COFFEE, CAKE, COMMUNITY AND GENEROSITY

A big thank you to everyone who came along to support the coffee morning in aid of the homeless last month. Lots of coffee was drunk. cake eaten, laughter and chat amongst new and old friends but most of all nearly £350 raised for this amazing charity, plus bags of preloved clothes food. toiletries and cookware



donated. Thank you to those too who donated clothes and money as well as those who donated raffle prizes, particularly Apple Tree Kitchen for their generous voucher; it is very much appreciated.

Maggs may be new to some of you - it is a Worcestershire based charity that supports the homeless and the vulnerable. 2025 is a special year as Maggs celebrates 40 years of helping and supporting. As can be seen from the website, Maggs helps in many ways, providing a holistic approach to those found in unfortunate circumstances.

Maggs Day centre in Worcester provides the basics, a lifeline to help people survive the worst of what life throws at them. Here they can have a cooked breakfast every morning Monday to Friday with tea and coffee all day. On Thursday, students from the College cook and serve a hot meal at the Centre, a 'win win 'for all. Clients can take a shower, secure their few possessions in a locker, talk with the outreach workers to get help with accommodation, jobs, doctor appointments or just spend a few hours in a safe, warm space to sleep, catch up with friends or relax.

There are also open door Day Centres in Malvern and Redditch, where support is given in the same way. Maggs also has a Clothing Project on The Tything, a place for the homeless and those on low income to choose clean, warm and waterproof clothes, sleeping bags, mats, shoes – everyday items that we just take for granted. Maggs has an Accommodation Project so the Clothing Project also has home items, duvets and covers, pots and pans, rugs, pictures – things to make

someone feel valued and loved. Both these projects are integral stepping stones in the journey of those who are sleeping rough or are building confidence to re-enter society.

Volunteering at The Clothing Project or the Day Centre is a very rewarding experience, not only due to who you meet, but also because of what you are helping to achieve. I have met so many interesting, polite, grateful people, it is eye opening and puts everything into perspective – 'when someone already has so little choice in life, these are things that will make a difference.'

KEEPING SAFE THIS WINTER - DRIVING IN THE SHELSLEYS

Your Parish Council regularly discusses problems with speeding vehicles, and inappropriate speed restrictions on the lanes in our parish. Local councils are not able to make changes to restrictions, but we have a positive relationship with the hillclimb management regarding signage and messages to their members, some of whom cause problems on race days.

Sadly however it is often local drivers who speed through the village centre and other 40mph sections in cars and tractors. As the winter approaches, can we please ask you all to stop and think seriously about your speed on all the lanes in the valley? The limit is often 60mph, but is this sensible with single track lanes and frequently restricted vision? If someone's family were walking in the lanes, could you stop in time?

In these dark, early evenings, pedestrians need to remember to wear reflective clothing and keep dogs on a lead on the lanes.

Let's work on this together and keep everyone safe - thank you.





Unapproved Abbreviated Minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Shelsleys' Parish Council held on Tuesday 11 November 2025 at Shelsley Village Hall

Present: Chairwoman, Val Jones, Louise Hutton, Laura Taylor, Dave Bates, Jean Hammond & Karen Metcalfe. Councillor Justin Bowen, the Clerk and three members of the public.

Apologies: John Stinton (vacation) via Dave Bates, accepted. District Councillors Pam and Paul Cumming.

Declaration of Interests: None.

Public Questions: A question was raised on the need for more signposting of local footpaths and byways.

Problems regarding footpaths can be reported on the WCC website, Councillor Metcalfe as Parish Footpaths Warden will then be contacted and requested to sort problems locally if possible.

She is aware of a problem in Camp Lane where footpaths have been obstructed and intimidation has occurred, but as a voluntary worker it is difficult for her to resolve problems of this nature. Any acts of intimidation or aggression should be reported directly to the WCC portal.

Casual Vacancy: An application was received from Sean Hinton. Members agreed unanimously to appoint him as a Councillor representing Shelsley Kings. He was welcomed and after signing the Acceptance of Office he was invited to sit with the councillors.

Minutes: The minutes of Tuesday 9 September 2025 were approved and signed as a true record.

Lengthsman, Highways & Footpaths: The lengthsman will be asked to keep drains clear of leaves and to cut back the road edges where flooding occurs near the Village Hall. County Councillor Bowen requested any WCC maintained blocked drains be reported to him.

Electronic speed sign purchase - this was dismissed as other speed restriction options were discussed. Potholes reported in Camp Lane have been partially dealt with. Bend marker signs are now in place on Kingswood Lane. Flood depth indication poles - this information is required at New Mill Bridge and All Saints church. Justin Bowen reported that WCC will send an inspector to see what warning signage can be put in place.

Road closure on Pard House Lane. Proposed road closure for up to five days from Monday 8 December.

Urgent Decisions: M/25/01547/LB Hop Barn The Green. Retrospective application for variations to previously approved 06/00013/LBC. PC supported the application.

Planning: M/25/01595/AGR Kingswood House. Steel frame agricultural building, application withdrawn.

Malvern Hills Planning decisions:

M/25/00955/FUL Land At (OS 7355 6281), Shelsley Beauchamp. Change of use of agricultural land to site a Shepherd Hut for use as a holiday let. Approved.

Village Hall Update: Fred Lees, Chairman of the newly appointed Village Hall Management Committee, who was present at part of the meeting, gave a report on the current position of funding and activities.

The fireworks event, paid for with a grant specifically to be used for the benefit of the community, had been well attended and takings from food, bar and donations were excellent.

Grants have been applied for, the outcomes are not yet known.

A Community Day, Saturday 15 November, has been arranged and people are encouraged to come and help. A skip and paint from Crown Paints has been donated and refreshments will be available.

The licenced bar staffed by volunteers will be opened on days yet to be decided. County Councillor Bowen said he has a small amount of funding available if a request from the VHMC is made to him for a specific item.

It was noted that when the hall was used for the Warm Space project, three sofas and a standard lamp were kindly donated. Only two sofas remain in the hall, the whereabouts of the other items is not known.

Defibrillator: Councillor Hutton received information that the defibrillator pads need to be replaced. It was proposed and accepted that the upkeep of the defibrillator be adopted by the PC, which will pay for the new pads.

Coronation photograph: Quotations for printing and framing will be sought by Councillor Hutton.

Progress Reports: Broadband - Councillor Hammond was informed by Rob Stepniewski WCC that there is no plan for a build in the Stanford Bridge area until 2027 and Airband is currently not available.

A review of the **Biodiversity Plan** will take place at the next meeting.

Finance: Clerk's expenses £68.97, Information Commissioner £47.00, Total £115.97.The Budget figures to be reviewed in January, to determine the Precept request for 2026-2027.

Councillors' reports and items for future agenda: A report on the September Parish Walk will be sent to the Teme Triangle.

The CALC AGM on 13 November, held on Zoom, will be attended by the Chairwoman. Councillor Hammond will provide an update on Broadband for publication in the Teme Triangle.

It was agreed to hold a Christmas Parish Walk on Sunday 28 December at 2pm, details to be published in the Teme Triangle. Refreshments will be available in the Village Hall afterwards.

Next meeting: Tuesday 13 January 2026, Shelsley Village Hall, 7pm.

Abbreviated draft minutes of Clifton Parish Council meeting held Thursday 6 November 2025

Present: Cllr J. Bowden (Chair), Cllrs P. Brooks, R. Neave, A. Griffiths, D. Crawshaw and S. Haywood. District Cllr Paul Cumming and County Cllr Justin Bowen.

Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held 2 October: Approved. Matters arising: All signs have been erected in the recreation ground. Water provider yet to be switched.

Public Time: Nothing raised.

Parish & County Councillors' Reports (to be circulated): County Councillor's Report: External auditor's report on County Council raised serious concerns. County council has requested £34 million in emergency funding. County council approved the One Worcestershire council option due to saving approx. £20 million a year. Cllr Bowden has requested funding of £1,000 towards the VAS signs just purchased by the PCC. Tenbury has £1 million budget for flood resilience measures. Cllr Brooks asked about national government taking over Worcestershire County Council. Cllr Bowen explained the process. Cllr Bowden (CuT) asked about traffic calming measures similar to villages across Oxfordshire. Cllr Bowen outlined that he is working on a solution where parish councils would seek a general consensus from parishioners for designating the village a 20mph zone and then using some of the precept money for signage.

District Councillor's Report: Cllr Cumming expressed disappointment with the planning officers' presentation at the recent planning appeal held in Malvern. He outlined issues around the one council approach favoured by the County Council and how the different characteristics of each area would not be best served by a single council.

Financial & Governance Matters: Payment schedule (to be circulated). WNCT Wildlife to be paid remaining 50% for report to be released. Clerk to provide three quotes for gazebos for next meeting.

Parish Matters/Updates: December/Christmas event, Friday 19 December, organised by Ruth Wilson and Rachel Austin. Cllr Brooks proposed a £250 budget for Carols on the Green and Xmas trees. Cllr Griffiths agreed to investigate sponsorship or donation of Xmas trees for village and church.

Playing Field (CFAF) project update: Mats under the swings to remain in place until external safety inspection states otherwise. Play equipment inspection (quotes). Annual inspection to be carried out by ROSPA as an independent body. Co-op public gardens funding - Donation from Co-op of £970.00 to help support wellbeing in the village. Cllr Griffiths to investigate projects involving young children that the money could support. Sports Ground & Pavillion – Rental agreement. Cllr Neave proposed that the new version be used and that a review takes place in two years (2027). Builders or other contractors wishing to use the Pavilion car park can do so but will be expected to make a donation.

Planning Matters: M/25/01285/HP – The Village Clifton / Approved. SWDPR update nearing completion. Publication possible before Christmas.

Highway Matters: Lengthsman tasks: Surface run off causing flooding on Hope Lane to be passed to County Highways (Cllr Bowen). Road and footpath closure notices (circulated on website).

Items for Future Agendas: Additional litter bin to be purchased for village. Location to be confirmed. Tennis court gate needs to be repaired. Contractor instructed as emergency repair required. Clerk to investigate high interest savings accounts provided by Unity Bank and provide a draft budget for financial year 2026/2027 at December meeting.

Parish Council contribution to Teme Triangle set at £750.00 and to continue paying for Remembrance Day wreath. Parish Council to go ahead and fund information board for Wildflower Garden at a cost of approx. £1,500.

Date of next meeting: Thursday 4 December 2025, 7.40pm, Clifton Village Hall.

SHELSLEY PARISH BROADBAND UPDATE

As some of you will be aware, the internet speed in the Stanford Bridge area of our parish remains woefully poor, with many households receiving a service less than 10mbps.

Shelsley Parish Council has been liaising with the County Council on an ongoing basis to ascertain any progress / development, and has this week been advised the following:

"The county wide procurement for the Government-led Project Gigabit is underway and there is now a contracted solution for circa 24,000 premises across the County."

Stanford Bridge is in the intervention area, and the Council has advised that the expected build in this area is currently scheduled for 2027, but that this is "subject to change".

We will continue to update the parish of any progress or further developments.



TEME VALLEY WILDLIFE

December brings the close of the year and affords an opportunity to review the preceding eleven months. 2025 has been unique for me, because it is the first year during which I have been obliged to share my garden with a muntjac deer.

'Mitzi' first hove into view in January, on the front lawn, investigating the grass under the birdfeeder and inspecting the herbaceous borders. In broad daylight, she showed little fear of humans, but on that day appeared troubled by biting insects, possibly ticks. She repeatedly turned round to chew the fur on her back and abruptly hopped about in tight circles, as though trying to dislodge something. She's returned nearly every day since, entering from the lane, travelling up a secluded gully between our hedge and that of our next-door neighbour, crossing the border, lawn and drive then trotting up a bank and on into the orchard.

As spring brought life to the garden, Mitzi's presence proved to be rather less than benign. A prized patch of snake's head fritillaries in a damp part of the lawn suddenly appeared shortened. The flower stems had been bitten off a few inches above the ground and a deer-slot next to this work

informed me of the culprit. Any stem rising from the ground bearing a tasty bud proved to be too much of a temptation for Mitzi. After swathing my fritillaries in sticks wound with black cotton, she turned her attention to my cowslips, aquilegias and scabious instead. My husband was appalled to find a large Schubertii allium bud detached from its stem and lying on the ground - too garlicky to eat we assumed. She then explored the patio and demolished a pot of his lilies.

A grassy bank where I had envisaged a drift of large purple crocus in William Robinson's "wild garden" style proved a total disappointment. Here, Mitzi waited for the buds to open before eating them, mercifully leaving the leaves behind, which I hope means that the plants might survive. Gravetye, Robinson's wonderful garden in Sussex, is fully deer-fenced I now learn. Perhaps I should have checked on that before embarking on one of his planting schemes.

Cross, but resigned to life with Mitzi, I shrugged my shoulders at her summer activities as she pruned the roses before they had flowered, leaving me to wait for colour later in the year. She, meanwhile, enjoyed fallen cherries, raspberries - both leaves and fruit - then damsons. Apples and pears aren't to her taste. Autumn shed light on her night-time exploits. Opening a window to let out a wasp one evening, I heard coughlike barks coming from the orchard. This had to be Mitzi summoning a mate. And who did I see a few mornings later, travelling her route beside the hedge? Yes, a large male with gnarly swept-back horns. Oh, just my luck, 'Marmaduke' has moved in as well! Happy Christmas!

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will be at 7:30pm on Thursday 8 January 2026 at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall, WR15 8RR. We welcome local falconer Steve Woodison whose talk is called 'Owls and other birds of prey'. Some of his birds will join him. Members and friends are welcome, it is just £3 on the door.

CROSSING THE WINTER THRESHOLD

Winter often feels like an ending — the year's colour drained, the days narrowed, and the countryside around us settling into silence. Yet the season has another character if we're willing to look again. Winter is not a wall but a doorway, a
