.

### Planning Matters:

Planning Application M/25/00790/PIP – Pound Lane: Parish Council comment submitted. Discussed at depth under public time.

Planning Application M/25/00961/LB & M/25/00960/HP – The Manor House – PC response before 27 July. Similar applications for the same property. Application received the day before the PC meeting. Further review required. Cllr Bowden noted that the location was within the conservation area.

Planning correspondence received by resident – discussed previously.

#### Strategic Planning updates:

Cllr Cumming gave an SWDPR update. Nothing published as yet but an indication should be forthcoming in July including any amendments required. It should be able to be used in any future appeals that are to be lodged as it should be signed off and implemented in the near future. Cllr Bowden asked about the appeals process in regards to the Hope Lane development. Cllr Cumming replied that any appeal would probably be held within the district and anticipate the appeal to be held in public.

#### **Highway Matters:**

Cllr Haywood noted that some tasks for the lengthsman remain unfinished. Cllr Bowden to ask Lengthsman for update on list of tasks submitted in June.

#### Councillors Reports & Items for Future Agendas:

Cllr Gilbert proposed an agenda item in next meeting (September) updating on progress of any complaint resulting from Planning Application M/25/00790/PIP. Action. Clerk to add Complaint Update to agenda for September 2025 meeting.

Cllr Bowden outlined that some work seems to have started on Ham Bridge. He added that members of the public can raise such issues via the Highways website. Any VAT charged by suppliers can be claimed.

### Parish Clerk Correspondence:

West Mercia Police have asked for updates on priorities. Suggestions include speeding around the village, parking around the school and rural crime. Action. Clerk to respond with priorities.

Date of next meeting: Thursday 4th September 2025 at 7.40pm Clifton Village Hall.





Given the low density of population in this area we are very lucky to be blessed with many cultural opportunities. Operas from the Met in New York and the Royal Opera House in London are frequently shown in Bromyard at the Conquest Theatre, in Tenbury Wells at the Regal cinema and in Ludlow at the Assembly Rooms. Use them or lose them.

Arts Society Teme Valley lectures are another superb cultural resource. The lectures are given by knowledgeable and enthusiastic speakers with splendid illustrations. On art-related topics, lectures are stimulating and enjoyable, even those which do not have very appealing titles. I once went to a lecture called 'Cupboards and Drawers'. It was absolutely fascinating. It took us back to ancient cavemen with just one bowl and spoon which needed a shelf for storage and display and developed from there. ### **TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE**

The Ledwyche brook is a Shropshire tributary of the River Teme which joins the river at Burford next to the gardens of Burford House. It begins in the foothills of Brown Clee, west of Stoke St Milborough, and for five of its 17-mile length traces the border between Herefordshire and Shropshire. It is crossed by a formal footbridge in the grounds of Henley Hall, by a Grade II-listed bridge on Squirrel Lane between Ludlow and Bitterley, by the Elan Valley water pipeline near Caynham Camp and hosts a flood-warning river-level station at Burford Bridge on the A456.

What is notable about the Ledwyche brook is that it is home to a plant rarely seen in the wild. Well-known as a garden plant, Monkshood is a stately plant with striking blue flowers which form the shape of a monk's cowl. It originates in Europe and Asia where it has long been known to be extremely poisonous. All parts of the plant can do harm, but the root, shaped like a turnip, is the most dangerous. The Latin name of *Aconitum napellus* refers to 'little turnip', the meaning of the word 'napellus'. It appears to be very happy growing along the Ledwyche brook.

I unexpectedly came upon some specimens back in June, whilst following Little Hereford's Millennium Walk. It favours shady stream sides and was growing on both the Herefordshire and Shropshire sides of the brook, sheltered by the trees which line it. I was struck by the pure blue flowers and the beauty of the tall stems. Botanists have puzzled over whether such plants are native, naturalised or just garden forms escaped into the wild. However, the Ledwyche brook plants are believed to be true natives. The first record in this location was in 1755 by Rev E Williams who noted it to be in abundance a few yards above Gossart bridge between Ludlow and Burford. It was next recorded in 1855, 'for a mile or so' between Ludlow and Caynham Camp by another botanic reverend, Edward Whitehead, a Fellow of Corpus Christi College, Oxford.

One of the lovely things about writing these articles is that people sometimes get in touch to share local knowledge. A few years ago, a lady brought up in the valley in the 1940s sent me her father's botany textbook. He noted local plants of interest in the margins. For May 23, 1946, of Monkshood he wrote, 'at quantity at weir near Sheet, Ludlow', so here was a twentieth century Ledwyche brook record. Researching a little further, I found it had also been spotted on the Cadmore brook in Worcestershire, also along the Teme at Rochford, and many years ago, at Eastham on Eastham Hill, although I think it more likely to have been on Piper's Brook, not on the hill itself. I wonder what these small, localised tributaries of the Teme have in common to attract wild Monkshood?

Another name for it is Wolfsbane, a name thought to recall a practice of leaving meat laced with monkshood poison in traps to lure and kill wolves. It is also thought that a compound made from it was used to tip hunters' arrows. In Ancient Rome a ban was placed on its cultivation – I wonder why? Today, it is used in Chinese medicine and in homeopathy, but I wouldn't want to try it!

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will be at 7:30pm on Thursday September 11 2025 at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall, WR15 8RR. We welcome Johnny Birks once again, whose talk is called "Restoring balance: the pine marten reintroduction programme in Devon's woodlands". Members and friends are all welcome, it is just £3 on the door.

### HARPLEY METHODIST CELEBRATION SERVICE

The first joint services were the brainchild of Ancrum Evans, Rev Patrick Hobson and David Cave, a local Methodist preacher. At the first joint service we were given mugs bearing the date of the first service, 30 December 1979, and the text (Romans 9:20-21) which read, 'A clay pot does not ask the man who made it, "Why did you make me like this?" After all, the man who makes the pots has the right to use the clay as he wishes, and to make two pots from the lump of clay, one for special occasions, and one for ordinary use.'

High Lane Chapel at that time was overseen by the Methodist Minster at Bromyard. The congregation mainly consisted of Mr and Mrs Rosser of Harpley Green, Mrs Grace Richards, Merlin Edwards as Steward, and Valerie Edwards, later joined by Mr and Mrs Bloomer who moved into the Old School House. Mrs Rosser was organist. On one occasion Mrs Denniston played the organ in the chapel. The poor instrument was used to Mrs Rosser's gentle touch. Mrs Denniston being decades younger peddled much faster and stronger. She launched into, How Great Thou Art, with great fervour. Dust was seen coming from the back of the organ and, as Merlin commented, 'I pray it's dust, not smoke!'

Combined services were initially held on the fifth Sunday, alternating between church and chapel. In the early 1980s, the chapel was deemed no longer viable and was officially closed. By this time our Rector was Rev Clifford Owen who was to become Ecumenical Officer for the diocese. He was keen for a closer union between church and chapel. This was thoroughly discussed and agreed.

The PCC at St Bartholomew's generously invited the Methodists to hold a service in the church twice a month. We were blessed with the arrival of John and Pat Savage at Hatt House. A new player for each side as it were, because John was an inspired preacher, in both the Methodist and Anglican traditions. Doreen McLean from Clifton, who is a talented organist, and Colin and Barbara Raybould also joined.

Over the years, we have been inspired by many preachers, the most notable being retired Baptist minister Rev Noel Lloyd-James. During this time, High Lane Chapel moved from Leominster circuit to Malvern and now South Worcester. We must thank God for the wonderful fellowship we have enjoyed and thank all who made it possible. May the fellowship continue!



### **Church Matters**

by Rev Julia Curtis

'A Time to Rest: Sabbatical Seasons and Fallow Fields'

As some of you know, I will soon be stepping away from ministry for a three month sabbatical, this September to the end of November. It's a time for rest, reflection, and renewal - a pause not from faith or calling, but from the daily responsibilities of parish life. While I'll



certainly miss worshipping and ministering in these parishes, I know that this season of stepping back is part of the rhythm of healthy ministry.

Interestingly, there's a parallel just down the M5 at one of the most unlikely of places: Glastonbury Festival. Every few years, the famous music festival takes a break - a 'fallow year'. No stages, no soundchecks, no muddy fields filled with dancing crowds. Instead, the land rests. So do the farmers, the organisers, and even the local community. After all the energy poured into the event, the fallow year gives time to recover and prepare for what's to come.

It's a deeply biblical idea too. In the Old Testament, God commands the land to be left fallow every seventh year (Leviticus 25). It's not just agricultural wisdom - it's spiritual wisdom. Rest isn't a luxury; it's a necessity. Sabbath is woven into the very fabric of creation. Even Jesus, in the middle of his ministry, withdrew to quiet places to pray and be refreshed. So, as I enter this time of sabbatical, I invite you to reflect too. What does 'rest' look like in our own lives and that of our churches? What might be learnt from stepping back for a season - from the busyness, the noise, the pressure to produce? How can we enable fresh energy to be released from this place of rest?

This isn't just about taking a holiday; it's about trusting that God is still at work even when we aren't. That seeds planted in faith continue to grow even when we don't see them. And that our value isn't defined by constant activity, but by being beloved children of God. Do keep me in your prayers during this time, and let's also use this season as a gentle reminder that sometimes, stepping aside is exactly what's needed to step forward with fresh strength.

May we all find our own 'fallow years' - even if only in small, sacred pauses.
